Castro Rejects Protest by U.S.

Havana, Oct. 26 (AP)—Cuban-American relations steadily worsen today as Fidel Castro's regime rejected a U.S. protest against its rising anti-Americanism.

President Oswald Dortch, after conferring with Prime Minister Castro and his cabinet, decided to dismiss a U.S. government protest that "deliberate and concerted efforts in Cuba" are being made to destroy relations between the two countries.

The cabinet whipped out a new law imposing stiff taxes on mining concessions. The law apparently is aimed directly at two American-owned nickel and cobalt producing operations in eastern Cuba.

De Gaulle described a squabble with the British and Americans over France's Alps frontier. He said that for a long while he had intended to redraw the frontier to the General's satisfaction.

De Gaulle said he would like to see the French and Americans working together to solve the Alps frontier problem.

### Retirement: Happy Times

Straws in the Wind: A CHANCE to buy drugs and medicines at 25 per cent below regular retail prices will be a budget boon to many retired persons of the National Retired Teachers Assn. and its affiliate, the American Assn. of Retired Persons.

Dr. Ethel Percy Andrus, president of both associations, has announced formation of a new nonprofit drug buying service that will make this possible. The associations will have purchasing centers staffed by licensed pharmacists in Washington and at Ojai, Calif., where the National Retired Teachers Assn. maintains a home.

Additional centers will be opened in other cities.

"Americans over 60 years of age spend about 10 per cent of their average annual income of \$1,200 for drugs and medications," Dr. Andrus said.

The teachers group was established in 1947. It affiliates in 1958. TUITION OF \$2 a course, instead of the usual \$20, is offered people 65 years of age and older by the adult education division of Wayne State University and the University of Michigan. The one-year experiment applies to any of the division's courses.

"We are doing this to encourage older and retired people who are interested in expanding their knowledge to participate in our program," said Dr. Hamilton Bill, well-known division director.

While the number of registrations in any one course may be limited by the division, there are more than 100 courses to choose from. Last year, more than 5,000 took adult education courses. But there were only 84 people in the 40-44 bracket.

# Modern Vernon School Opens

Another classroom cluster will be built in this area

Lake Street School in Vernon is unique in its design and the use of materials. The 670-pupil school cost \$612,000 to build. It has 20 classrooms—five rooms in each of four clusters—a library-classroom, and a gymnasium and cafeteria adjacent to each other with a mutual stage. The per pupil cost of building the school is \$224 below the state average of \$1,085; and the cost per square foot is \$1.76 below the state average of \$15.95. The hinged wedge shaped classrooms take advantage of natural light

