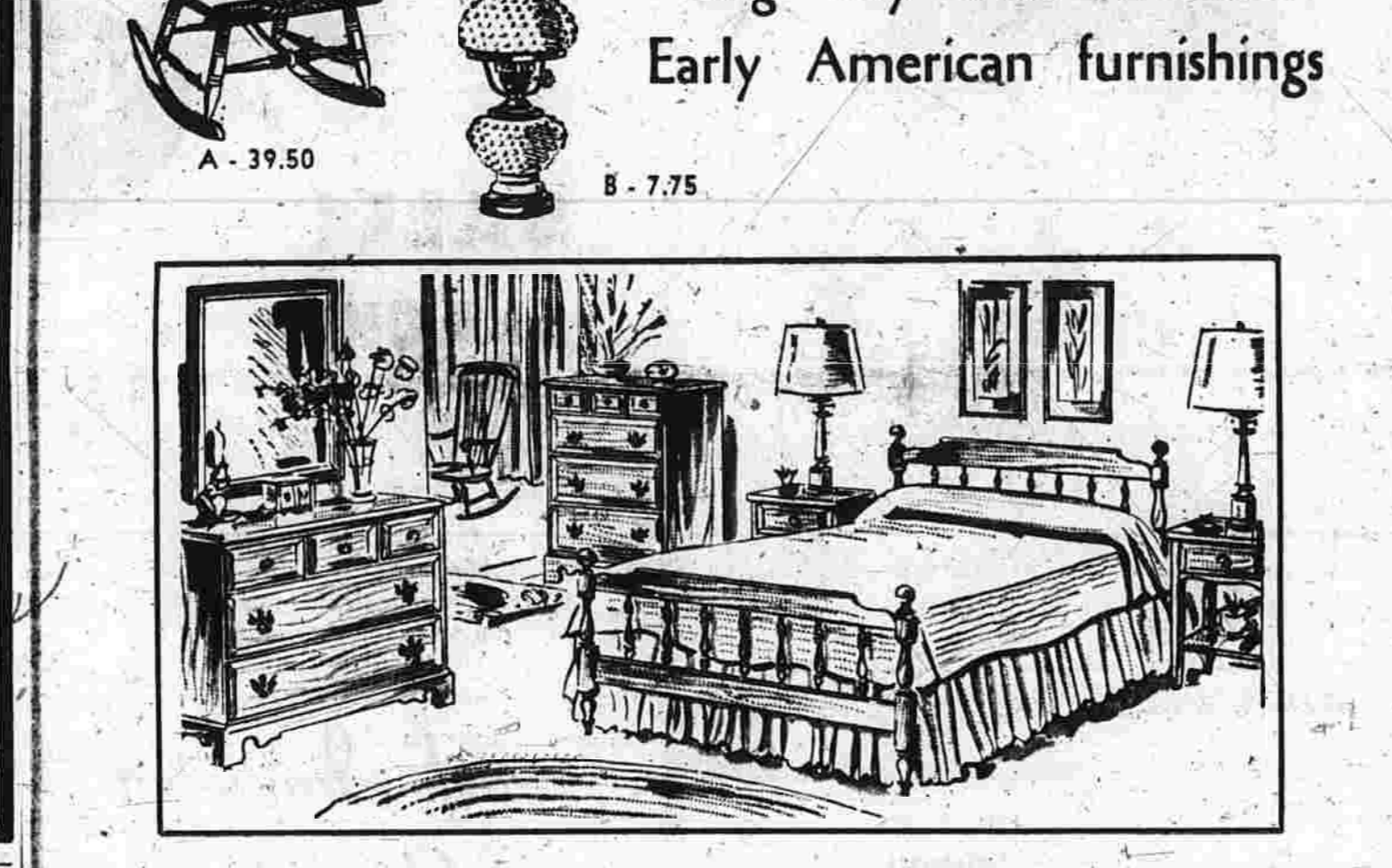

through the fire" of international negotiations.

Without naming Kennedy, Nixon said that in this changing world a mistake might be made in such negotiations that "could plunge the nation into war."

He said he and Lodge would let Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev know that "America will not be pushed around in any part of the world."

Nixon added that any dictator, if given the chance, would try to blackmail the free world to the point where "eventually you might have to fight."

"I don't think I will make it clear to Khrushchev that international police doesn't pay," he said.

