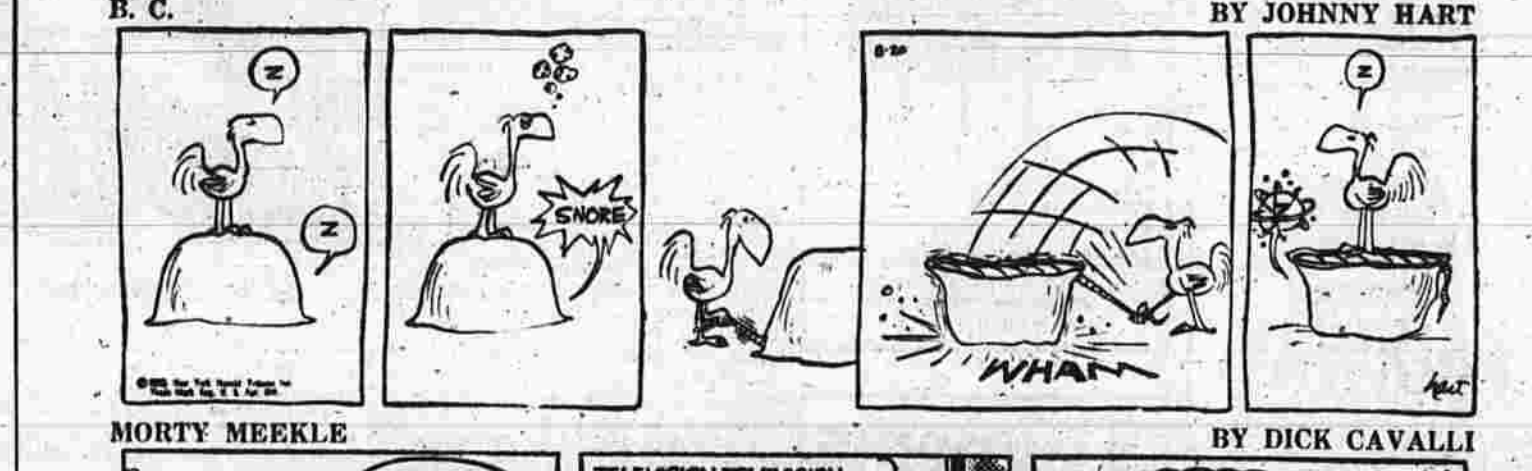
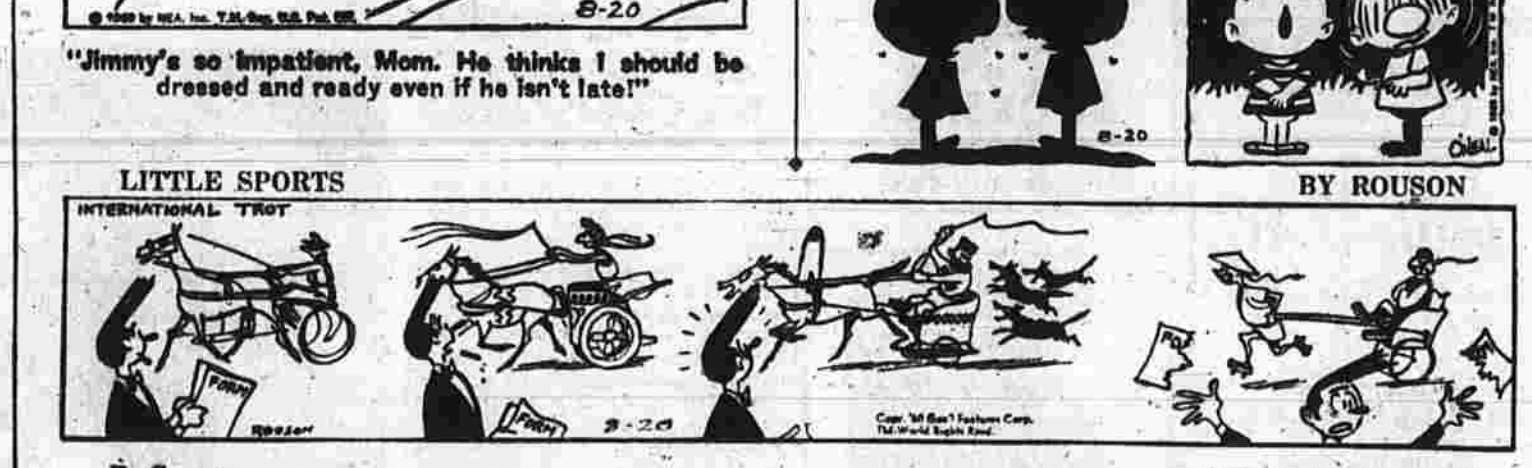
