## Speck of Light Universe Key

Eugene, Ore., June 13 (AP)—An astronomer using the great telescope on Palomar Mountain has reached 36 billion million miles into space and found what may be the key to the problem of how the universe is built.

What he detected was a speck of light representing a galaxy—or maybe two galaxies in collision. It was calculated to be about six billion light years away. A light year is the distance light travels in one year—about six million million miles.

An unusual thing about the speck was that it was moving away from the Earth at about 90,000 miles a second. This is by far the fastest astronomical body ever clocked—almost half the speed of light itself. It also was the most distant object ever identified.

More important scientifically, the astronomer got the spectrum of the object. This gave him the figures on speed and distance. But it also gave him a start toward determining whether the universe was born in a big bang and has been aging ever since, or whether it is constantly renewing itself and has no beginning or end.

### Yale Honors 43

New Haven, June 13 (AP)—Yale University awarded 43 honorary degrees today as a feature of its colorful 229th commencement.

The recipients included Don Pedro Gerardo Beltran, prime minister of Peru; Eugene Black, president of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development; and Cole Porter, composer and lyricist.

Illness kept Porter away, however, and his degree was awarded in absentia.

The ceremonies, under a warm sun on Yale's historic Old Campus were watched by about 10,000 persons.

Degrees were presented to nearly 2,000 seniors and graduate school students, who came from 49 of the 50 states. Among them were students from 58 foreign countries.

The honorary degrees were awarded as follows:

Beltran, doctor of laws; Henry Knox Sherrill, retired bishop of the Episcopal Church, president of the World Council of Churches, doctor of laws; Black, a doctor of laws; Edward Roland Harriman, chairman of the American National Lederberg, professor of genetics at Stanford University, doctor of sciences.

### West-Pocket Rebellion Crushed

#### By Frondizi Army in Argentina

Buenos Aires, June 13 (AP)—rebels to surrender by dawn or to President Arturo Frondizi's government, announced today that a west-pocket revolt in western Argentina had collapsed a scant six hours or so after it started.

Frondizi told newsmen the bulk of Argentina's armed forces had rallied to his side within a few hours after the small-scale rebellion last night in San Luis.

The president confidently announced he would leave as planned this afternoon on a month-long tour of Europe.

Before dawn, a spokesman for the Interior Ministry said loyal troops had captured Gen. Mauricio Gomez, commander of the 2nd Argentine Army, who reportedly joined the rebels.

The other rebels fled from the strategic sites they captured a few hours earlier in San Luis, including the local radio station, the spokesman said.

### Proxy Nuptials Of Rossellini, Ingrid Voided

Rome, June 13 (AP)—An Italian court has voided Ingrid Bergman and Roberto Rossellini's annulment of their Mexican proxy marriage.

The court's opinion, filed by Judge Orlando Falcon, was made public today by one of the attorneys involved in the case.

The ruling paves the way for the Italian film director to marry Ingrid Bergman, the wife of an Indian movie man who left her husband for Rossellini, bore an Italian daughter and now is in Paris.

Miss Bergman did not contest Rossellini's suit for the annulment. Now 42, she is married to Swedish impresario Oscar Schmidt, and they live outside Paris.

Still before the Rome courts is a case to settle final custody of Miss Bergman's three children by Rossellini. The press has temporary custody of them.

Rossellini, 53, has been trying for two years to get an annulment of the marriage. A Rome court granted it two years ago, contending that the proxy marriage was not valid because Miss Bergman's proxy husband was not legal. But a court of appeals reversed the decision.

The Rome Civil Tribunal, in Judge Falcon's opinion, agreed with the original decision.

### Job Total Up Million Last Month

Washington, June 13 (AP)—A million-man increase in employment in May was reported by the Labor Department today.

The substantial gain, about normal or slightly better for the season, carried the nation's total civilian employment to a record for the month at 67,268,000.

Unemployment fell by about 200,000 to 3,459,000. This also was about an average movement for May.

The unemployment rate—4.9 per cent of the civilian labor force—was a bit better than April's 5 per cent, but not down to the 4.8 per cent in February.

The decline in unemployment meant that 951 of every 1,000 men and women who wanted jobs had them; but factory employment declined seasonally by 45,000, mainly because of continued cutbacks in the steel and machinery industries. There were about 150,000 fewer factory jobs than there were a year ago.

Despite these declines, and the release of 120,000 temporary census workers, the total number of persons on non-farm payrolls rose by 80,000 in May to 53,100,000. This was 900,000 higher than a year ago and a record for the month.

The expansion of employment reflected chiefly gains in farming, construction and other outdoor work. It brought the employment total to a level of 1 1/2 million above that of a year ago. Department officials were cheered by a decline of 200,000 in the number of long-term unemployed—those who have been hunting jobs for 15 weeks or longer. This reduced the total of long-term unemployed to about 800,000.

If the seasonal pattern continues to prevail, unemployment and employment both will rise in June with the release of millions of high school and college students into the job market. Then a gradual decline will occur, said Seymour Wolfbein, chief of manpower statistics for the department.

