* Natural GOLF No. 3-The Stance

By JIMMY DEMARET Newspaper Enterprise Asan. Perhaps you've yet to hit your first golf ball, and are having an introductory lesson on the tee.

So I tell you that the purpose of the stance and address is to take aim and prepare yourself to support the activity of the swing. Be physically alert but comfortable. Very simply, be ready. The feet are comfortably spread at a width equal to or slightly greater than the width of the shoulders. The toes are touching the line of flight. The right foot is pointing straight ahead at a right angle to the line of flight. This is so the right foot and leg can form a brace against the finish of the backswing.

The left foot is pointing about half way between a right angle to the line of flight and a line straight to the target. The position of the left foot assists in comfortable absorption of the swing's speed and power as you move through the hitting area and up into the finish of a follow






