Postal Gain Revealed in Receipt Sum

Postmaster Herman F. LeDoyt reports receipts at the Coventry post office have about doubled in the past seven years. The figure es of June 30 this year totaled \$30,595. In 1953, it was \$16,360. In his summary of post office growth, LeDoyt recalled the pres-ent office was opened in the Sebert Building in March, 1951. There were two assistants, John R. Adamcik Jr., and Herman "Jake" LeDoyt, and two rural carriers. Today, in addition, Mrs. Frances Colby is a clerk and two more rural carriers are on the staff. 
Carol Jacobs Tee-Pee Tales Tigers' Three-Period Scoring Too Much for Manchester
