





She said that, if she had her choice, she would "prefer kindergarten through eighth grade," rather than a separation of elementary pupils into divisions of kindergarten-Grade 3, Grades 4-6, and junior high. "Young children are not ready to be segregated. Remaining together keeps them on a level of growth. It tempers them socially to remain with the younger children," she added.

Present day teachers have "more awareness of the child and understanding," she said. "We are realistic in our approach, and we try to know why some children don't learn. There are more social workers to handle emotional upsets. In addition, there is a better parent-teacher relationship."

Favors Federal Aid

Miss Robb has "never been afraid of federal aid" to schools, she said. "Local taxation cannot continue to support schools." She would object, however, ahe added, to federally imposed curriculum standards. "I don't like a stereotyped control of education. Education is a local matter. But the two don't have to go hand in hand. I see no reason why a formula can't be devised," she said.


