Thanksgiving Not in Turkey Talk

Intervening turkeys is a difficult operation. The message becomes garbled at times. However, an attempt was made in this direction late last week at the Ellington farm of A and L Turkey Enterprises, the largest turkey grower in New England and one of the largest in the United States.

A 20-pound hen was approached initially, but refused to answer any questions until after an afternoon meal had been consumed (turkey ration was being distributed into large metal bunkers from an automatic feed wagon at the time).

A later fowl volunteered that the food was good. She said that according to the grapevine, meals were usually well appreciated at A and L's three other farms in Tolland, Vernon and Somers.

The tom had got to the heart of the matter, admittedly delicate. "What's your... ah... opinion of Thanksgiving?" he asked. "I don't know," she replied. "I've never heard of it."

Boiled down, or rather, reduced to the essentials, the common reply indicated that Thanksgiving is a word unknown in the turkey lexicon. On reflection, it is, perhaps, just as well.

The main interests of the hens appeared to be food, medicine and in between mealtime, when the pleasure of the matter was given way to the pleasant anticipation of the one to follow. Also, they seem to like to scratch, scratch the ground, or scratch themselves, the distinction is unimportant.

The toms, on the other hand, appear to have wider interests such as dramatics. Checking on the shape and condition of the birds on the Ellington range, it could be said that the toms certainly know their onions, if that's the right word.

Further discussion was precluded by the appearance of a man who introduced the interviewer to Gilman "Cappy" LaBrood, a about why man who talks slowly and who is one of the two prime movers behind A and L.

LaBrood has been in the turkey business most of his life. One year ago, he and Edwin Aberie of Vernon decided to merge their operations and go into the turkey business on a large scale.

They bought a farm in Somers, keeping their own farms in Tolland and Vernon. Early this year, they bought the fourth farm, on Ellington's Meadow Brook Rd. in the course of the current year, they

started on the farms, a factor which will have started another 9,000 birds before the year is up.

A and L have sold about 30,000 birds strictly for Thanksgiving dinner tables. Another 15,000 will be bought for Christmas dinners, LaBrood estimated.

Fresh turkeys from A and L's packing plant in Plainfield are sold as far afield as Boston and Providence. However, there is a kopher dresser in Hartford who buys the birds from A and L and ships them to distant points such as Chicago, Detroit and even Jerusalem.

Quality control is the important factor in A and L's success so far, LaBrood said. Breeding stock is raised on the farms, a factor which gives A and L control of each bird from egg to table.

Eight men work on the farms and up to 40 in peak seasons in the packing plant, the only farm-owned packing plant in the state. In the past eight days, the packing plant has been going full blast, about 2,000 birds a day for the Thanksgiving rush.

What LaBrood and Aberie are interested in now is promoting sale of birds to industrial or business firms on a large-order basis for company presents to employees and the like.

Will A and L grow? Probably, said LaBrood, who envisioned 150,000 birds on the various farms next year. He indicated, however, that would be tops.

man leaders, including Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and Economics Minister Ludwig Erhard. The aid program is approximately what the West Germans had been planning to spend even before the talks opened.

Although West Germany contributes money and manpower to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), it does not pay anything toward supporting U.S. troops in West Germany. Adenauer's government feels that to start doing so would awaken bad memories of the years when Germany paid postwar occupation costs.

Anderson and Dillon left Paris today. "We have no words at a time like this," Dillon said before boarding the plane. Reliable sources said negotiations to reach some sort of agreement will be completed by September here and in Washington.

Under the United States plan to be administered to provide the earliest possible use of funds. The Germans have indicated they will consider additional removal of trade restrictions against the United States.

The American negotiators reportedly had no dollar estimate of the possible effect in these three areas on the U.S. balance of payments problem.

Informed sources said the talks also failed to reach agreement on an increased German contribution to NATO.

Bonn suggested setting up some sort of a NATO fund out of which U.S. troop costs in Germany could be paid, informants said. This was rejected because the United States would be unwilling to make payments on their debts to the United States. This was turned down because the Americans felt these are due anyway.

Bonn also raised the issue of German assets in the United States.

Aimetti Asks Town Sell Land for Shop Center

A Manchester businessman who owns property in Vernon says a small shopping center may be built on the property if he can buy a small tract of adjacent town-owned land.

Arrigo Aimetti, manager of the Manchester Memorial Co., asked the Vernon Board of Selectmen last night to consider selling him the additional property, which contains the present town garage. The selectmen made no decision, but said they would determine the status of Aimetti's claim to the land in 1968.

