Israelis, Syrians Fight Air, Ground Battles on Border

Damascus, Syria, Feb. 1 (AP)—Four Arab fighter planes today shot down one Israeli Super-Mystere jet and damaged another in a battle over the southwestern sector of the Syrian-Israeli frontier, a spokesman for the United Arab Republic's First Army claimed.

He said four Israeli Super-Mystere penetrated Syrian air space but were driven off.

Tel Aviv, Israel, Feb. 1 (AP)—Israel and Syrian forces fought today in ground and air battles. Tension mounted along the border as the shooting continued for the fourth straight day.

Three Israeli and two Syrian soldiers were killed in a 4-hour pre-dawn artillery duel on the southern shore of the Sea of Galilee. Seven Israelis and four Syrians were wounded.

Israel also reported that one Israeli policeman was killed and two wounded by Syrian shots yesterday.

An army spokesman said two Israeli fighter planes drove away four Syrian MIG jets after a dogfight over Metuliah, close to the border in northern Galilee. There were no casualties reported.

The Israeli cabinet met this morning to discuss the border flareups with the army chief of staff, Maj. Gen. Chaim Laskov.

The Syrian press in Damascus charged Israel with an all-out showdown battle to "settle pending accounts."

Israeli sappers during the night moved into the Arab village of Gattaf in the demilitarized zone between the two countries, and blew up 50 houses the Syrians had vacated. The Israelis claimed the United Arab Republic's army had fortified the village and was using it as a base for firing into Israeli territory in the last few days.

After the Israeli advance into the village, an artillery duel developed and lasted for four hours.

Sen. Kennedy Ponders Race In California

Washington, Feb. 1 (AP)—Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) has told friends he will decide by mid-March whether to oppose Gov. Edmund G. (Pat) Brown in the June 7 California Democratic primary.

A weekend development in Wisconsin could help influence his decision on such a politically daring move.

Brown wants to head his state's 81-vote delegation to the Los Angeles party convention and be able to shop around among the candidates during the balloting there. He has told presidential hopefuls he would stay out of the California primary.

A Kennedy decision to go into California would be regarded generally as an indication the Massachusetts senator feels that would be about the only way he could break up the bloc of big-vote states still holding out against his candidacy.

His entry certainly would draw Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.) into the contest. But there is no indication that Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.), Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo.) or Adlai E. Stevenson would permit delegate allies to be pulled up for them.

The risk, then, would be that if Brown won, neither Kennedy or Humphrey would be likely to count on California's convention votes. A big-state combine would be almost certain to nullify them in the convention voting.

Kennedy's decision obviously will be affected by the course of campaigning in the April 5 Wisconsin primary, but requirements

Milford, Feb. 1 (AP)—A sailor asleep in the front seat of an auto was injured fatally today when he fell out of the moving car and struck his head on the pavement.

Algiers Rebels Yield To De Gaulle Forces

300 March From Last Barricade

Paris, Feb. 1 (AP)—The French cabinet decided today to call parliament into an emergency session tomorrow to approve special powers for the government in the wake of the Algerian insurrection. There was no immediate indication of what special powers the government wants.

But a cabinet spokesman, referring to the Algerian insurgents, said "Justice will be served."

Algiers, Feb. 1 (AP)—The eight day colonial revolt in Algiers collapsed today.

The insurgent irregulars who rescued French President Charles de Gaulle's policy of self-determination for Algeria, surrendered their downtown barricades to an overwhelming display of army strength.

The Algiers Corps commander, Gen. Jean Crepin, announced that insurgent leader Pierre Lagailarde was "in the hands of the authorities" and that insurgent political chief Jean Joseph Ortis was in flight.

The insurgent band itself will be sent into the fight against the Nationalist Algerian rebels, Crepin said.

The fiery Lagailarde was given a military salute as he marched out of the barricades followed by a haggard band of some 300 irregular troops.

The rebel remnant climbed into trucks parked near the barricades. The trucks headed in the direction of a little village west of Algiers.