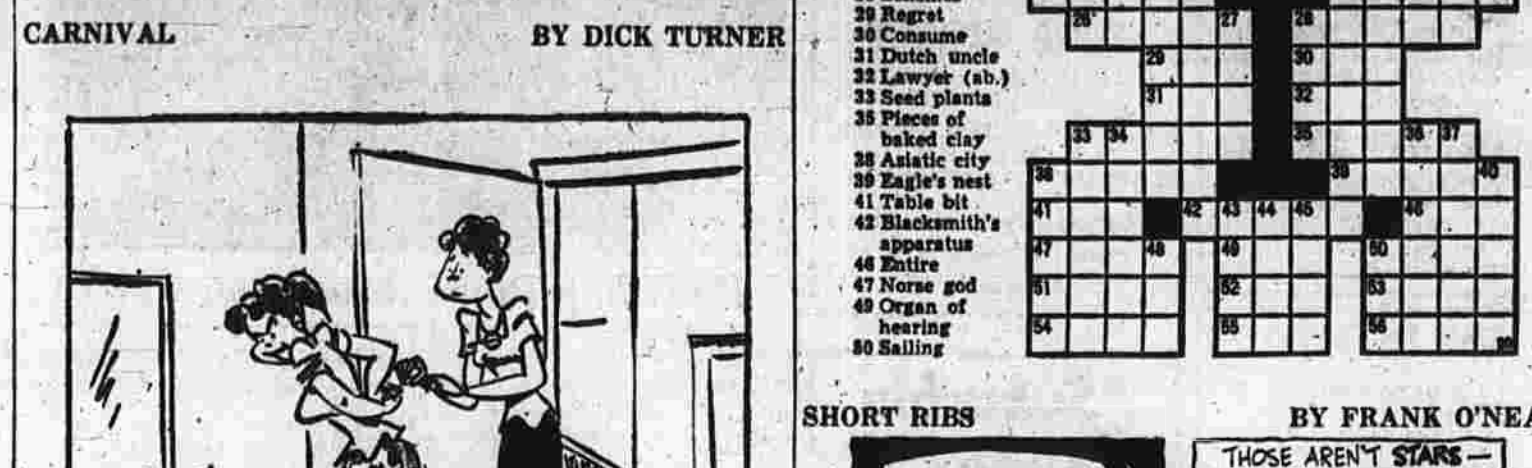

