Baby Sitter?

Young families in Silver Spring,

Maryland, have the answer

When we moved to Silver Spring, my husband and I were too busy arranging and rearranging furniture, planting our first vegetable garden, digging weeds and encouraging new grass, and becoming acquainted with our neighbors to think much of going out dancing, or to the movies, or visiting our city friends.

Gradually, however, the furniture was arranged to our liking, we reaped our small harvest of vegetables, the grass grew thicker and the weeds thinner, and we once again had the feeling we'd like to leave the children for a few hours at least and go out on the town, just the two of us.

Having so decided, we found ourselves facing a problem never encountered in the city. Here we were, in a spanking new house, with a spanking new baby boy, and every couple was just like us—too much like us. We couldn't find any grandmothers in the vicinity, and only two teen-agers, and they weren't much inter-

ested in baby-sitting.

We tried exchanging sittings with one or two of our neighbors. But to our disappointment this didn't work out too well—one would want to go out three nights a week or so, the other only once a month. Or there would be a neighborhood get-together, and everyone would want to go out, but no one would want

Then four of us hit upon an idea—why not form a cooperative baby-sitter's group where a pool of parents would undertake to sit for each other? We went around door-to-door, covering three blocks, passing out flyers we had made, asking anyone interested in such a venture to come to a meeting. To our amazement twenty women attended, and our co-operative was formed.

The club grew until we had to close the membership. Today, of the original four members only one remains, but the group is very active and all members are happy. Although the group was formed because of a scarcity of haby sitters, many mothers join to save money. Others feel more relaxed when they are out,

knowing that an experienced mother is in

Since forming our club, we have found that there is nothing very unusual about our situation or our solution. Parents in other places have had the same idea, and organized, so that when one couple wanted to go out, they could call on another parent to come in to sit with their children.

For those who may not be acquainted with the workings of a baby-sitters' cooperative, here is a list of the rules which have helped to make our club an efficient body:

Each member, selected in alphabetical order, will be secretary for a period of one-balf month.

 Upon request, the secretary will obtain a sitter from the list of members, calling first those owing the most hours. The sitter will then notify the person for whom the appointment was made.

3. The secretary will balance the books each half month.

 Within one or two days after the sitting, the sitter will inform the secretary as to the number of hours she stayed.

 For daytime care the children will be brought to the sitter's house. One child counts as single time; two or more children count as double time. Daytime sitting is voluntary.

 Double time is counted after 12 midnight on weekdays and Sundays, and after 1 a.m. on Fridays and Saturdays.

7. If a sitter is engaged for a certain hour, time is counted from that hour, even when the parent is late picking the sitter up.

8. Subject to "employer's" approval, husbands may be sitters.

 Double time must be counted if a sitter is required to care for two families at the same time.

 Any sitting done before 7 p.m. is considered daytime sitting.

11. If a member refuses to sit when she has no other engagements, the club can ask that member to leave the group. Persons violating the rules of the club will be dropped unless able to show good reason for such action.

12. Sitter is to be picked up and taken home.

12. Sitter is to be picked up and taken home.

13. "Employers" must leave a doctor's number and the telephone number at which they can be reached.

14. Holiday sitting is not compulsory,
15. Members are required either to use the
service or sit twice a month—i.e., must use the

club twice each month.

16. For an evening sitting, children should be in the house and ready for bed. Members should not expect to get a sitter when the children are sick.

-17. The most time which can be owed or collected is 15 hours. After this limit, one must sit or use the service before owing or accumulating more hours.

18. Members resigning from the club are asked to pay 50 cents per hour for time owed or to serve the time before leaving.

19. Members who are temporarily unable to serve or require service can become inactive for a period not to exceed 3 months. A member who needs to use the club during this time may use up to 18 hours. This rule applies in pregnancy, sickness, and deaths.