Sweet Daddy Grace Left \$5 Million Back Tax Bill

Washington, Feb. 1 (AP)—The Internal Revenue Service announced today it is claiming that nearly \$5 million in back taxes and assessments were owed by Charles M. (Sweet Daddy) Grace.

Liens were filed against properties which the Negro evangelist owned in 15 states and the District of Columbia.

Grace, founder of the "House of Prayer for All People" with a claimed following of three million, died in Los Angeles Jan. 12.

IRS said it is filing the liens to protect its claim that Daddy Grace owed taxes for the years 1945 through 1956. The precise claim is \$3,965,000.

Liens were filed in Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Connecticut, New York, Massachusetts, Ohio, New Jersey, Florida and Michigan.

No other details on the action were immediately available.

Messiah in New Bedford, Mass., a Boston attorney said he is investigating reports that \$80,000 which Grace had on his person disappeared at the time of his death.

The tax claim is one of the highest ever filed against the estate of an individual.

The biggest claims for a single year is \$31,067 for 1953, the smallest, \$108,914 for 1948.

The action has the effect of freezing the estate to keep it intact pending litigation on the tax claim.

Atty. Roy F. Teizera said this is one of many financial tangles involving the evangelist.

The value of the Evangelist's estate has been estimated at up to \$25 million, most of it in gifts from his three million followers in 350 churches and 60 cities.

Bishop Grace had homes in New Bedford, New Haven, Conn., Montclair, N.J., Philadelphia, Pa., Trenton, N.J., New York, Va., Charlotte, N.C., and other cities.

Second Russian Rocket Hits Target Area in Mid-Pacific

Moscow, Feb. 1 (AP)—The Soviet Union fired off a second powerful rocket yesterday, hitting the target area in the Pacific and ending the current tests, Tass announced today.

The official news agency said the 44,000 square miles of the mid-Pacific marked off by the Soviet Union Jan. 5 once more is open to planes and shipping.

The first rocket was fired Jan. 20. Moscow announced that it landed little more than a mile off target. The announcement of the second shot did not specify how close it came to the actual target.

The announcement did not give the distance the rocket traveled yesterday. It calculated the first rocket covered a distance of 7,760 miles and missed the target by only 124 miles. (The second rocket presumably was launched from the same site, believed to be in the Caspian Sea area).

The announcement said the latest firing completed the test of the rocket intended to launch heavy Earth Satellites and make space flights to planets of the solar system.

The rocket announcement was made as the top Communist leader

gathered in Moscow for a top-level meeting.

Just as with the rocket to the moon, fired on the eve of Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's trip to the United States, this launching again showed Soviet ability to conduct its tests with the maximum political advantage.

The announcement was made in an special broadcast which broke into a regular radio program here shortly after 7:30 p.m. Moscow time (9:30 a.m. EST).

It was followed by triumphal fanfares on trumpets and the playing of stirring band marches.

Tass said the rocket was launched at 7:58 p.m. Moscow time yesterday.

"The rocket's next-to-last stage with a dummy last stage reached the target area in the Pacific," Tass said.

"The dummy last stage of the rocket was visible while it flew through the atmosphere and its fall was registered by ships' radar, optical and acoustic stations."

The agency report said measurements confirmed "the high precision of rocket flight guidance."

Apparently, Soviet scientists were satisfied with what they learned because the big Pacific target area about 1,000 miles southwest of Hawaii is being reopened two weeks sooner than expected.

The original announcement said tests were planned in the Pacific between Jan. 15 and Feb. 15 and ships and planes should stay out of the area during that period.

Nine Crawl Out, 10 Rescued, 18 Trapped, 25 Killed In Japan Mine Blast

Tokyo, Feb. 1 (AP)—Rescue workers reported finding the bodies of 25 miners after a gas explosion early today in an ill-fated coal mine in north Japan.

Eighteen other men were trapped 3,600 feet below the frozen earth. Officials of the mine said they still hoped the men would be found alive, but as the hours went by, fear for them increased.

