Columbia Congregational Church Dedicates Parish Wing

Historic Columbia Congregational Church has passed another milestone in its 240-year history. It has added a new parish wing to its modest Colonial structure, which heretofore housed simply the sanctuary and vestibule.

When the 14 founders of the Second Ecclesiastical Society at Lebanon (now Columbia) called the Rev. Samuel Smith to be their minister in 1720, they entered into a covenant. One record promised: "We do also give our Children unto him promising to bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord."

This no doubt, was done very religiously, with no special services for the children, however, but taking them right into the adult services. It was in May of 1880 that the Sunday School was organized. But even then, there was only the sanctuary in which to hold class.

It was the need of the youth of the church which prompted the present structure was erected in 1882, using much material from the old church building. It was reported to cost \$20,142. It was rededicated in 1937, when all galleries were removed, its length extended and the choir loft added.

New York, Sept. 16 (AP) — More than half the newspapers responding to a poll conducted by Editor and Publisher magazine are supporting Republican presidential nominee Richard M. Nixon.

The magazine, a journalism trade publication, said yesterday that 54.1 per cent of the newspapers responding to the poll are supporting Nixon while 15.6 per cent are supporting Democrat John F. Kennedy.

Of the country's 1,775 daily newspapers, 801 responded to the poll, the magazine said. Of them, 38.3 per cent said they were independent or undecided as to Sept. 16.

The combined circulation of the newspapers supporting Nixon is 10,480,988. Of those supporting Kennedy is 2,727,126. Circulation of uncommitted papers is 9,619,943.

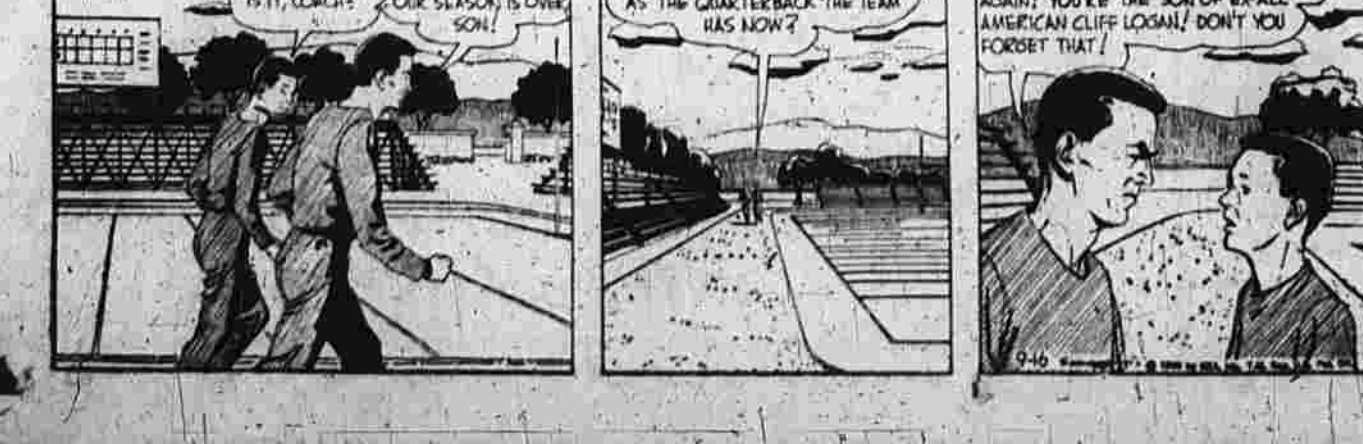

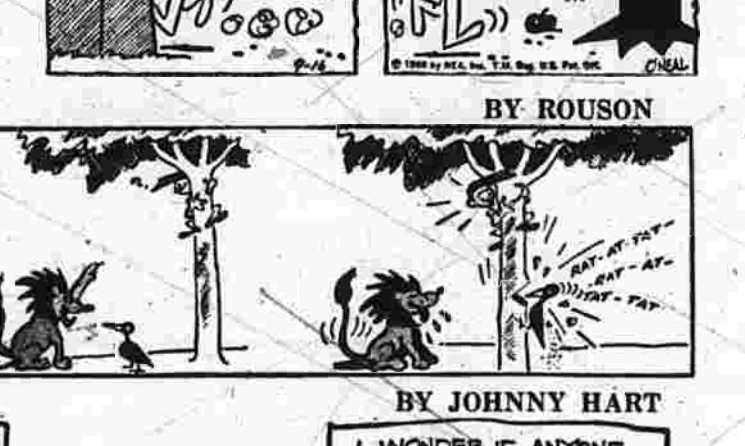

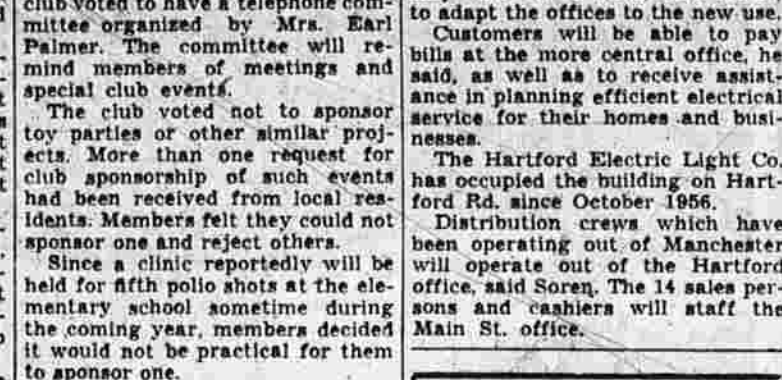
