**ABANDON RULES WITH GOOD REASON**

Rules for defensive play are a valuable guide when you have nothing better to go by. Be ready to break any rule, however, when you have a definite reason for doing so.

How To Know  
Was it reasonable for East to play the ten of hearts at the first trick or should he have known that this play would give South the contract?

A difficult question to answer. If he had known when you make a crucial play you will usually make the right decision. Since nobody rings a bell you can make a careless or habitual play just because you weren't aware that you had a problem.

You should sit up, however, when your partner leads fourth-best of a suit in which you hold four trumps. If you have a good card, if you waste your one good card, you may lose a trick.

If East plays low at the first trick of this hand, he will still have the ten to play when West eventually leads the seven of hearts. Then East can cash his fifth heart to defeat the contract. East should play the six of hearts at the first trick and should later return the diamond over the suit. An alert defender would get the idea very quickly.

Daily Question  
Partner bids one spade, and the next player passes. You hold: Spades: A 4 5 2; Hearts: 8; Diamonds: 7 4 2; Clubs: A Q J 4. What do you bid?

Answer: Bid two clubs and raise to four spades at your next turn. This describes not only your strength but also where you have it. Partner has the right cards but will be able to reach a slam with little more than a minimum opening bid.

**The Republican Ticket**

They include these impressive newcomers, Eric Anderson, Donald Conrad, and Francis DeLaferra, all men of responsible achievements in their professions and in Manchester community life.

Should these six men become the new majority on the new Board of Directors, and thus be given primary responsibility for supervision and creation of town policies during the next two years, Manchester would, we think, have every reason to be proud of them and of their achievements for the community.

These six men run for office on a platform formulated by a young and serious dedicated town organization, more interested in the soundness than in the glamor of its promises, concerned with what Manchester will be doing tomorrow as well as with the ever-urgent needs of every community. It means more money and sober enough to know that there is no magic wand which can promise and pay for everything in one main, effortless motion. It knows, above all, there has to be some top limit, some time, to the tax rate the people of Manchester can be asked to pay. And this present ticket and platform represent a party which has amply proved, in the past history of Manchester, that progress can be managed without undue resort to the money-lenders. It is the party which proposed and sponsored for Manchester the businesslike form of government it now enjoys, and which defends the basic concept of the council-manager system, and which turned the office of General Manager into a non-political office, which ought to be free from political nagging or political assault.

As the office of General Manager ought to be free from political pressures, so should the Board of Education. It is a fine thing, we think, that that spirit does obtain on the Manchester Board of Education, regardless of the political make-up of that board. No party line election ploy should be considered necessary in this phase of Monday's election, but we commend, as dedicated individuals, the candidates for reelection, Jane Stuck, Edward Glenny and Christie McCormick, and the new Republican candidates, Robert Barnes and the second level Monday offers an opportunity to vote for people and principles good for Manchester—a positive, up-grade decision we commend to the voters.

**Thursday, A Statesman**

Prime Minister Macmillan, in his speech before the United Nations General Assembly Thursday, easily became the star of the stellar present session of that body.

His formula was simple. Although he is himself one of the major participants in the cold war in the great East-West division, he managed, without the least sacrifice of honesty or the least weakness in his own point of view, to move into some occasional understanding of the point of view of his opposites.

That ability, on his part, made his own defense of Western positions all the more compelling and effective. That ability, on his part,

made his speech the one major speech of the session the clearly could regard as neutrally constructive. That ability, on his part, functioned as at least a small beginning of that process of mutual trust and understanding which he himself quite logically defined as necessary before agreement on specific issues.

Perhaps the most significant passage in the Macmillan analysis of the present state of the world came as he discussed the question of fear.

"What forced the NATO alliance? The fear that we have some-thing of 1947, Communism would spread over the whole of Europe, but by persuasion, but by force, the countries of Western Europe drew together by a natural and instinctive gesture. . . Let us face it. It is not fear that the great deterrent forces of the West have sprung.

"On the other side, the Russian people no doubt believe, incredible as it is to us, that they may be attacked by the West. Yet this is human and perhaps understandable. For they too have their memories of invasions throughout the centuries, from Poltava to Stalingrad.

"And so long as fear exists, so long as each side believes that it must rely upon its own arm to defend its own rights, so long will the tension continue, so long the detente becomes more difficult, so long will the great armaments of the world represent an ever-increasing burden, on our resources of money, science and technology.

Later on, Prime Minister Macmillan discussed the question of international inspection of any disarmament plan.

"I realize also," he said, "that some countries, partly from their own traditions, partly because of the very state of the world division, regard with suspicion—national suspicion—and also, to our obvious regret, with a minimum any international inspection. Yet, if we are to succeed, we may as well be realistic about it. We have some-how got to overcome these doubts, however reasonable they may be. Fear of espionage, fear of foreign spies, fear of the fact that each nation needs to be reassured and reassured by the effective inspection and control—all these misgivings are very human. But they must not stand in the way. And if we succeed, if disarmament comes progress step by step, keeping time with the setting up of the controls, then these fears and suspicions will begin to fade. They will wither away."

public discussion and political turmoil that national thought was aroused on the slavery issue. It was one of the explosive incidents leading to the Civil War.

On Oct. 16, 1859, abolitionist John Brown and his 22-man army of liberation staged a raid on Harper's Ferry, site of the U. S. Armory and arsenal, and an essay gateway to the South and slave-holding sections.

The raid failed for lack of support. No one willingly joined Brown's army. Seventeen persons, 10 of whom were raiders, were killed in the fighting. Brown and six of his confederates were later hanged at Charles Town, the county seat. Brown died on Dec. 2, 1859.

# 'Brown's Raid' NBC Special

"John Brown's Raid," a dramatization of abolitionist John Brown's abortive war on slavery, will be presented as an NBC Special telecast, Tuesday, Oct. 25 (10-11 p.m. NYT), producer Robert Allan Arthur announced.

Arthur, helmsman of last season's highly acclaimed "Sunday Showcase," will take a mobile tape unit to Harper's Ferry, W. Va., this month to tape the 60-minute drama.

The decision to tape "John Brown's Raid" on location has been based on the successful taping last season of NBC's "The American" in Arizona, Arthur said. It was the first time a dramatic show had been taped on location.

Arthur pointed out that Harper's Ferry has been restored to its original condition, and would make a "superb location" for the show. It is now a national monument, and, according to Arthur, is "an extraordinarily beautiful site."

"John Brown's Raid" will be directed by Sidney Lumet. The script is by Robert Crean, a 36-year-old playwright whose play will be directed by Tyrone Guthrie for the Broadway stage production during the 1961-62 season.