In 1968, Aimetti bought his present property, formerly the town farm, for \$19,000. Later in 1968, he bought the adjacent parcel, but, due to a mix-up, the option may no longer be valid.

The property is on Rt. 30 at the Rockville-Vernon junction. Aimetti said he has a potential customer for the full property who plans construction of a few shops there. The tract is in commercial use.

First Selectman George E. Riley said the board will have to determine whether Aimetti still has an option and whether the town is empowered to sell the land. The preceding Board of Selectmen was empowered to sell the town farm property, he said.

The town farm property is no longer for development without the adjoining parcel, Aimetti said.

Riley said if the town can replace the land and building for its selling price, the town will benefit. The location is not a central one, he said, is far removed from the town's Tunnel Rd. and stockpile, and the present use is inadequate for equipment. It holds two vehicles.

Aimetti, who said he would like to discuss price when convenient, smiled at Selectman William R. Han's suggestion of \$10,000.

Since he bought the town farm, Aimetti has been paying taxes on the property, but has attempted no development.

"Right now," he said, "I'm crazy to own it." Riley, a contractor, bid against him for the property in 1958.

U.S. Orbits Two TV Cameras For Weather Forecasting

(Continued from Page One) working. Their theory was that the satellite dropped below the horizon just before it would have begun to send signals.

Asked if the first pictures could aid in making tomorrow's weather forecast, Dr. F. W. Reichelderfer, chief of the U.S. Weather Bureau, said with a smile that he doubted it.

He said details on such factors as the position of the satellite at the time of exposure cannot always be read off promptly in a way that would allow immediate use of a given picture. But he added:

"If a hurricane had been developing this morning and had not yet been picked up, it might be picked up by the satellite. The implication was that any huge system of storm clouds might be analyzed quickly even with pictures of a still experimental type."

Reichelderfer said that aside from potential benefits to the United States in weather forecasting, a fully operational Tiro system would be of great assistance internationally.

"For example," he said, "if we had had an operational weather satellite a month ago we could have given Pakistan far better information about the cyclones that produced floods in Pakistan."

The Weather Bureau chief said he had a visit today from a Japanese Disaster Prevention Committee which is much interested in the Tiro project.

Reichelderfer said the Japanese hope to receive Tiro information on a routine basis as an aid in predicting typhoons or other important weather development.

Reichelderfer, in a recording of equipment aboard Tiro II could detect the union of a tropical cyclone and a cold front.

Reichelderfer said that an associated project is a high altitude balloon carrying infrared cameras and different camera systems on television was launched at 4:30 p. m. EST near Sioux Falls, S. D.

The balloon-borne equipment will put scientists in a position to check data from Tiro II with that from a much lower altitude, he said.

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FDA Puts Ban On Red Color In Some Foods Adequate Living Cost

(Continued from Page One) later permitted limited use of them after presumably safe levels had been established. The FDA said the low level amount of color which has been shown to produce liver damage in test animals "was many times greater than the amounts of this color that would be consumed in the normal diet."

The announcement said laboratory testing would continue. But gave no indication whether limited use of the color would be permitted later.

Tests to date, Harvey said, "did not provide a basis for concluding that the color could cause cancer." Dr. Arnold J. Lehman, head of the U.S. Pharmacology Division, said some of the test animals developed malignant (cancerous) tumors, he emphasized, however, that scientists could not say definitely that the color is a cancer-inducing agent.

In addition to its use in cherries and frankfurter casings, the color has been used in combination with other dyes to produce various shades.

The FDA acted under a new color additive law which places on manufacturers the burden of proving that a color is safe before it can be used in foods, drugs and cosmetics.

A New York engineer estimated today there will be enough excess water in Lake Shesepit (Snepit) during the next 10 years to return to the Rockville Water and Aqueduct Co. to sell some of it to other water users.

Charles F. Jost, consulting engineer with the firm of Buck, Seifert and Jost, said he based his estimates on conditions in extreme dry years and said excess water would amount to about 8 million gallons, 10 years from now.

Excess water available for sale, amounts to about 9.6 million gallons, he added. Jost's statements came during the city's annual hearing on the State Water Commission in Hartford on its application for a franchise to sell water to the Connecticut Water Co.

Rockville Mayor Leo B. Flaherty Jr., unable to attend today's hearing, submitted a 4-page statement to the commission urging that it "reject any effort to sell this water beyond the franchise area."

The statement was directed to Director William S. Flaherty pointing to the history of the city, saying the abundant water supply from Lake Shesepit has been a consistent attraction for industry both past and present. He said the future of the rapidly growing Rockville-Vernon area is linked to retention of the water supply.

