Announcer's Wife Perishes in Blaze

New Milford, Sept. 22 (AP)—Mrs. Westbrook Van Voorhis, 56, wife of a man whose speaking voice became nationally known, died last night in a fire at her home.

Firemen said they found her alone in the house, lying in bed, as flames swept through the converted barn on Paper Mill Rd. off of Wallville Ave.

Medical Examiner Dr. Howard G. Stevens said she died from first and second degree burns over two-thirds of her body.

She was the wife of the Columbia Broadcasting System radio announcer whose voice was associated for years with the "March of Time" on radio and in the movies.

The fire occurred half a mile from a home in which three persons died in a fire Aug. 30.

South Windsor Party Favors Town Buying School Sites

The South Windsor Democratic Town Committee has announced a platform favoring town buying school sites near developed areas while land is available and cheaper.

The platform also includes a safety program, more street and traffic lights, a recreation program, increased fire and police protection, orderly growth through zoning, a continuation of investment money surpluses to reduce borrowing payments, and a continuation of its policy on highways.

The platform released by the committee goes into these details:

"Streets: To continue the present policy of installing street lights on all streets, and wherever needed. We advocate a continuing installation of speed limit signs, caution and alert signs for better protection of our children. We will continue our policy of maintaining and improving our highways.

"Safety program: To continue action for installation of more traffic lights, a recreation program, and railroad crossings. To continue our policy of maintaining our safety precaution measures.

"Recreational facilities: To foster and promote youth activities, particularly in the field of athletics for the purpose of combatting juvenile delinquency and the building of better citizens.

"To provide more adequate and extended use of town-owned facilities, such as schools and play grounds for this purpose.

"Education: We advocate purchase of sites for schools near highly developed areas while land is more readily available and lower in cost.

"To continue to maintain and improve our high educational standards and to strive for improvement in educational quality.

"Fire protection: Investigate expansion of fire protection facilities with a view toward the establishment of fire stations in areas where needed in order to lower fire insurance rates on public and private property and to provide fire insurance for the town.

"Industry: To continue to provide a climate acceptable to industry and to encourage work for ever-increasing utilization of our industrial and business areas.

"Investigate the possibilities of obtaining professional assistance in the work of the Industrial Development Commission.

"Finance: To continue the program of investing the cash surplus of the general fund in treasury bills to reduce our interest payments on borrowing. To stress emphasis on reserves for capital improvement.

"To supplement our new zoning regulations so as to provide and control orderly growth of residential and industrial facilities in order to maintain a stable tax rate.

"Police: To continue cooperation of our constables with the resident state policeman, the State Police, and our full-time constable through training programs to insure more efficiency in the protection of our town.

"To appoint special constables in new home areas."

When a player leads his fourth-best card in a suit, subtract the number of that card from eleven. The remainder is the number of higher cards held by the other three players. The Rule of Eleven, as it is called, may help you find the right way to play the suit.

West opened the ten of clubs, covered in turn by the jack, queen and king. South returned the jack of spades to East's king. East thereupon returned the five of clubs.

Leonard B. Harmon, playing the South hand, felt pretty sure that East had returned his fourth-best club. Applying the Rule of Eleven, he discovered that South, West, and North had started with five cards higher than the five of clubs.

Harmon figured that dummy had started with the jack of clubs and that his own hand had started with four cards higher than the five of clubs. This left only one such card for West to hold. Since West had already led the ten of clubs, he could not hold any other card higher than the five of clubs.

Harmon finessed the six of clubs. The deep finesse worked, as expected.

From this point on, Harmon could play the hand in comfort. He forced out the ace of spades, knowing that he could finesse the eight of clubs if East continued with his long suit.

It was easy to develop as many spades and hearts as needed. East could not develop a threat of any kind.

Now go back to that lead of the five of clubs. Suppose South finesses the eight of clubs instead of the six. This play looks daring enough, but it costs South his contract.

South leads the ten of spades to force out the ace, and East now leads the nine of clubs. South.

School Board to Press for Vote On \$1 Million Bond for Repairs

The Board of Education agreed last night to push for a referendum on a \$1 million dollar program to renovate 11 older school buildings.

The Board's decision was made—

1. To try for a greater allocation than the \$700,000 which General Manager Richard Martin proposed should be given in the next six years in installments.

2. To overcome a delay on the part of the Board of Directors who have suggested investigating the whole capital improvement program for the next year before any action is taken.

3. To obtain assurance of how much money would be allocated totally, so that architects can plan a priority program of work in the schools.

Frank Sheldon, chairman of the building and sites subcommittee of the Board of Education, said the Board is "more responsible" in "being out in the open" about the physical hazards and structural weakness of the old schools, and the "rapid deterioration" of them.

According to a recent estimate, renovations in Barnard Junior High School would cost more than \$600,000 and the renovations in eight elementary schools would cost more than \$200,000.

"I think the people have the right to decide in some way," he said. "The money should be allocated in three or four years rather than six years, and that I suggest by referendum."