Nixon got a rousing reception from the crowd of about 1,000 people at Danville.

He made an emphasis on his long association with Eisenhower as he campaigned through the state. He said he had been a primary Republican. The nominee obviously had not done enough to get the support of the voters.

Gov. William C. Stratton, who headed the train to Danville, predicted that Nixon will carry the state.

"We are coming up fast in Illinois and I think we are going to win it," he said.

The Republican candidate for the U. S. House, Larry Illinois, is an confident of that.

In his talk at Danville, Nixon referred to the rocks thrown at him during his talk some time ago and eggs were tossed at him yesterday.

"I've been through some real hecking and it's not going to stop me," he said.

"I don't believe anyone here who doesn't believe in just it and me."

The Republican nominee said that his Democratic rival said he would be the economy is going sour.

"It is true, how could they afford those tomatoes and eggs?" he asked. "They were pretty good."

At the outdoor rally in Muskogee, Mich., last night, where he attacked vigorously the economic views of his Democratic rival, Nixon encountered heckling from a small segment of the otherwise friendly crowd.

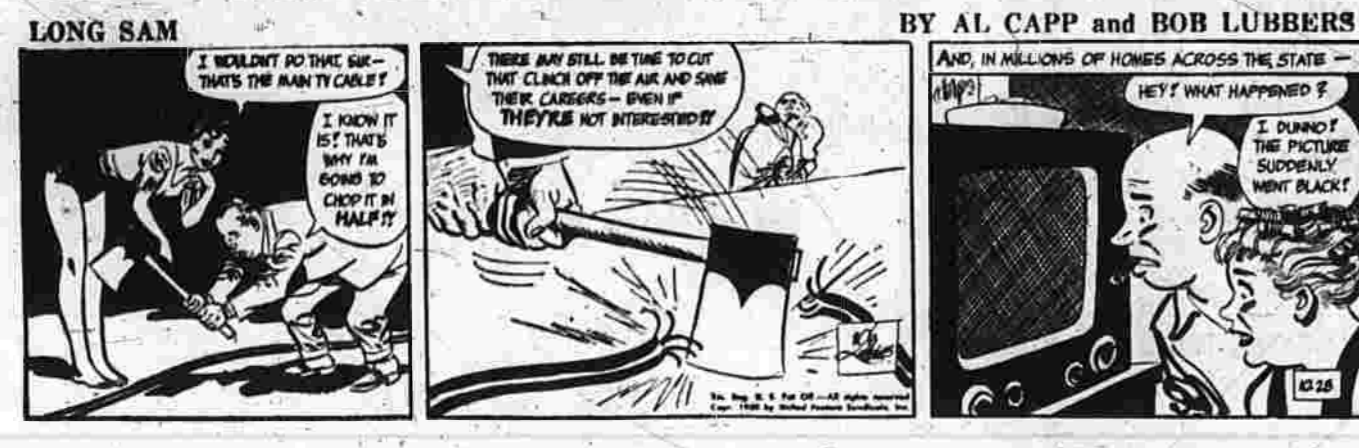

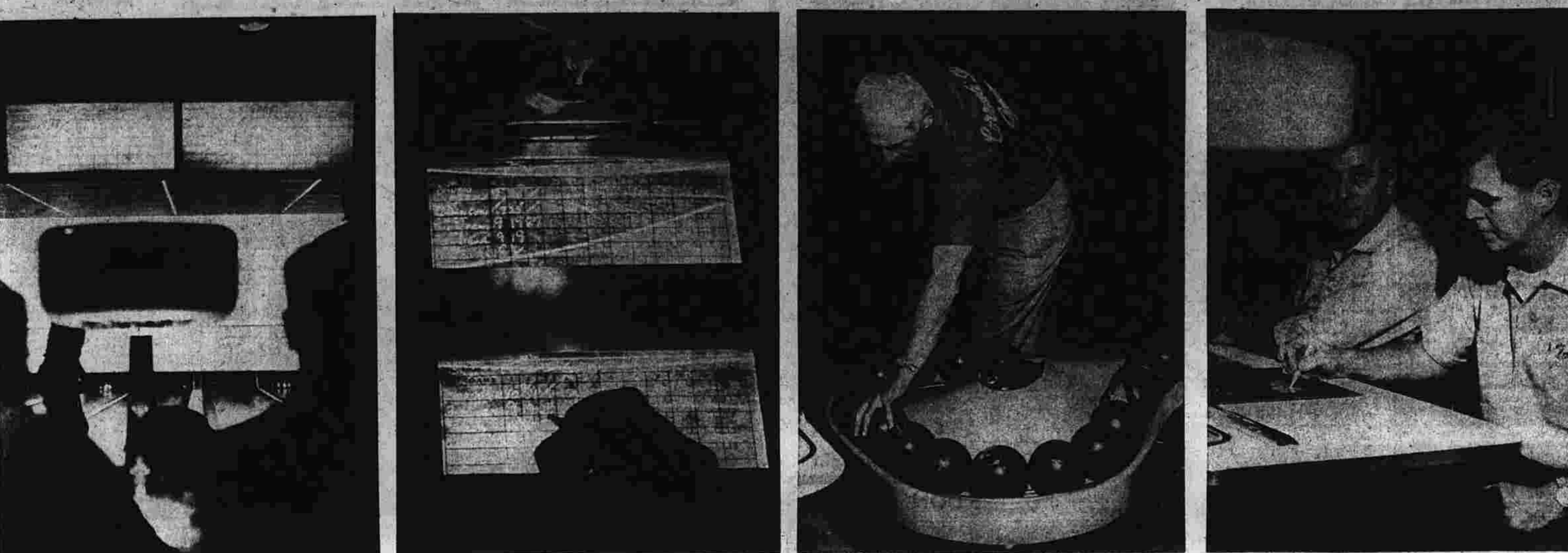

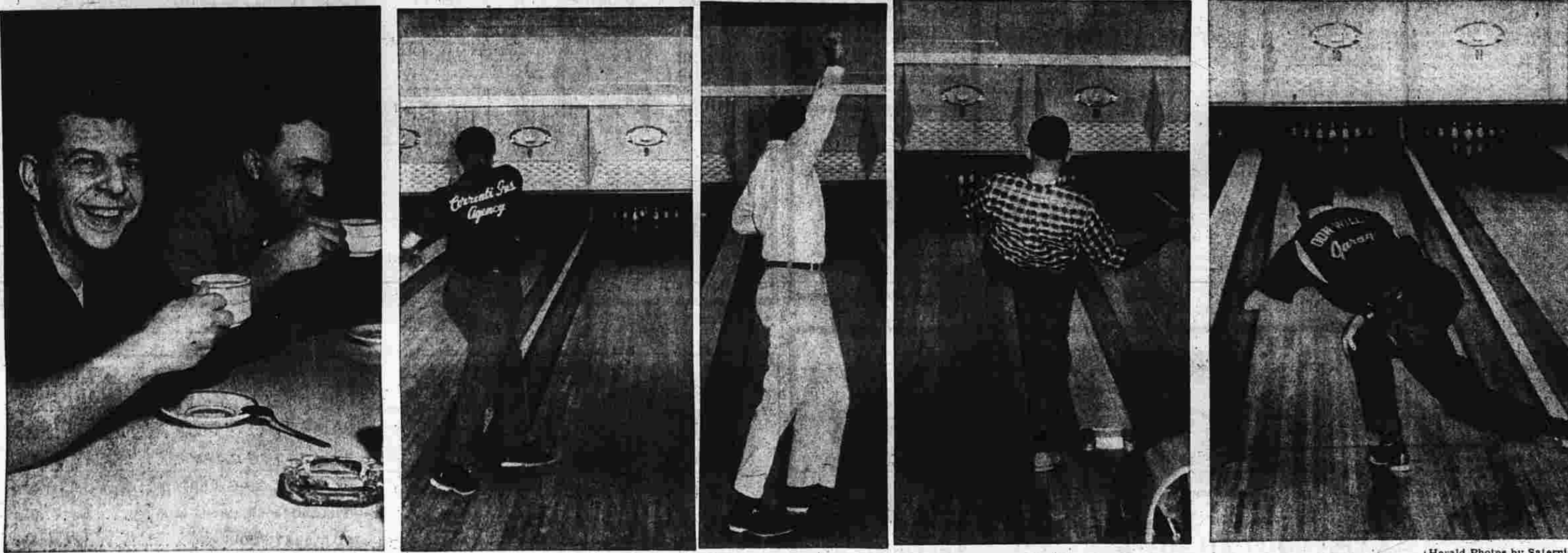