He said there truly is an abundant supply, he indicated, the city would not oppose the sale. However, he said, "we do not believe we have a surplus of water. I have been informed that we will be approaching a critical point in our own water supply within the next 15 years."

(Continued from Page One) in their own homes, largely free of mortgage. But more accurate rental costs were available. Budget food costs range from \$20 a year in Houston to \$200 in Scranton, Pa., to a high of \$1,067 in Chicago.

Overall budget costs in eight of the 20 cities surveyed ranged between \$3,025 and \$5,125. Costs were under \$3,025 in six cities and over \$3,125 in six cities. It assumed costs would run lower in small towns.

The budget assumes a retired couple already has most of the household appliances that have come to be regarded as essential in the American home. Therefore only fractional replacement cost is budgeted every year. It assumed the wife does all the cooking and most of the cleaning and laundry.

The medical care allowance is approximately 2 per cent of the total budget. One of the loopholes is that the budget assumes the retired couple lives in a two to three-room rented apartment. The bureau notes that retired couples typically live

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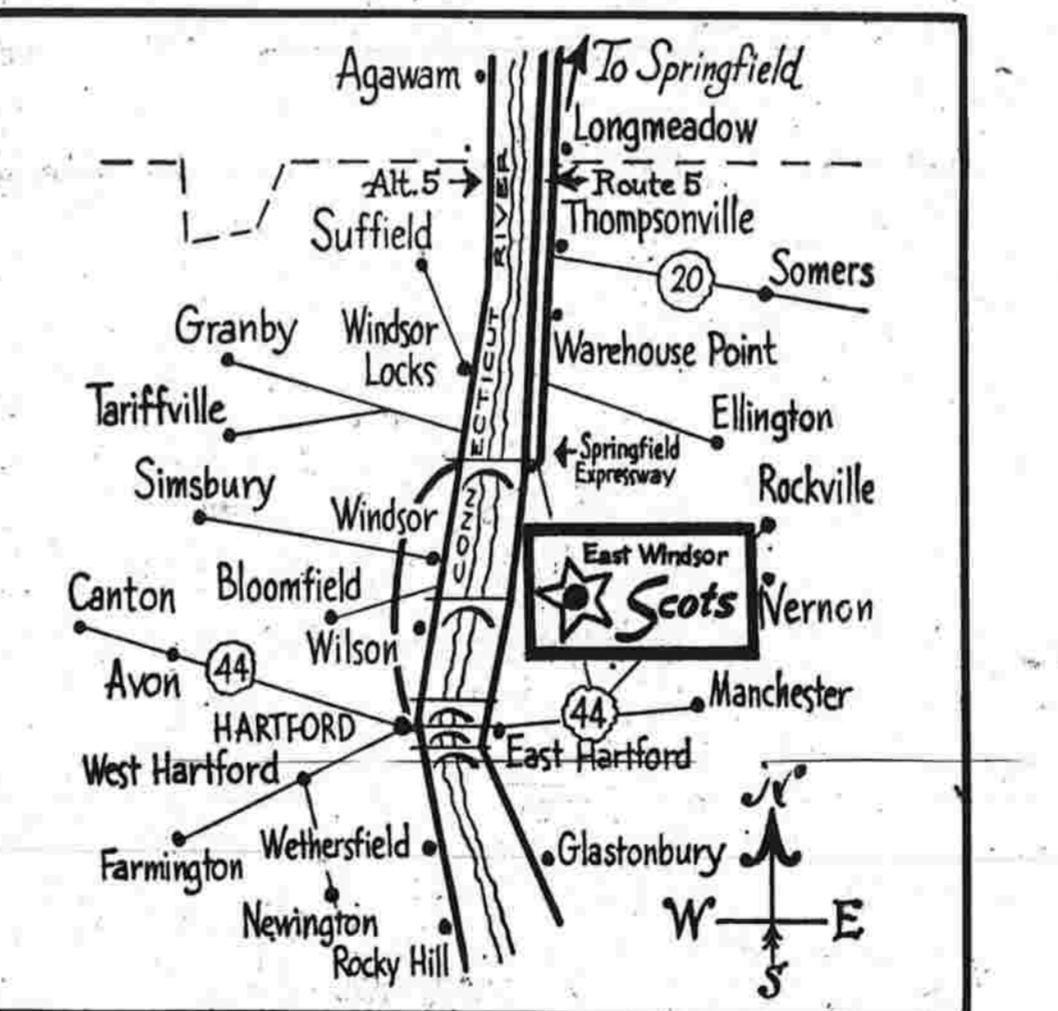
