Nikita Khrushchev warned today that "Soviet artillery" -meaning rockets-can America if the United States

moves against Cuba. He pledged all-out support to Prime Minitser Fidel Castro's revolutionary government in bristling speech and warned the United States to keep its hands that Caribbean republic. Amid cheers, he told a meeting of school teachers in the Kremin that the Soviet rocket tests in the Pacific showed Russia can hit tar-

gets accurately at 8,000 miles and thus can strike the heartland of the United States. "Now the United States is not se unreachable as it once was," said. "Speaking figuratively, it case of necessity, Soviet artiller can support with their rocket fire the Cuban people if aggressive forces in the Pentagon dare to start intervention against Cuba."

At President Eisenhower's vacation headquarters at Newport, R. I., White House press secretary James C. Hagerty noted the State Department said yesterday that Khrushchev seems to be more in terested in making threats than in

Hagerty said that statement stands as U.S. comment on Khrushchev's latest blast. Khrushchev charged that the United States is attempting to strangle Cuba with an economic blockade and added:

"We will help our Cuban broth-ers fight an economic blockade, and the blockade will be a failure." The Soviet premier charge countries are living in poverty be-cause American monopolists are living in richness."
