A series of filmed Shakespearean plays will be shown at the State Theater on Tuesdays, beginning May 3. Like the winter series of opera movies, this one promises to be a stimulating experience. The first movie will be the prize-winning "Romeo and Juliet," which was produced by Laurence Harvey and Susan Shantz. This is the production that won rave notices both in this country and in Europe, not only for the quality of the acting, but for special photographic effects.

Laurence Harvey is the actor who was nominated for an Academy Award for his performance in "Room at the Top." The movie will have a prologue by Sir John Gielgud, and music provided by the London Symphony Orchestra.

"Richard III," with Laurence Olivier, will be the second movie, May 10. This also was highly acclaimed when it was made several years ago. John Gielgud shares the honors with Olivier, along with Pamela Brown, Ralph Richardson, Claire Bloom and Sir Cedric Hardwicke.

Muir Matheson will conduct the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra. The third and last movie in the series will be "Henry V," with Laurence Olivier, May 17.

With Olivier will be the Old Vic Co., including Robert Newton, Leslie Banks, Leo Genn and Felix Aylmer. The London Symphony Orchestra will accompany the performance.

All the movies will start at 8:30 p.m. and will be in technicolor. Re-run tickets are \$2. Single performances are \$1. Special student tickets may be obtained through the schools.

"Coming Up in Manchester" "A Touch of Larceny" opens Thursday at the State Theater with James Mason and Vera Miles. With it is "The Last Voyage" with Robert Stack, George Sanders and Dorothy Malone.

"As Time Goes By" is set for Friday and Saturday in the high school auditorium at 8 p.m. The review will include comedy, fashion and song and dance entertainment.

"The Goodwives" will be performed by the Gilbert and Sullivan Workshop Friday and Saturday, April 29 and 30, in the high school auditorium at 8:15 p.m. Prizes to be awarded.

Second prize in the Intercollegiate Area Art Exhibition of Lehigh University went to Robert G. Olmsted, 35 Connecticut Rd. The \$25 award was for an oil painting, "One June Death". 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Sheinwold on Bridge

It pays to bid aggressively. This is really just a polite way of saying that it pays to bid for more tricks than you think you can make. There's not much question about what West would actually lead in any but the most expert game. The average West player would lead a spade.

As dealer, you hold: Spades—K Q J 10 9 8 7 6 5 4 3 2. Hearts—A K J 10 9 8 7 6 5 4 3 2. Diamonds—A K J 10 9 8 7 6 5 4 3 2. Clubs—A K J 10 9 8 7 6 5 4 3 2. Opening lead—4♠.

Conclusion that a spade lead will merely find, he will see at once that the club suit is the best chance. This lead will hold South to eight tricks.

If you opponents are skillful enough to make such leads, you must bid conservatively. But if your opponents are just average good players you can well afford to bid close or doubtful games.

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Board to Fix Taxes May 2; Hearing Set

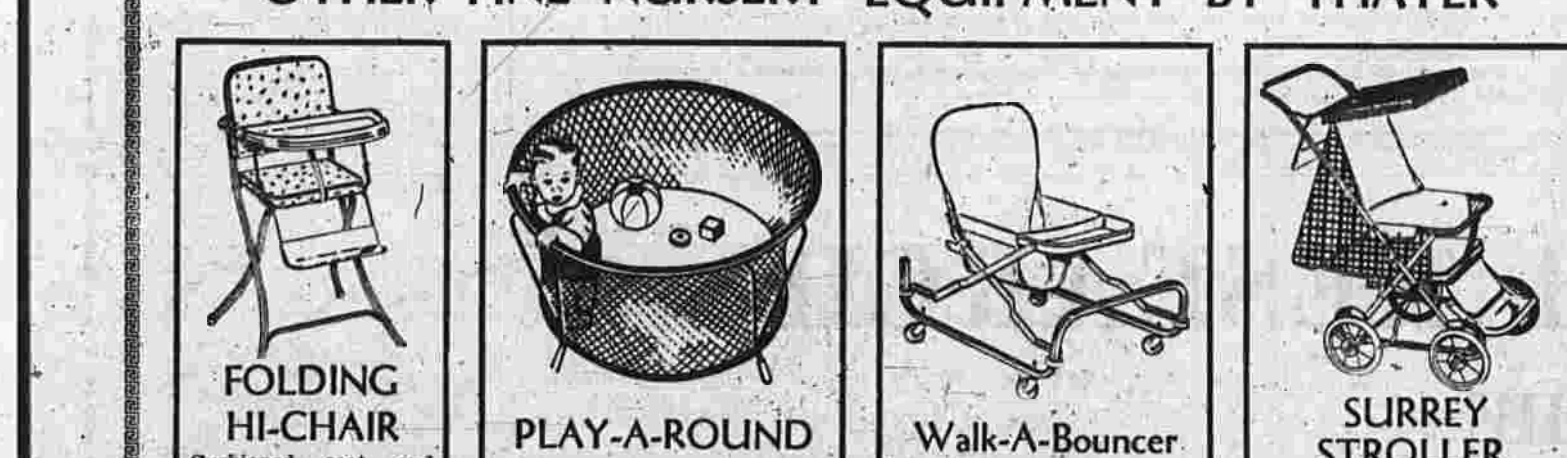

relations when he resumes control of the government. Verwoerd is in a Pretoria hospital recovering from two bullet wounds in the head suffered in an assassination attempt last week. Sauer said there must be an important change in the practical application of the apartheid without deviating from it. "Small grievances" that made for unrest and resentment among the Negro population will be removed, he said, and "Africans must be given hope for a happy existence and the feeling of frustration among whites and non-whites should be removed."

