Way Paved To Adjourn Next Week

Washington, Aug. 25 (AP)— The House Rules Committee gave a go-ahead signal today for a compromise on minimum wage legislation.

By vote of 8-3, it cleared the way for Senate and House con-ferees to work out differences between the bills passed by the two branches.

The Senate bill would hike the minimum wage from \$1.00 to \$1.25 hourly and extend coverage to about four million more workers. The House bill would provide for \$1.15 an hour and coverage for another one million employes.

The Senate measure was backed by Sens. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts and Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, the Democratic presidential and vice presidential nominees. It was opposed by the Eisenhower administration.

There were indications that the compromise, already informally worked out, would keep the wage rate at \$1.15 and extend coverage to around three million workers.
