Tokyo, June 17 (P) Japa-nese leftists pressed their advantage and sent 65,000 demonstrators dancing and chanting around Japan's Diet (parliament) building today in a drive to block the military alliance with the United States. A Socialist legislator was

stabbed during the melee.
But Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi's conservative government remained determined to stay in office, until the new treaty with America comes into force Sunday. After that, a government spokesman said, elections will be called and the conservatives will seek a popular mandate for new laws to curb violence. He accused the postwar American occupa-"weakening Japan and its police so that present international communism can carry out its ac-

livities quite freely. As 25,000 leftwing college stu-dents and 40,000 labor unionists make-danced and chanted slogans around the Diet grounds, a right-ist youth sneaked up and stabbed a Socialist leader in the shoulder.
