 Summer has gone. The Manchester baseball league has hung up spikes and gloves, and football has already scattered five football games.

One of these games was last Saturday's high school contest; the other four were games in the Manchester Midget Football League.

There is no direct connection between midget and high school players right now, but in two years, perhaps even next year, high school coaches may have the pleasant task of working with second, football-playing freshmen and sophomores whose initial training came in this same midget league.

The association has its founding in times when organized recreation for small and large fry was seriously lacking. It was first, to make this recreation available and, later, to make it available to children who were bored and lonely in the summer months. The association has its roots in the desire to combat, through athletics and other activities, the atmosphere of idleness and boredom which helps generate juvenile delinquency.

 his U.S. District Court for more than two years.

But the U.S. Supreme Court held in 1957 that Du Pont holdings in G.W. tended to violate antitrust laws and directed Judge La Bay to work out a remedy.

It has been one of the biggest antitrust cases in the nation's history.

Release of the decision is due to come after all American stock exchanges are closed for the week-end.

For Judge La Bay, 70, the Du Pont case has been the dominant matter of his 26-year career on the bench. He was elected to the Illinois Circuit Court after 21 years practicing law. In 1944, President Franklin D. Roosevelt named La Bay a Democrat, to the federal bench.

Judge La Bay heard the suit without a jury during 100 days of testimony in 1953 when a record of 2 1/2 million words was amassed.

In his decision, which is the civil action, Judge La Bay said the government failed to prove conduct, monopoly or restraint of trade in Du Pont's business relationships. He also suggested the ground upon which the Supreme Court reversed his finding—infringement of the Sherman Act.