20. Members should not make sitting arrangements without the knowledge of the club's secretary.

21. Meetings will be held every six months on the last Monday of the month. The 12 secretaries of the period will act as hostesses.

22. Membership is limited to 30.

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

In our family we open the presents one at time so that all eight of us can share the joy of each recipient. And I have noted the extra sparkle in little Lisa's eyes when Mother or Father opens a package prepared by her.

And so with the other children. Oh, they like
to get gifts. Their little fingers fumble feverishly in untying the knots, and they squeal with delight at what they discover. But they stop, look, and listen when others open the gifts they have given.

TRICH Fromm says that a child does not really learn what love is until he is about eight years old. Up to that time he receives the love of others, but at about that age he awakens to the joy of giving to others. If Fromm is right, then Christmas is the ideal setting for the birth of love in a child's heart.

After the gifts have been distributed, I want some fun. Yes, and some feasting. The feasting need not be extravagant, and the fun should not be artificial. To sit as a group while a Christmas story is read (and for me Dickens' "Christmas Carol" never loses its appeal); perhaps to play one of the new games which comes from under the Christmas tree; to sing again a few carols; to hear the students home from school recount some experiences; to read Christmas cards from friends who remember us; and most of all, to look at one another until we really see each other (which the little girl in Thornton Wilder's "Our Town" said we never do)-these are some of the things which make the Christmas I want.

The story of Bethlehem calls us back to the simple essentials of life-the beauty and wonder of childhood, the tender love of parents, the adoration of the humble, and the humility of the wise. Let us not lose the essence of Bethlehem in the froth of our modern Babels.



A Garland

WE ARE old-fashioned in our village.
I tell you this in the strictest confidence; we do not admit it to ourselves. Do our roofs not blossom with television aerials, our kitchens with mechanical dishwashers? Do we not read the most recent books, even when we dislike them, and in our medicine cabinet store the stylish panaceas of the season? Our addiction to large families and infrequent divorces we consider merely tokens that we are shead of, not behind, the fashion. We discuss the current ideologies, we speak knowingly of child psychology, we have seen the newest oddity by Samuel Beckett and the latest show of Toulouse-Lautrec. Our attitudes are modern, and we share the modern faults of haste and sentimentality. It is our virtues that are old-fashioned.

For here we love our neighbor. What is more, we are reactionary enough not to love him impersonally. To us he is not mankind, but man; and our affection warms us both.

Now kindness is a virtue neither modern nor urban. One almost unlearns it in a city. Towns have their own beatitude; they are not unfriendly; they offer a vast and solacing anonymity or an equally vast and solacing gregariousness. But one needs a neighbor on whom to, practice compassion. It has taken me many years to emerge from the selfcentered cocoon which the city had wound about me, and even now I offer small benefactions with a sort of shyness and am as shy to accept them. So I am constantly being surprised by the matter-of-fact, everyday kindness with which my friends seem overn

Is it the same in other villages? names of at least half the population? I know it does not flourish well in country places, there being withered by the twin blights of spite and curiosity.

TODAY has been one of the days for counting blessings. Yesterday our village shared with the rest of the Eastern seaboard a storm of spectacular fury. Other communities were treated worse, by newspaper accounts, but we did not escape. We all lost a tree or two (and we are proud of our trees), the shingles of our roofs went flying; worse, the electricity failed and that meant, of course, no light, no heat, no current for the freezer or the laundry or the radio, or, in many cases, the important stove. There were floods in cellars, lost gardens. But nobody was hurt, nobody minded very much, and nobody I know of went to hotels or Red Cross centers to sit out the debacle. They went to one another's houses, quite as a matter of course. Those of us who had heat took in those without and did not expect gratitude. We helped one another push fallen maples away from walls and hedges. We made enormous quantities of coffee and sandwiches, and we tucked other people's babies away in the nursery with our own. I have just returned from a walk down the street. My neighbor to the left, whose current had returned, was giving lunch to seven children besides her own, all of different ages and degrees of overstimulation. She planned on keeping them for a day or two since at their respective homes there would be no furnaces running for another twenty-four hours. The neighbor to my right was storing in her deep-freeze container the contents of someone else's freezer and inviting everybody to stay for dinner. Farther down three male

neighbors were helping a householder

patch his roof until the arrival of the uncertain carpenter.

