Big Third Quarter Gives Indians 48-20 Win over Central

Keish, White, Pat Mistretta Score Heavily

Breaking a tight game wide open with 17 points in the third quarter, undefeated Manchester Central won over Bristol Central, 48-20, before 1,400 fans at the Arena last night. The Indians' last night remained tied for first place in the OGLU with three straight wins.

Whereas in their first two games the Indians showed plenty of hustle, last night apparently were confident they were going to win. They held only two points, 17-15, edge at the half, but then they got off to a very slow start, failing to score until almost midway through the first period with Central holding a 3-0 lead. It was not until three minutes remaining in the quarter that Manchester was able to tie up the game at 3-3 on Dave White's free throw. Then with just two minutes to go in the quarter, Mike Redon put the Indians out in front for the first time, 11-3, with a one-handed shot from the outside.

For the second time in a row, Rockville's only senior, and best rebounder, Jimmy Kidney, fouled out in the final quarter, and the remainder of the players could not cope with Windsor's late surge. Windsor's Don Laffiere led all scorers with 11 points in the final period and last to Windsor's 48-20 in a Central Valley B League game at Windsor before 1,400 fans at the Arena last night.

The second period was especially lean on scoring. Windsor led 11-3 at the end of the first period and took a slim lead, but both teams played a cautious game, drawing a foul and with both teams on the sidelines watching, he sank both shots to give the Indians a 17-15 halftime edge. Only six points were scored by the team in the second period.

Evidently, Coach Edgin Saturday had a few halftime words for his boys about their lack of hustle in the first half, as when they got back on the floor in the third quarter, they began to click and quickly enlarged their lead. White and Keish sparked the Indians with six and five points respectively. The latter scored a 20-point spurt. Central completely fell apart in this period, only scoring five points.

The final quarter was only a formality, with Manchester leading 48-20. Saturday used his less experienced players for most of the final eight minutes, and they had no trouble containing Bristol. The visitors were hurt from the quarter when two of their starters, Dave Santon and Ed Loo, were fouled out. Pat Mistretta and the Red and White offense with seven points in the final period.

Manchester took scoring honors for the game with 14, while White had 11, including seven out of 11 free throws. Windsor's Don Laffiere was third with 10 points. Notably absent from the scoring column was Central's star, Ed Keish, who was held to two free throws. Bristol's Mike Redon had a close watch on him throughout.

"No more Scott," said Manuel Alfaro, Paret's manager. "Benny beat the No. 1 one, that's enough. We want Jordan, that fight is for us, or maybe it's for the other contender."

Rematch likely. Matchmaker Freddie Fox said he would try to get him Jordan. Scott, meanwhile, is looking for a fight with the Argentine champion who knocked out the welterweight champion, recently. A return bout with Scott, despite what Alfaro said, probably is the most likely to happen.

'Rudolph' Discovered By Marks in 1949

By PAUL GERARD
It is a well-known fact that many famous actors because of their association with particular roles have been permanently typed. Typing of song-writers, however, was never so clearly demonstrated as when Johnny Marks discovered "Rudolph, the Red-Nosed Reindeer" ten years ago.

Despite the fact that he had been an active song-writer since 1935, he has been clearly typed as a writer and publisher of Christmas music. He could aptly be called "The Mr. Christmas of the Music World." He is generally recognized as the outstanding writer of Christmas songs in this

country. To quote the Associated Press: "He is as identified with Christmas songs as Stephen Foster is with sentimental ballads of the Old South."

Other Hits
Prior to "Rudolph," he had written some 75 published songs, and, as he puts it, "750 as yet unpublished. Among his hits, other than Christmas songs, have been "Address Unknown," with the Ink Spots; "Who Calls," with Bing Crosby; "She'll Always Remember," with Glen Miller, and "Don't Cross Your Fingers, Cross Your Heart," with Sammy Kaye. In 1949, Song Hits Magazine selected him as song-writer of the year.

"Two years ago, I made up my mind definitely I would never write another Christmas song," he recalled.

"As I sat talking to Johnny, I became more and more aware of the fact that he is a great artist. Not a commercialist wrapped up in a small world of profits, but an artist acutely aware of the world about him. Because of this, his wish still has not come to pass. While reading some poems by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, he came across one called, "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day."

"Its semi-religious theme, the victory over despair haunted me," Johnny said, for he broods about the way the world is going. He put the words to music, and the result: A recording by Bing Crosby which received worldwide acceptance.

This consciousness of the tremendous importance of spreading the message of peace on earth, good will toward men, which is the true Christmas message, resulted in another song which Johnny has written for this season—"A Merry Christmas" (Joyeux Noel, Buon Natale, Feliz Navidad), a song which expresses the universal Christmas greeting in many languages.

A truly great talent such as Johnny's will not be denied. He may never break away from this close identity with Christmas Music, but his ability as a writer of other songs will again make itself known.

Of course, Johnny is quick to re-



mark, "Don't ever think I am not grateful for the success 'Rudolph' has brought me." Marks entered the song publishing business with his own "Rudolph." In 1949, he organized the St. Nicholas Music Inc. to publish his own as well as other songs. The company has since gained a reputation as the foremost publisher of Christmas music. In addition to "Rudolph, the Red-Nosed Reindeer," "A Merry, Merry Christmas," "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day," Johnny has written and published "The Night Before Christmas Song," "When Santa Claus Gets Your Letter," "Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree," and "Everyone's a Child at Christmas."

In the United States alone there are more than 200 single records and albums containing his Christmas songs this season.

In 1950, Marks compiled and edited the "Christmas Community" lyric book. This has become a perennial Christmas seller and sold more than a million copies. To go with this, he published the "Christmas Community Song Book" with

his original simplified method of piano arrangements. All this as a result of "Rudolph's" red nose so often mistaken for intemperance instead of a sign of distinction which brought "Rudolph" out of obscurity and into the light of fame he so well deserved. Then one foggy Christmas Eve, Santa came to say: "Rudolph with your nose so bright, won't you guide my sleigh tonight?" Thus began the rise to fame of Johnny Marks' prodigy, "Rudolph" and Johnny Marks himself.

22,000,000 Copies

The phenomenal success of "Rudolph" is evidenced by the record of his vast acceptance. On this tenth anniversary of the original Gene Autry recording of "Rudolph, the Red-Nosed Reindeer," which alone sold over 3,000,000 copies, there has been over 170 records of the song made by virtually every important recording artist. To this date a total of over 22,000,000 records have been sold. "Rudolph" has been published in 75 different arrangements, for orchestra, chorals, bands and for every musical in-

strument in use. It has been translated into countless languages, with success in other countries equal to that in the United States. It is featured in a Technicolor film shown yearly here and abroad. It is doubtful that any song has attained the worldwide popularity of "Rudolph, the Red-Nosed Reindeer."

As I sat in Marks' office, located on Broadway, in the heart of the world famous theater district, and was astounded by this account of "Rudolph's" success, Johnny Marks said, "Let me show you just how far Rudolph has really gone—from one end of the world to the other."

He chose two records from a stack of recordings; one was Arthur Fiedler and the Boston Pops Christmas Party; the other, Les Brown's Plays Santa Claus. The Arthur Fiedler record included a beautifully-orchestrated arrangement of "Rudolph"; Ira