But the Minister of Bantu (Negro) Administration, Dewet Nel, last night said he was convinced apartheid would yet serve as a model to the world for the establishment of good race relations. "So long as our actions are governed by our Christian conscience, we have no need to fear anyone and we have assurance we will win through eventually," Nel said in a speech in Cape Town.

Meanwhile, it was announced the government has agreed to discuss South Africa's racial problems with U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold at a meeting in London next month.

Hammarskjold said in New York he arranged the talks under the April 1 Security Council resolution asking South Africa to drop race segregation. The government's agreement to meet with Hammarskjold was a marked change in policy, since it has always ignored previous U.N. resolutions on South African racial issues.

Foreign Secretary Eric H. Louw announced he will take Verwoerd's place at the London meeting of British Commonwealth prime ministers May 3 and will meet with Hammarskjold after the conference. He told parliament Hammarskjold is expected to visit South Africa in late July or early August and explained: "The South African government decided there is no objection to meeting Hammarskjold, that this decision is not a departure from the government's standpoint that there should be no interference in the domestic affairs of member states."

Wheaton was co-social with Paul Marchand and William High School's Whipper, Marchand, too, was picked to the all star team and attended last night's meeting.

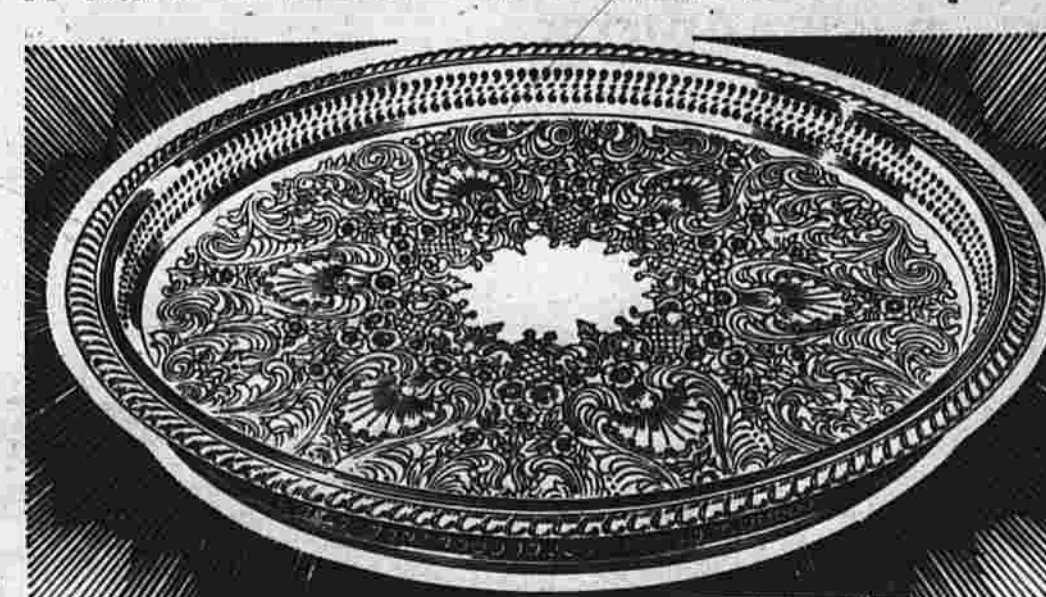

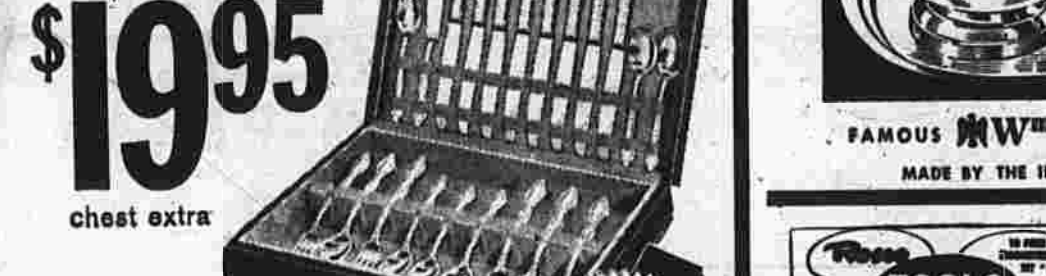

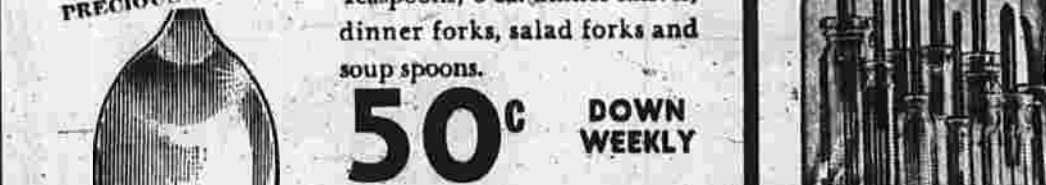

But while promising redress of major grievances, the president gave no indication of what the government would do to meet its critics.

Rhee's cabinet met throughout the day, discussing the situation and Hester's charges. Tanks and armed troops guarded the cabinet building and other major public buildings in Seoul, but so far the troops left to police active operations against riotous demonstrations.

Buildings still smoldered from fires set by yesterday's rampaging mobs.

Leaders of Rhee's Liberal party, the opposition Democrats and Independents tentatively decided to convene the National Assembly Friday to discuss the crisis. The Democrats had urged an immediate session of the assembly, which was in recess until next Monday, but the Liberals insisted on a cooling off period.

Truman was reported as replying: "I wouldn't be surprised."

Truman declined, in response to a query after his stroll today, to make any further comment.

The reports of the news conference touched off a series of responses yesterday.

Roy Wilkins, executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, expressed "deep regret" here, adding: "They are under the leadership of Mrs. Raymond."

This attempt to fasten the red tag on the movement is unworthy of a man who has roundly denounced the use of the tactic by others. There is not the slightest evidence of Communist "engineering," domination or infiltration of this movement.

In Atlanta, the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. called on Truman to prove his statement or apologize to the nation.