This may reduce joblessness to about 2,700,000 by October. Meanwhile, employment will have risen and, in July, probably will set a new record somewhere above the 67,500,000 mark of last July.

## Ike Leaves Alaska For Visit to Manila

Anchorage, Alaska, June 13 (AP)—President Eisenhower took off from Anchorage, Alaska, today for a 3-day visit to the Philippines, still determined to go on this weekend to riot-plagued Japan.

The President, pleased by a warm reception in Alaska, today left his big jet airliner. He scheduled a refueling stop at Wake Island 7 1/2 hours later and arrival at Clark Field near Manila at about 4:35 p.m. local time (3:45 a.m. EDT, Tuesday).

Prospects were for a rousing welcome for Eisenhower in Manila, where he was stationed as an army officer in 1935-39.

But there was a risk of danger—the possibility of physical harm to the 69-year-old President—on his scheduled arrival in Tokyo.

## 50th Star Shines July 4

### Star Spangled Banner 183 Years Old Tuesday

Washington, June 13 (AP)—Old Glory, which now contains 48 stars, is 183 years old tomorrow, and it is still proper to display your flag even if it has fewer stars.

There are only two firm rules: The flag should be in reasonably good condition and without a 50th star.

The 50th star for Hawaii will be added officially July 4. Until then it is improper to display the new flag.

The 49th star for Alaska became official July 4, 1959.

Even after the 50-star flag becomes official, most agencies of the federal government will continue to display 48-star and 49-star flags so long as they remain in good condition and until present supplies of unused flags are exhausted.

U.S. flag history goes back to June 14, 1777. The Continental Congress in Philadelphia, without any fanfare, resolved that "The flag of the United States be 13 stripes alternate red and white, that the union be 13 stars white in a blue field representing a new constellation."

In the first flags, the 13 stars were in a circle. In succeeding years, as additional states were...

## Judge, Lawyers Talk On Mass Picket Ban

Hartford, June 13 (AP)—United Aircraft corporation officials today claimed that almost 30 per cent of the hourly-paid production workers at Pratt & Whitney Aircraft's three plants came to work on the first shift this morning.

At the same time, UAC spokesmen also contended that increased number of production employees also reported to their jobs at the four Sikorsky Aircraft and Hamilton Standard plants of the corporation.

However, a spokesman for the unions involved in the long contract dispute which has now broken out in a state-wide strike, challenged the figures and maintained the corporation "is playing a numbers game."

John K. Main Sr., senior business representative of the International Association of Machinists, District 91, and co-chairman of the unity committee of the IAM and United Auto Workers, said that the first shift turnout at the largest plant of UAC in East Hartford this morning was "less than on Friday."

At that time, the company said 2,100 workers showed up for the first shift while the union claimed that the turnout was more than 90 per cent effective on the total work force.

P&WA normally has about 10,600 production workers in its three plants on the first shift, with some 8,200 workers in the East Hartford plant.

While the union claimed that 50 workers showed up at Hamilton Standard's Windsor Locks plant and three at the Broad Brook plant, the North Haven plant, and that the strike action at the Sikorsky plants was "97 to 98 per cent effective," the company gave out these figures:

Hamilton Standard: 528 workers on the first shift, an increase of 218 over the first shift Friday (normal turnout, 3,000).

P&WA: 4,000 workers on the first shift, compared to 3,250 Friday (normal turnout, 3,300).

North Haven plant: 423 workers on the first shift, 190 over last Friday (normal turnout, around 2,000).

Meanwhile, on top of the 7-12-cent-per-hour wage boost granted last Friday, the company said that the same type employees would be getting the same boost effective today.

The turnouts on the first and second shifts today would, officials on both sides admitted, show the effectiveness of the strike as it went into its sixth day.

Everyone was watching the picture closely, especially after the Saturday announcement that the company would be canceling the package life and medical coverage for those workers falling to show up on their jobs this week.

Meanwhile, the machinist union at P&WA East Hartford and Manchester plants and at Hamilton Standard have requested the state insurance commissioners office to investigate the company contract.

The unions want the state to "determine the rights of the union and employees."

The IAW, with jurisdiction at the Sikorsky plants and the North Haven plant, is not involved since its members are covered under strike benefit arrangements.

## Convair Union Plans Walkout Every Monday

San Diego, Calif., June 13 (AP)—Another strike—this one a one-day-a-week walkout—hit the aircraft and missile industry today, and with a new wrinkle: Aerial picketing.

The Engineers and Architects Assn., called its 5,000 members to the job at Convair every Monday from now on until its contract demands are settled.

To discourage reported plans of some engineers to avoid crossing picket lines by arriving at work by helicopter, the association said it would have an airplane towing a strike banner above Convair's two plants.

The association seeks a 6 per cent wage boost, improvements in layoff and arbitration procedures and other benefits.

If the action is sustained by the House later this week, the aid program would get \$2,354,500,000 of the \$3,115,000,000 Eisenhower requested for the fiscal year starting July 1. In addition, it would have available an estimated \$400 million in previous funds which have not been obligated in spending.
