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On Way to Venus

Russians Loft Space Station

(By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS) A 1,418-pound Soviet "Space Station" hurtled toward a mid-May rendezvous with the planet Venus...

A space traveler carrying a banner emblazoned with the Soviet coat of arms should reach the area of Venus when Earth's sister planet will be about 25 million miles away...

The latest Soviet space shot—second in eight days—was aimed at investigating conditions on and around the planet, whose perpetual mantle of clouds has made it a mystery to scientists.

The aim is either to hit Venus or to have the ship pass closely enough to send back detailed studies...

The space ship has a radio transmitter believed capable of sending messages across millions of miles of space...

At the time he talked with reporters, Bayzkin said the rocket fired was considerably less than 621,000 miles from the Earth.

Scientists and officials on both sides of the Iron Curtain hailed the Venus shot as the greatest space feat since Russia orbited her first Sputnik three years ago.

The Labor Secretary said he would visit the South and West and such areas as West Virginia, Massachusetts and the Mesabi Iron Range in Minnesota. His itineraries are incomplete.

As on his first tour, Goldberg said he would talk with unemployed workers and their families and consult in "town meetings" with labor, management and local government leaders to get their ideas on how the recession can be licked.

At each stop on his just completed trip, Goldberg outlined economic recovery proposals of the new administration and said Kennedy is determined to restore the nation to full employment and production.

"I am sure we will be able to alleviate the effects of unemployment and put the country back to work," the Secretary said confidently on his return to Washington last night.

He reported wide acceptance of Kennedy's plans to supply extra jobless benefits, grants to needy children, a higher minimum wage, and aid to education, housing and aged health needs.

Goldberg said this acceptance was true of the public at large; business as well as labor. He explained that objections heard at meetings on his trip, from some businessmen represented only "healthy discussion."

"People from all walks of life with whom I spoke," he said, "are looking to this administration to do something about their problems. We are going to be a 'do something' administration. People are confident that aid is coming."

French Object To Wording of Soviet Protest

Paris, Feb. 13 (AP)—France told the Soviet Union yesterday it could not accept some of the language Moscow used in its note protesting the French buzzing of Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev's plane off the Algerian coast.

The French note addressed to Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko said France will let the Kremlin know the results of its investigation. But the note said "certain terms employed in the Soviet note" sent here Saturday are considered inadmissible. The words objected to were not specified.

French jet fighters intercepted the Soviet plane last Thursday while Brezhnev was en route to Morocco and Guinea. The French said one fighter fired warning shots to attack the plane's attention after the 4-jet straggled was found too far south of its scheduled course for Morocco and failed to identify itself. France expressed "sincere regrets" for the incident but insisted its patrols looking for arms shipments to the Algerian rebels have the right to intercept and plane within an 80-mile "zone of responsibility" along the Algerian coast.

America's astrochimp is back from sub-orbital flight. A new, huge Soviet satellite is circling the Earth. A Soviet rocket is speeding toward Venus.

Castro Red Puppet, Ex-Envoy Asserts

Hartford, Feb. 13 (AP)—"The real prime minister of Cuba is the Soviet ambassador there, Castro is just a puppet," the ex-ambassador to Great Britain under Fidel Castro said today.

"Che Guevara (in charge of the Cuban economy) is really No. 2 man in the country, right after the Soviet ambassador," added Sergio Rojas, slated to be a speaker tonight at Hunt Memorial before the Hartford Dental Society.

Senor Rojas, who broke with Castro because he saw increasing Communist control in the country, was slated to tell of the takeover in his talk "Cuba and the great Communist conspiracy."

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Death of Lumumba Revealed in Congo

Elisabethville, Katanga, Feb. 13 (AP)—Patrice Lumumba is dead, the Katanga government announced today, and the African villagers who killed him have received a reward of \$8,000. The Interior Ministry of the Congo's secessionist province declared the Congo's deposed premier was "massacred yesterday morning" along with two aides said to have fled with him three days earlier.

Godefroid Munongo, the interior minister, told reporters: "I will speak frankly. If people accused us of killing Lumumba, I will reply: 'Prove it.'"

The effect of the slayings was to bring the long-brewing Congo situation to a new crisis, holding the threat of civil war. It came as Katanga was flexing its military muscles with a drive which brought a U.N. warning.

In Elisabethville the Interior Minister refused to name the village where Lumumba died.

"We do not want the Africans of the tribe which killed Lumumba to be identified because they might be the subject of eventual reprisals by Lumumbists," said Munongo.

"We cannot honestly blame these people because they have rid the Congo, and the whole world, of a problem which certain people have exaggerated and a problem which menaced the existence of humanity."

"This village will be given the total of 400,000 francs (\$8,000) promised by the Katanga cabinet for the capture of the three men, and shall say no more about it."

Munongo called Lumumba a criminal responsible for tens of thousands of deaths in Kasai and Katanga Provinces, and insisted the handling of the case was a local matter for provincial authorities.

He said, in this connection, that the United States had handled itself the executions of Sacco and Vanzetti, the Massachusetts pair seized in the 20s for a payroll robbery in which a messenger was killed; Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, the convicted atomic spies; and Caryl Chessman, the convicted California rapist.

