

Adult Cold Treatment Doom't Fit Child's Needs By HAROLD T. HYMAN, M.D. Written for NEA Service In most households a routine for treatment of the common cold somehow gets established. So far as most family doctors are concerned, this is satisfactory. Few physicians find the adult with a

head cold a welcome visiter to their waiting rooms. Even fewer want to pay a home visit to the grownups with a common cold.

But all agree that it may be a grievous error to rely on home treatment for infant or youngster who seems to have nothing more than a "runny nose". more than a "runny nose." These are the reasons you ought to call your doctor to see the baby, the preschool youngster and the schoolboy or schoolgirl who has the sniftles:

What appears to be a mere head cold may be the earliest serious infection. like measles or poliomyelitis. At this stage the trained physician. It is next to impossible for the amateur. Delay in diagnosis deprives the pa-tient of early treatment when the most can be accomplished. It also favora household spread of the infection, which is most highly communicable in its favoration. communicable in its first stages. In babies and youngsters, the common cold rarely confines its damage to nose and throat. Almost

always, the area of inflamation spreads to involve sinuses, middle ears, bronchi, lungs and lymph giands. Before secondary bacterial invasion can occur in these delicate tissues, already damaged by the virus, effective doses or shots of penicillin and other "miracle druga" of similar action may pre-vent complications that would cer-tainly prolong the illness and per-haps threaten the life of the young The young child may suffer disastrous results if he is given the routine household treatment used for care of infected adults. For exriven to the mother or the cow an

ample, the baby may have become sensitized to penicillin previously xcreted in milk. Under these icillin may cause an attack of nives or asthma, or it could ever result in sudden death. Again, rapid absorption of a powerful drug that shrinks the nasal membrane when drops are put in the nose may produce convulsions or loss of consciousness. To be sure, these disasters could conceivably follow a course of treatment prescribed by your doctor. But they scribed by your doctor. At risk of sounding like a calamity howler, I must also caution you against putting oil drops in your baby's nose. Not infrelets the solution trickle down the back of the throat and collect in the tiny air sacs of the lungs. There they may remain and produce what is known as a lipoid pneumonia that may never clear up. Since these drops do little good, if they accomplish anything at all, they are best omitted from your treatment.

These are the positive suggestions I have for treatment of the common cold in infancy and child-hood:

Keep the worm coal and well were he solution trickle down t

Keep the room cool and well ven Reep the room cool and well ven-tilated.

Give the regular diet. If the child's appetite fails, tempt with party foods and drinks like ice cream, lollipops, cookies, carbon-ated beverages, custard, peanut butter sandwiches, sliced banana or candies. or candles.

Turn the child from side to side every half hour or so. Note whether the upper nostril clears without having to put in medicated drops. If this maneuver doesn't work, cautiously introduce one of the half-strength drops your doctor prescribes especially for your youngsters. Please don't stuff the twisted end of a handkerchief or a cotton applicator in your child's nostrils. You'll push more secretion back than you'll get out.

And don't, I beg you, cover the child's nose with a handkerchief or

tissue and urge him to "blow out the nasty germsy-wormsies." How-ever good your intentions, you may get him to introduce infecting or-ganisms in nasal sinuses or middle ear.

If your baby is feverish and uncomfortable and is too young to swallow a powdered aspirin tablet, your doctor will give you a prescription for a new liquid preparation that acts just like aspirin. Give the older child a half or a whole aspirin tablet but don't keep candy aspirins around the house. Many children make themselves sick when they help themselves to candy medication.

The Chicago Poison Control Center reported that most of their emergencies were caused by children who fliched what they thought to be a "piece of candy."

Finally, if your baby doesn't look right or the cold hangs on or a new symptom develops, don't practice false economy by trying to get a free telephone consultation. Ask your doctor to call.

If he's too busy to come to your home, bundle the child up and take him to the doctor's office or his hospital. hospital.

The trip won't do him any harm. but neglect of proper treatment may result in complications you'll never forgive yourself for.

Washington After seven years of concentrated research and ex-periments, the Interior Departperiments, the Interior Department's Office of Saline Water has high hopes of processing ocean water for less than \$1 per 1,000 gallons. The eventual goal is 30 to 50 cents per 1,000 gallons.

Scheduled for construction soon are five pilot plants that will make large-scale tests of several promising conversion methods, ranging from super-heating to freezing.

Three of the plants will be constructed on the Pacific, Atlafitic, and Guif coasts. The other two will be built inland to test the use of brackish water.