flooding the room through two glass-brick walls. This is the main feature of the Maximite design incorporated in this school by architect William Mileto of Rossetti and Mileto of Bristol. The fourth cluster now under construction will be completed next September. 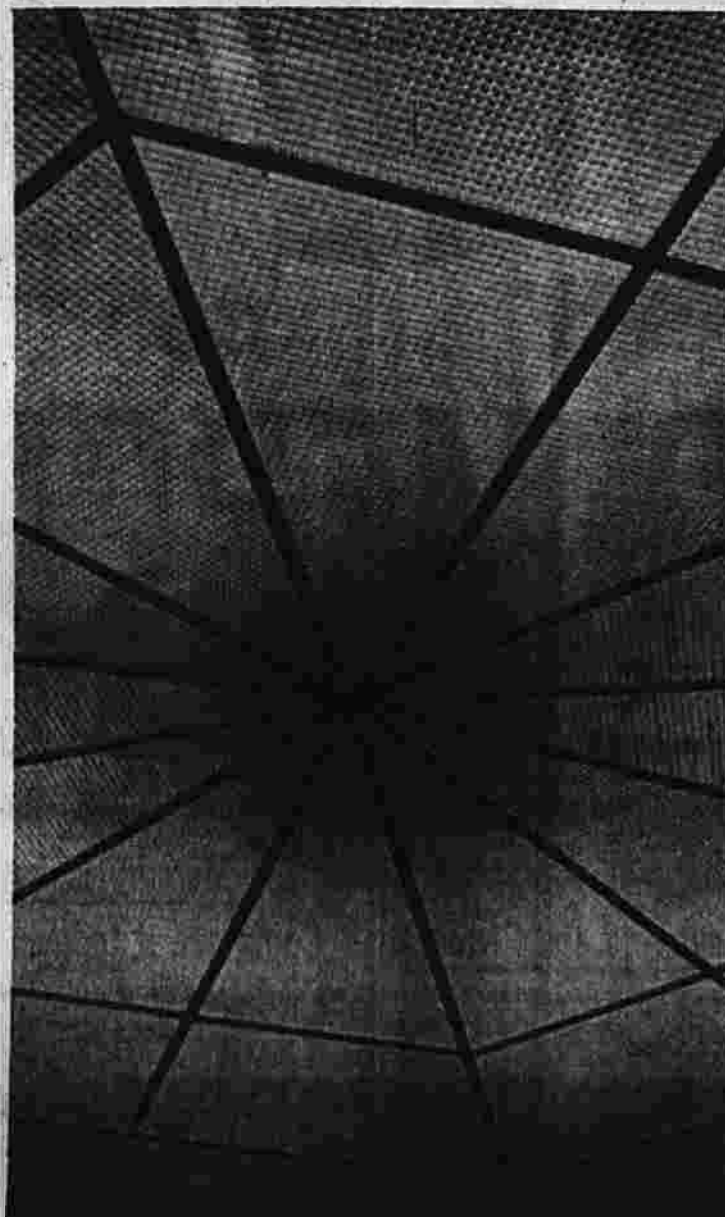