"I only remind you," the Interior Minister told newsmen, "that in these well known cases, the opinion of the world and high religious authorities asked for grace for the condemned, but in vain. The United States ignored them and considered the matter entirely their own affair."

Lumumba, firebrand of Congo independence and first premier of the new country, was 35.

"We will not disclose the name of the village nor the tribe to which the villagers belong because we do not want them to suffer any reprisals in the future," Munongo said.

But he asserted the place of death was not far from the spot where their escape car had been

Dag Asks UN Probe Death of Lumumba

United Nations, N. Y., Feb. 13 (AP)—Secretary-general Dag Hammarskjöld today urged a full and impartial inquiry into the slaying of deposed Congo Premier Patrice Lumumba. The Soviet Union immediately blasted his proposal as hypocritical.

U. S. Delegate Adlai E. Stevenson quickly supported Hammarskjöld and appealed to all countries to avoid any action which might inflame the situation.

The news that the controversial Lumumba had been killed in secessionist Katanga province came as the U. N. Security Council met to resume debate on the Congo problem. After hearing several speakers, the debate was adjourned until Wednesday because of the new developments.

Ambassador Omar Loufi, of the United Arab Republic, called the death of Lumumba, "premeditated murder." He said it would have serious consequences both in the Congo and internationally.

British Sir Patrick Dean expressed "profound shock."

Hammarskjöld told the council he already had instructed Brig. Gen. Mengesha Hyasou, chief of staff of the U.N. Congo Command, to push the investigation and to insist upon complete cooperation of the Katanga authorities.

Stevenson called the news of Lumumba's death "distressing and deplorable."

He called for an acceleration of efforts to find a Congo peace formula.

Soviet Delegate Valerian A. Zorin declared that the provincial government of Moïse Tshombe must be made to pay for the killing of Lumumba.

He also assailed Hammarskjöld, blaming him for permitting such a thing under the blue flag of the United Nations.

"We find a hypocritical ring in these proposals for a so-called investigation," Zorin declared. "We have not the slightest confidence in the Secretary-general or his staff after all that had been committed in the Congo and Katanga."

Zorin criticized other members of the 11-nation council for turning down a Soviet request for a private meeting on the Congo.

The Soviet Union tried and failed Saturday to get a private meeting of the council that afternoon to consider the rumors that the Congo nationalist leader and two associates imprisoned with him in Katanga Province were murdered. The council president, Sir Patrick Dean of Britain, consulted other council members and found most of them were against holding a special meeting because they had no report from Hammarskjöld yet on Lumumba.

The Soviet delegation then sent a statement to other council members

was in the days of his gaudy dictatorship in Leopoldville. The dictatorship never came off effectively, but his death quite easily could set off a new spasm of terror and bloodshed in the Congo.

Lumumba's fanatic, left-leaning lieutenant, Antoine Gizenga in Stanleyville, with the moral support of Moscow and President Abdel Gamal Nasser of Egypt, is capable of extreme measures against anti-Dumumba Europeans and Congolese in his domain.

Anicet Kashehama, another less forceful subalterner of the former premier, is cut in the same mold, but his domain in Kivu Province is isolated from the main theaters of conflict and less accessible to outside aid.

The events in these two centers during the next few days may well determine the course the future in the Congo will take.

Even before the Katanga government of President Moïse Tshombe announced the "massacre" of Lumumba, forces of the ineffectual central government in Leopoldville were moving against Stanleyville by Congo River steamer.

The United Nations, unable so far to fulfill its assigned task of maintaining order in the Congo, now faces its supreme test.

The quick reaction of Moscow Radio to the violent events in Katanga is a blow to the position the Communist world will take.

"Agents of the Belgian colonizers" murdered Lumumba, Moscow said, adding that "the world will not forgive the colonists this heinous crime."

Gizenga in Stanleyville, as Lumumba's deputy prime minister, presumably is the heir apparent to the willow, fast talking leader

Communique On Lumumba

Elisabethville, Katanga, Feb. 13 (AP)—The text of a communique issued to newsmen today by Katanga Interior Minister Godefroid Munongo on Patrice Lumumba's death:

"I have called you together to announce the death of Lumumba and his accomplices. It was yesterday evening that an African arrived near Kolwezi, but whose (this arrival point) is refused to say. The African came to my private residence to announce that Lumumba and the others have been massacred yesterday morning by the inhabitants of a little village situated at some distance from the place where the car stolen by Lumumba was found. We asked ourselves how the three fugitives could have arrived there. After getting this news I warned President Tshombe and the principal authorities of the country."

"This morning we went to the place by aircraft. We had people who were able to identify the bodies of the three men. We were accompanied by a doctor Piers, who had to establish the official cause of death and is—"

Salinger told a news conference he had informed the President by telephone of dispatches telling of the killing of Lumumba. Salinger said "Any further comment will come from the State Department."

HEALTH PLAN OFFERED

Washington, Feb. 13 (AP)—President Kennedy today sent Congress a draft of proposed legislation to carry out his health insurance program. It calls for a \$1.5 billion increase in Social Security taxes to finance a program for 14,200,000 Americans 65 or older. "I believe the need for such insurance is urgent," Kennedy said in letters to Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, the Senate's presiding officer, and House Speaker Sam Rayburn, D-Tex.