Now all those were kind actions, but not unusual for any community when the excitement of an emergency bubbles in the veins like champagne. What astonishes me in our village is that we continue to be kind when the intoxication passes. We have not acquired the fear of being repulsed, which is the modern snobbery. We love our neighbor on small occasions as well as large. We visit the sick, we comfort the afflicted, but we are also benevolent toward those whose fortune is as good as ours, or better, so that we win the grace of doing good without condescension. Even the well-to-do are included in our affection. We lend our cara; we admire one another's gardens without malice; we listen with honest delight to the returned traveler in whose journey we could not afford to join; we tend one another's children, run one another's errands, turn taxi driver or nurse or dog-walker or caterer at our neighbor's signal. We are usually very busy people and therefore capable of accomplishing extra tasks. It is the leisured, I have noticed, who rebel the most at an interruption of routine.


HAVE nearly forgotten the city ways. Tell me, you people in towns, when your neighbors go shopping of a morning, do they call you first to see if you have an errand that needs doing? If they find a bargain of unusual brilliance, do they fetch it home for you, offering to return the trophy if you have no use for it? When you are ill and maidless, do they send a dinner for the family, complete to chicken and lemon pie? Mine do. The one benefaction they withhold is advice. I know a charming lady who after a number of years of married life here is now separated from her husband. She is still part of the circle as she always was, for we do not believe we must go in pairs, like the animals in the Ark. But we do not know why the separation occurred, and we have never inquired, considering that the simplest sort of kindness.

When you go away on a short holiday, what do you do with your children? Hire a strange nursemaid if the ménage does not already include one? We are apt to drop them off casually with friendsthere is always room. I know a couple with five descendants all under twelve who went to Key West for three weeks on their first vacation together in years. For this event they did engage a supposedly capable woman, paying her a king's ransom. Some days before they were expected back, the woman announced to the family across the street that she wasn't feeling so well and thought she'd have to leave, Did the family across the street-young, with four children of their own packed away in eight rooms-have the kindness to wire the couple at once? Certainly not. They invited the entire tribe of five to stay with them so that the vacation could proceed.

Once when my husband was delayed on a rainy night and I could not meet him, the driver carried him to our door, two blocks off the route. Surely we did not harbor here an adult mind so twisted and vindictive as to consider the outrage a patriotic act! The news shocked me into nausea. Hate, the kind of hate that darkened Europe, seemed to be casting its shadow on our own people. But, true to my city training, shock merely numbed me. I thought of atonement in terms of letters to the papers; my neighbors protested less and did more. By evening the garden had been replanted. There were no public statements, no petitions, no paid protests. Simply, people with gardens of their own came hurrying spontaneously to the rescue with plants, with seedlings, with spades for digging and stakes to drive into the ground. By an act of common love we wiped out our uncom-

On, this is no Eden. We have our bores and our braggarts, our snobs and our slanderers. But I believe the scales, if there were scales to measure human nature, would tip heavily in the right direction. Kindness has become a way of life most of us attempt. We do not try to legislate our neighbor. And when we cannot love him, we at least can like him well enough.

I sat three summers before last in a church crowded to the final aisles. It was seven-thirty of a weekday morning, but a third of the village was there. The polio epidemic had struck at a young neighbor of ours and her three-month-old baby; we had come to pray for them. I still recall the emotion of the moment. A few phone calls had been made the night before, a few messages passed. And here we were—the lazy, the beset, the late risers-the men on the way to the 8:02, the women with children still asleep at home. I doubt that we were all stout was the only gift left to offer.