The annual meeting of the Board of Education will be held on Sept. 23 at 8 p.m. at the Community Hall.

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ABILITY KNOWLEDGE

You Should Know... Catherine Putnam

The secretary of the Library Board once thought she might be a newspaper reporter. Later she thought she might prefer being an editor in the publishing field. But she finally made her life's work in the library.

She has become well known to hundreds of Manchester students. Miss Catherine E. Putnam decided to become a reporter when she was an undergraduate at Mt. Holyoke College. She was taking a course in journalism, and part of the course required her to correspond with various newspapers.

Her two papers were the Providence Journal and the Boston Advertiser. They printed the news she wrote about the colleges and about students from those areas who made news at the college.

But upon graduation in 1925 she accepted a position with the G. and C. Martin-Walton Co., a national dictionary company, and for the next year was what she calls a "pre-editor." Her task required her to read all kinds of technical manuals, novels, journals, looking for new uses of words.

She and several other pre-editors would put together a list of definitions of new words, and new additions to old word definitions.

She liked the work, but decided "it was too quiet for me."

She turned to a profession which has never held out quite as one of its attractions for candidates teaching high school social studies.

Miss Putnam started in 1929 at the Fitch High School in Fitchburg, Mass. In 1934 she came to Manchester High School, and has been here ever since.

She was director of the 1945 Student Council from 1945 to about 1952.

During that time the council bore the brunt of the election, sponsoring sport dances, planning gifts for Indians and in general taking a central position in school affairs.

Her fellow teachers elected her president of the Manchester Education Assn. in 1947 to serve until 1949. The members of the Connecticut Council of Social Studies Teachers elected her to two terms as a director of their organization.

Then in 1950 her ability was recognized by the Town of Manchester when she was appointed to the Library Board.

She was appointed, she says, not because of her political affiliation which is Republican, but because she was a teacher and at that time there was close cooperation between the library and the schools' book loan programs.

as new money by creating additional credit.

The 1 1/2 percent bond interest rate is expected to rise to 2 1/2 percent by the end of the year, according to the Treasury. The Treasury has announced that it will raise the rate on its 1 1/2 percent bonds to 2 1/2 percent by the end of the year. The Treasury expects to make the new rate retroactive to June 1, of this year, on bonds already outstanding as well as new ones.

There are some 40 million savings bonds held.

The Treasury wants to put as much of the debt as possible into long-term obligations.

Most of the borrowing to remove the interest ceiling stemmed from unwillingness of the Democratic majority in Congress to pass higher interest rates. The bill finally passed does, however, give the Treasury some additional authority for managing the debt.

The Treasury will be putting in existing bonds before they actually reach maturity, by swapping new issues at a higher interest rate for them. It also defers taxes on capital gains realized by bondholders making such exchanges.

For example, holders of 2 1/2 percent bonds now getting close to maturity but quoted at a large discount, may swap them for new bonds paying 3 1/2 percent or more, with maturity dates 10 years or so in the future.

The Treasury would pay a higher interest rate, but at the same time would reduce the market for short-term borrowings and maintain more of the debt in long term securities.

Two Buy Daily In Middletown

Middletown, Sept. 22 (AP)—The Middletown Press, 75-year-old daily newspaper, has been sold by publisher Elmer S. Hubbell to a new owner, Woodbridge A. D'Onofrio, 28, of Hartford, who will serve as publisher, and Russell G. D'Onofrio, 32, of Plainfield, N. Y., who will be editor. They are brothers.

The purchase price for the 160,000-circulation publication was not disclosed. Hubbell, who managed the Press for 40 years, said he acted "for reasons of health."

The D'Onofrio brothers will take control of the paper Sept. 30, one day after the Press celebrates its 75th anniversary. Hubbell said Russell D'Onofrio will be chairman of the board, and Woodbridge D'Onofrio will be president. The new owners said they will retain the present departmental heads.

Woodbridge is a former assistant to the controller of the Hartford Courant, and Russell is a former California editor and publisher.

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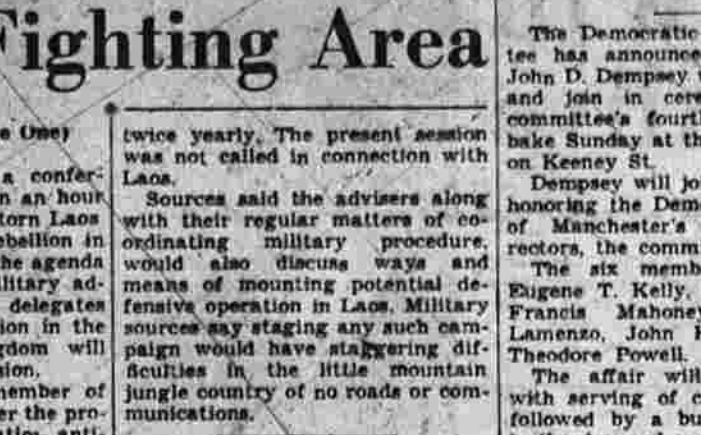
