## **Boat Weathers Trip** Better Than Crew

"No more boats for me," said hauled the "Dolphin" to the South-west Miramichi River.

About 3:30 that afternoon, they

Richard Sundgren this morning after sleeping off the exhaustion of a 2,000-mile river and ocean trip in a 15-foot aluminum boat.

He and Richard Barton, 146 N. School St., made the trip as a stunt to prove the toughness of the boats they sell.

They proved the boat's toughness, and their own as well, but the toll taken on the two men was far greater than that taken on the boat.

19-Day Trip

Rough seas, sandbars, a missealculated course and long hours at the wheel proved exhausting to the two men, but not to the little "Dolphin," manufactured by the Barnes Boat Ct., 1 Mitchell Dr.

Their course ran down the Connecticut River from East Hartford, east on Long Island Sound, through the Cape Cod Canal, north on the Atlantic to the St. Lawrence River, south on Lake Champlain and the Hudson River, and back to East Hartford through the Sound and the Connecticut River.

Meat Miramichi River.

About 3:30 that afternoon, they ran into a system of sand bars and rocks.

"We had to pole and push the boat to Dosktown. One place in there we actually had to dig a channel with our hands through rock and gravel."

The only serious accident of the trip happened in this area, near upper Blackville.

They left East Hartford Wednesday, July 6, at 5:50 a. m.

It took an hour and a half to reach the Sound.

"There was a little chop out there, but not enough to bother. We put in at Newport for gasoline and oil and dinner," said Sundgren.

After Newport, "It wasn't too had wardl we hit Bursand's Ray."

The St. Lawrence River was no different, and, by now, the men were feeling the effects of long hours at the wheel, sleepless nights and constant drenchings from spray and heavy mists.

Twenty miles of rip tides off Eagle Point were part of their course on the day they covered the most miles, 314 miles in nine hours.

St. Anne de Beaupre was the only town where the residents did not help them to carry gasoline to their boat. Everywhere else, "People were wonderfully helpful."

Beautiful Scenery
"We made the mistake of taking the north channel to Quebec.

"We couldn't stay out of this. We had to keep beating our way up to the Cape Cod Canal."