King, president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, said in a letter: "I have worked very closely with the students in this struggle and the one thing I am convinced of is that no outside agency (Communist or otherwise) initiated this movement, and to my knowledge no Communist force has come in since it started, or will dominate it in the future."

The Rev. N.Y. chapter of the NAACP accused Truman of using "extremely poor judgment," and said in a resolution that he had obviously failed to examine the facts.

Reports in the capital said the rebels were under the command of Juan Maria Castro Leon, a former Air Force general who has been involved in anti-government plots for almost two years.

Castro Leon was defense minister under the military junta that ruled Venezuela after the overthrow of dictator Marcos Perez Jimenez.

A series of bombings a few months ago was blamed by the government on supporters of Perez Jimenez. Officials said that officers and policemen who served in the dictator's 10-year regime were trying to stir up trouble and force the army to intervene and oust Betancourt.

Stiff sentences of partial transportation to the jungles were announced for rioters. Betancourt's troops also beat down an uprising in Caracas last Aug. 4. Police, troops and rioters fought in the downtown area of the capital for nine hours.

Venezuela, a tropical country rich with natural resources, faces the Caribbean. It has about six million people, and because of its rich resources, has the highest per capita income in South America.

Town Might Lower Pond If Acquired

The Town of Manchester's request to rezone a large parcel of town land in the Olcott-Spencer St. area will come before the Town Planning Commission at a public hearing May 2.

There are 111 acres in the tract, which the town is seeking to change from Rural to Industrial Zone.

It is this parcel of land which General Manager Richard Martin named as one of two parcels the town would sell to Kurtz Bros. Real-estate firm and die shop, threatened with having to leave town to expand.

Martin, on Monday, said it is the town's desire to rezone the land anyway, not just because of the possibility of selling it to the Kurtz firm.

"The land is in an area which would reach its best use under industrial zone regulations," he said. Establishment of real-estate or business outlets such as liquor stores would, he felt, be undesirable.

There is other town land in the area, particularly that which contains the town disposal plant. The tract is north of Spencer St. and west of Center St.

It adjoins on the south a small tract owned by Joseph B. Letts, which last week was changed from Rural to Industrial Zone by the TPC.

Three other rezoning applications come before the TPC May 2, one of which is expected to draw some opposition.

This application, submitted by John E. Hayes of West Hartford, asks for a change from Residence A to Business Zone of a 6-acre parcel of land on the south side of Green Rd. near Woodbridge St.

Hayes has submitted plans for construction of an AXP supermarket and parking lot there.

Other applications are:

Alexander Jarvis to change from Business II to Industrial Zone a 3-acre tract off Hartford Rd. and Bidwell St. close to the proposed Rt. 6 relocation; Charles R. Burr, Donald P. Richter and Edgar Clarke, to change from Rural to Business II Zone a 19-acre tract off Roland Tpk. near the Wilbur Cross Highway.

Before the hearing gets underway, the commission is scheduled to weigh approval for a 35-foot portion of the Darling Farm tract owned by builder Frank R. Wood.