Nine other men crawled to safety after the first searing blast, and rescuers brought out 10 miners despite a fire licking around the pit where the men were trapped. Only one of the 19 was seriously injured.

The flames burned for nearly four hours, then were checked.

One of the miners said his group of seven survivors "roamed many hours, walking on smouldering coal, narrowly escaping continual cave-ins."

"We were quite a distance from No. 2 pit where the explosion took place," said Yoshikazu Saito, 39, an engineer. "We did not hear the detonation and discovered the accident after observing smoke coming into the gallery. The coal and the wooden pillars and ties were soon afire."

Saito said he and six other men went out of the gallery and started walking.

"The trek was hard and hazardous," Saito said. "The coal was beginning to burn everywhere. Caves-ins occurred one after another, blocking our way."

"We discovered a man who had collapsed on our way and carried him on a litter. We continued working for four hours until we got lost."

The group then entered what appeared to be safe gallery and sat down.

"We had almost given up hope. Eight and a half hours after we left our post, a rescue party reached us," Saito said.

It was the second major disaster at the mine, at Yubari, in the northern Japanese island of Hokkaido. A gas explosion killed 160 men there in 1958. The mine is one of the richest owned by the Hokkaido Colliery and Steamship Co. More than 500 men, women and children surged around the mine entrance, waiting tensely for news from below. A cry went up as each survivor came to the surface.

The Yubari mine area was white with a recent snowfall. Waiting friends and relatives were bundled against the piercing cold.

Portland, Ore., Feb. 1 (AP)—Two street newspaper trucks which hauled for Portland's two struck daily newspapers—were blown up late last night in Portland and nearby Oregon City.

The trucks were used to blow up the four trucks here, police said. It apparently was the same case, they said, with the six trucks blasted in Oregon City.

The explosions, which occurred at a warehouse in the heavily industrialized northwest section of the city.

A police demolition squad rushed the trucks from an unexploded charge of dynamite on the floor of the cab of one truck. Its fuse had gone out.

SYNAGOGUE DEFILERS HELD
Norfolk, Feb. 1 (AP)—Police today arrested two 22-year-old youths in connection with the four swastikas found painted on the Beth Israel Synagogue in South Norfolk. The arrested youths were identified as Harold Fahy and William Arnold, both of (Woodland Road) Norfolk. Police said Arnold was a native of Hamburg, Germany, who came to this country six years ago. Both were charged with breach of peace, injury to a building and conspiracy. They were held under \$2,000 bond each.

NAZI YOUTHS SUSPENDED
Kansas City, Feb. 1 (AP)—Thirteen youths were ordered suspended from school today in the wake of a synagogue bombing investigation that disclosed the boys were members of neo-Nazi clubs in their high schools. School Supt. James Hazlett, in announcing the suspensions, said the action had nothing to do with whether the youths were involved in the bombing or in painting swastikas on four other synagogues, but only because of their memberships in the secret organizations. Nine of the students attend Lincoln High School and four attend East High School.

K. OF C. STRIKE ENDS
New Haven, Feb. 3—Striking employees of the Supreme Headquarters of the Knights of Columbus today ratified a new contract that ended a 92-day walkout. The vote was 264-51. The workers also agreed to return to their jobs immediately. As soon as the results were announced in the Hotel Garden, where the vote was counted, members of the union crossed the street to the headquarters building and returned to their jobs.

29 Oil Firms Face Charges Of Price Fixing

Tulsa, Okla., Feb. 1 (AP)—The government launches its courtroom fight against 29 major oil firms today. They face criminal charges which violated federal anti-trust laws by conspiring to regulate oil and gasoline prices.

Presiding over the non-jury hearing is Judge Royce H. Savage of Oklahoma's northern federal judicial district.

Attorneys began moving into Tulsa last week to prepare for what is described as the biggest trial in the history of the city that calls itself the oil capital of the world.