beginning, until Rockville Mayor Leo Flaherty figuratively tipped his hat to Manchester for allowing Rockville trucks to deposit rubbish at the Olcott St. dump. "Our special thanks go to Manchester," Flaherty said, nodding toward Manchester General Manager Richard Martin, "even though my main contact with the town seems to be in representing people who are suing it."

Later, Director Alice Lamenza asked Flaherty how much Rockville paid for the dump use, and Flaherty, acknowledging ignorance of the reason, said, "not a nickel."

Without blinking, Martin drawled, "Well, I thought we could make a deal (on the next lawsuit)."

Flaherty had added that Rockville would expect to pay a fee if extended use of the dump should be arranged.

Following a talk by Leslie Sherman, principal sanitary engineer for Connecticut, who discussed use of incinerators and of sanitary land fill dumps, Martin spoke again.

"I'm reminded," said he, "of a fight over the Grand Canyon. One passenger was a city manager, and after the others had remarked on the beauty of the canyon, the manager looked out the window and what a swell place to dump garbage."

Having earlier, heard the sanitary land-fill type of dump praised because of its resultant filling in and improvement of otherwise poor ground, Rockville's sometimes golden-tongued Seymour Lavitt cocked an eyebrow and asked, "So that it could be filled in and made into a playground?"

# Rome to New York in a Day TV Gets Big Chance In Coming Olympics

New York — (NEA) — You'll see the Olympic Games' chief events, next week, on the same day they're contested. This may be one of the most exciting programs of the entire TV year, a prime example of international cooperation. The Olympic Games of 1952 were held in Helsinki; TV was too young to attempt coverage. Four years ago, the Games were too far away in Melbourne, Australia. But this year's glamor show is in Rome; the time and place are just right to try this experiment.

William MacPhail, of CBS, the network with exclusive TV rights to the Games, thinks it will all work out, barring bad head winds. Most of the important finals in Rome will be held at 4:30 in the Italian afternoon—that's 11:30 in the morning in New York. The pictures will be fed from Italy over Eurovision (the all-Europe TV network); CBS will tape the picture in Paris.

The tapes will be flown from Paris instead of Rome because the flight is quicker. MacPhail, who says airline cooperation has been tremendous, expects to put them on a plane in Paris at 5:30 p.m. This is due in New York at 8:40 p.m. There's a transmitter at the

airport (there'll probably be one at Boston, in case the planes are diverted by bad weather) and MacPhail says most of the big events will go on the air at 9 p.m. EDT.

CBS is not sending its own camera crews to Rome; instead, the network will use pictures taken by a crack Italian outfit, MacPhail reports. Economics and a tight schedule necessitated this arrangement. The CBS crews were so busy with the conventions and campaign coverage that the network would have found it tough to man enough cameras in Rome to do the job.

All the CBS personnel—an announcer, producers, runners—who are going, are busy learning Italian. And they also are eating like little demons, because they fear that Italy's notorious August heat and humidity and lack of air conditioning, plus their own busy schedules will cause them to lose considerable weight. (Poundage is a big thing in the CBS sports department—the weight-conscious executives are always comparing their diets; they recently staged an intra-office "fat festival" to see who could lose the most weight.)

Bill MacPhail, the son of Larry MacPhail, got into TV sports from

baseball. He'd been public relations director of the Kansas City Athletics when CBS approached him; he took the job because "TV gives more security—after all, these are only 16 major league clubs with jobs to offer."

### ABOUT TV TOWN

The political conventions, which can be so exciting, proved dull this year. The 1960 political conventions will be long forgotten.

The DuPont Show of the Month, so far exclusively dramatizing adaptations of novels and plays, is considering one original this season. At the moment, one script they're studying is based on the Black Sox scandal in baseball.

Jackie Gleason suggested a TV series to CBS—he'd host a series of billiards matches in his home, playing against such friends as Bob Hope and Leo Durocher. CBS turned it down.

Sam Levenson is M.C.ing Celebrity Talent Scouts this summer. It was about 10 years ago that Sam got his big break on the old "This is Show Business" program. That was produced by Irving Mansfield. Sam and Irving became friends. When the producer brought out this new show, he called Sam for the big spot. Oscar Homolka, who played Playhouse 90's celebrated "The Plot to Kill Stalin," has his fingers crossed—he's applied for a visa to visit Russia on a European tour this summer.

During Paar's vacation (he will leave the show Aug. 29) Studio 6B, which is the origination point for the nighttime show, will be adapted for colorcasts. For three weeks of Paar's absence, guest stars will be hosts of the program in another studio in the RCA Building, New York.
