

Rockville-Vernon Vote Recommended June 28 on Charter

The Consolidation and Charter Commission, last night, recommended June 28 as the date for a referendum to study Vernon's three governments.

CCC members expressed satisfaction with it as they gave final approval to a charter on which they have spent 10 months drafting.

The charter is built around the council-manager-administrative officer form of government. It would unite the city of Rockville, the Vernon Fire District and the Town of Vernon into one government of the majority of voters in the city and in the fire district approve it in separate referendums on the same day.

The selection is expected to set the date for the referendum when all will vote. Many are polled individually. CCC members all said the charter is the best they could come up with and that the best of consolidation in our bound to come up again if this charter is not adopted.

They also feel the charter will be accepted if everyone takes the time to read it and is not misled by those who are prejudiced against it.

CCC Comments:

The commission said this reduction comes principally on state patrol highway. It will continue in fact, said the safety group, 70 per cent of this state's fatalities are charged to the 44 cities over 10,000 population. During the January-May period of 1959, only 50 per cent of the traffic deaths were charged to these 44 municipalities.

The commission indicated that if Connecticut is to continue the steady 4-year decrease in traffic fatalities, there must be greater improvement in the large urban areas.

During this recent 5-month span, the six largest cities were charged with 22 traffic deaths, compared to 13 during the same period last year.

Bridgewater, Waterbury and Storrs each received an increase of three such fatalities. Hartford had one more death while New Britain showed no change.

New Haven was the only one of the six largest cities to come through with a decrease—one.

Fears Welfare Boost

Hartford, June 2 (AP)—State payments for welfare patients in hospitals will probably rise some \$200,000 in the coming fiscal year, if the present method of setting such state payments remains in effect.

This estimate was given today by Edwin J. Karmansiewicz, executive secretary of the State's Hospital Cost Commission, which is authorized to set the amounts the state pays hospitals for welfare patients.

Karmansiewicz said every one of over 40 hospitals in the state has requested increases in state payments, based on rising costs.

The rate until the end of June, which varies from hospital to hospital—averages \$10 per patient to \$200 per day per patient, Karmansiewicz explained.

The average increase applied for amounts to about \$1.80 per patient day, he added. Multiplied by 17 estimated 150,000 patient days for which the state will have to pay in the year beginning July 1, this works out to some \$270,000.

If the present method of setting state payments remains in effect, the daily rate would go up to \$110 and the total for the year for welfare hospital payments would come to about \$4.5 million, Karmansiewicz said.

Under the present system, the rate charged the state pays, he said, is based on the actual cost. He did not say this, but it would appear that since applications have been made to increase state payments, rate increases for the

North raises to three spades, knowing that South has a six-card spade suit. South can have only a singleton diamond at most. For this reason, South would not bid a diamond stand. If South had only six spades, he would have at least four cards in some other suit, and would probably be able to bid that other suit.

South would go on to game in spades if he had substantial extra strength—for example the king of hearts, or even the queen of clubs. Since his opening bid is skippy he stops short at three spades.

South makes three spades fairly easy but would not make game if he south unfavorably passed the double of two diamonds. West would either make his contract or go down one-trick, pending — on the quality of the defense.

In neither case would South be happy.

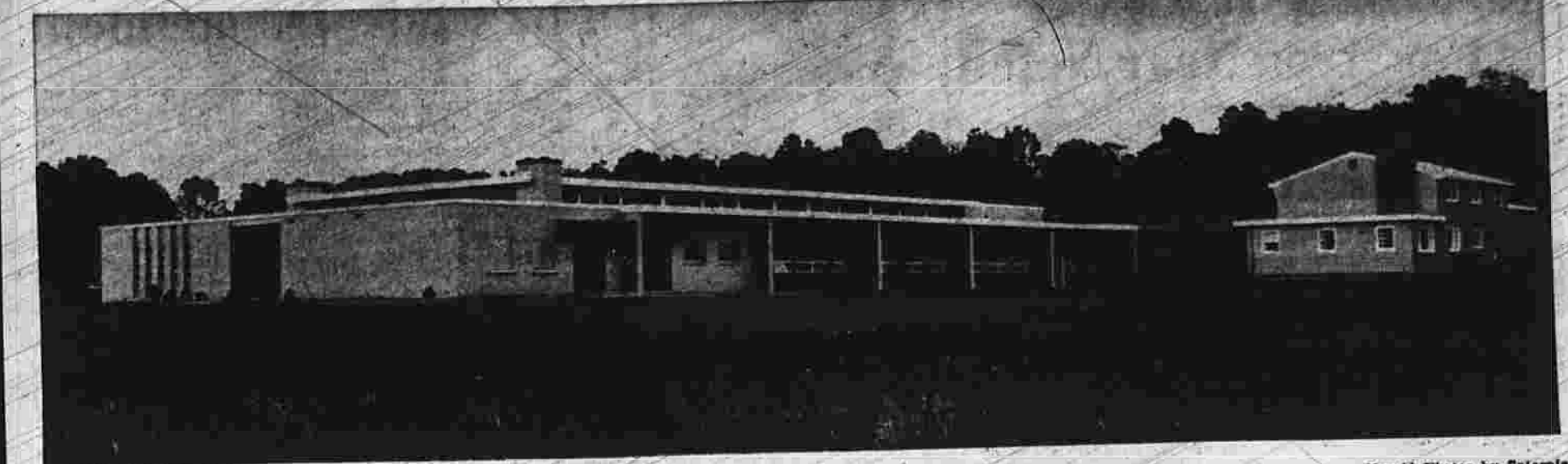

Religious Center Grows

By JUDITH AHEARN. The \$182,000 parish center and \$48,000 rectory dedicated by the Sacred Heart Church on Rt. 31 in Vernon are the first buildings in a religious center which will one day include a church, an elementary school and a convent...

While the hall will be used primarily as a church room, when the parish builds a real church the hall will be used for the activities of lay organizations in the church. The chapel will be converted to a library and the classrooms will be freed for meetings of smaller groups in the church.

The tabernacle is free standing on the altar roof and circular in shape to recall the tabernacle or tent of worship used by the Jews. The candles are also gold.

Parish Was Once a Mission. By JUDITH AHEARN. In the 1860's a number of Catholic families in the Danbury area of Vernon, attracted by mills on the Tannockroan and Hockanum rivers and by the railroad activity around the junction...

Parish Dwindles. After its start in 1866, the parish dwindled as the mill close one by one and the junction business dwindled. The church was destroyed, but the congregation was so small it could not support a resident pastor. By 1915 there were only 130 members.