For the government there are five attorneys from the U.S. Justice Department's Anti-Trust Division in Washington, with help from U.S. Atty. Robert S. Ritzley of Tulsa.

Heading the prosecution team is Joseph E. McDowell, 47, veteran of the department's anti-trust division. He led the investigation which resulted in indictments returned against the firms by a federal grand jury at Alexandria, Va., in 1958.

About 90 attorneys are lined up on the defense side although not more than six lawyers are listed for any single defendant.

The oil firms—10 of them with individual assets in the billion dollar bracket—are accused of conspiring to "raise, fix and regulate" the price they paid for crude oil and got for gasoline through January 1957, a period that covers the Suez Canal crisis when flow of most oil shipments from the Middle East was halted.

435 Held Dead In South Africa Mine Disaster

Coalbrook, South Africa, Feb. 1 (AP)—The South African Broadcasting Corp. said today all 435 miners trapped for 11 days in the Cleyda colliery have been given up for dead.

The Broadcasting observed one minute's silence after the announcement.

An official statement from the manning said, however, it was "urgently considering what further steps can be taken."

The disaster, worst in South African mining history, occurred Jan. 21, when 429 Africans and six whites were trapped more than 500 feet below ground by a massive rock fall.

Working day and night in a desperate effort to reach the miners, drillers drove a hole 540 feet deep but missed the shaft where the men were entombed.

The drillers had counted on reaching the shaft at 315 feet. Failure to break through into it heightened fears that the chamber in which the men were working was filled by the rock fall. Men working the drills on the surface reported feeling a strong tremor on Saturday.

The holes were being bored to lower a microphone of high sensitivity to find out whether there were any survivors and to send down air and food, if any were alive.

The sinking of an emergency shaft to get out any survivors would take another two or three weeks.

Swastikas Found In South Norwalk

Norwalk, Feb. 1 (AP)—A swastika found painted on the Beth Israel Synagogue in South Norwalk today. Three others were painted on the sidewalk in front of the Jewish house of worship.

The destruction was the latest in an outbreak of anti-Semitism in Connecticut within the last week.

A Bridgeport synagogue was defaced Saturday and a Jewish center in West Haven, last Thursday.

Norwalk Police Chief Max Orsina called the incident a "most outrageous desecration."

Orsina ordered a full investigation.

Meanwhile, in Bridgeport, extra police kept an eye on Jewish

Reds Inviting Disaster In Attack on U.S.: Gates

Washington, Feb. 1 (AP)—Secretary of Defense Thomas S. Gates Jr. said today the Soviet Union "would simply be inviting his (SIC) own destruction" if it attacked this country.

Although the Russians are expected to have "a moderate numerical superiority" in missiles during the next three years, this advantage will fall "far short of providing rational support for a decision to attack," the United States, Gates told a Senate Appropriations subcommittee.

The Defense Secretary testified at the opening of hearings on the administration's \$39,535,000,000 defense appropriation bill.

Gates devoted a considerable part of a prepared statement to the possibility of a "deterrence gap" in the next few years between American missile capability and Russian.

"This is a subject that has been much in debate. Democrats in Congress have centered criticism on what they term the administration's willingness to take undue risks in this area."

Gates said Soviet superiority in missile numbers "appears to peak during the 1962 period."

"Our estimates indicate that both before and after mid-1962 our numbers are closer together," he said.

But the United States has a wide range of deterrent power with other weapons than missiles, Gates stressed, adding:

"Because of the versatility and strength of our over-all retaliatory capability, the numerical advantage that the Soviet Union may attain in long-range missiles, which is likely to be greatest in 1962, will not produce a gap in our deterrent power."

"This is not my view only; it is the view of our principal military and scientific advisers."

Gates said one B52 bomber on target "could deliver the destructive potential of several ICBMs, and with greater accuracy," but added that the bomber is much easier to intercept.

The Secretary said the safety of the U.S. bomber force could be enhanced by a round-the-clock airborne alert, and that funds were in the budget to develop such a capability.

"We are not now operating an airborne alert of any significance