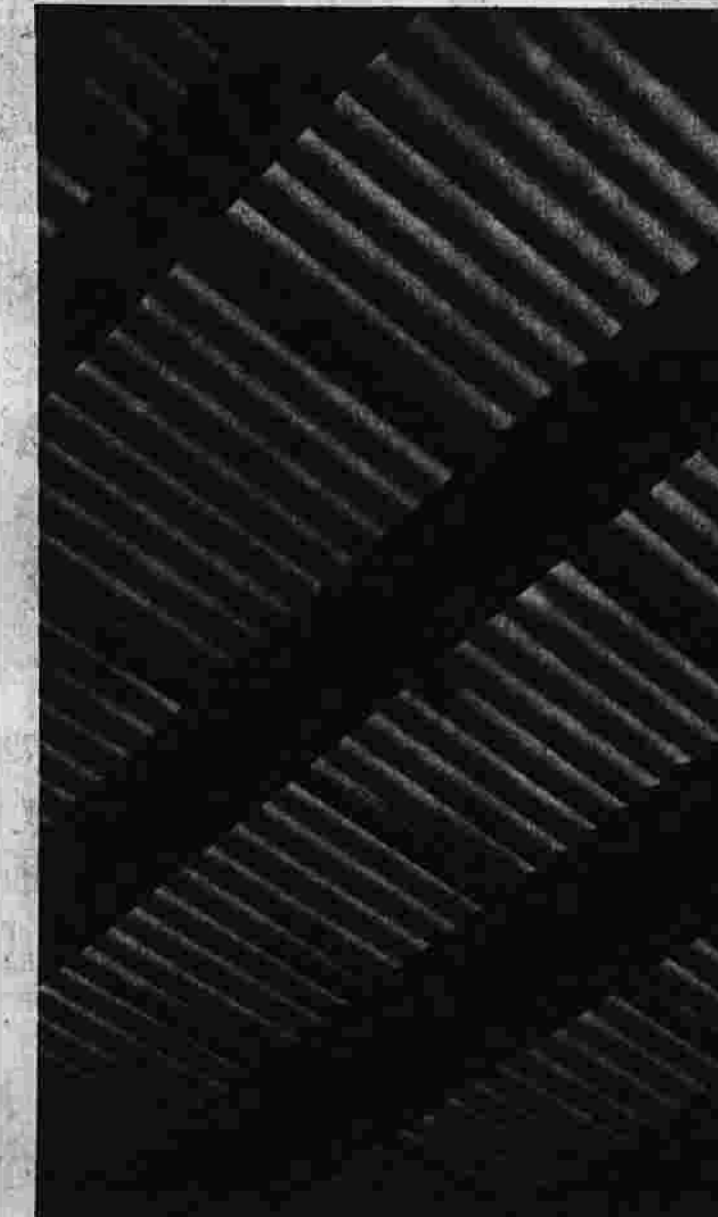

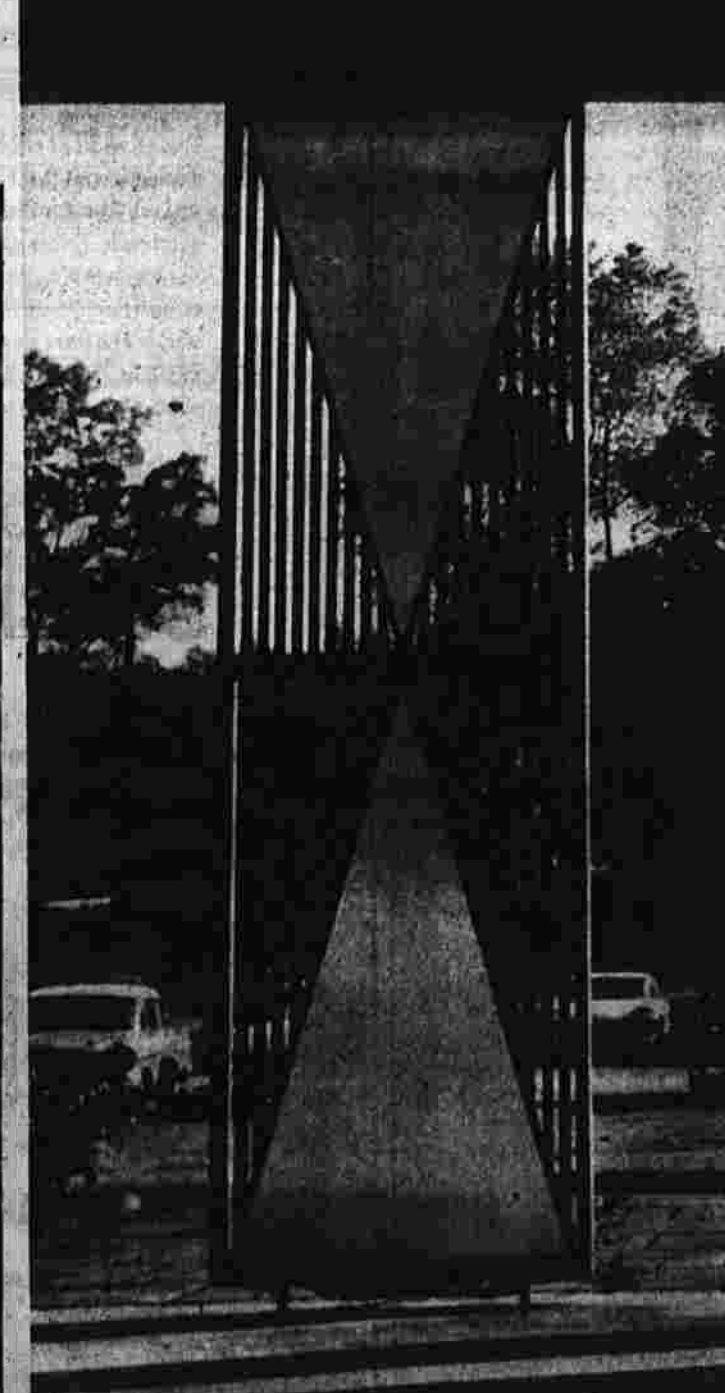
