

Calcutta, India, Sept. 4 (P)roops stood by as Calcutta returned to normal after a day of

inlence that took 15 lives. Apart from two clashes between police and hooligans in the early morning, the city and its industrial suburb of Howrah were quiet and normal business life resumed. Three hundred army troops were called to Howrah where poce and mobs battled yesterday The soldiers arrived when the sitnation began to calm down and vere not needed to quell the rid

Howrah, police said their count showed nine persons were killed by police rifle fire, and two storekeepers fatally stabbed the mob for failing to observe the general strike call. The shops were burned. One policeman was killed and 25 injured Police and civil officials began screening 550 riot suspects arrested in Howrah. In Calcutta itself, police builets

cilled three persons last night. Five policemen and a number hoodlums were injured. Shortly after 6 a.m. today police fired on a gang stoning a privately operated hus and a mob attacking a police vehicle. It was
