Marsh Style Odd; Skilled But Detached

Ozan Marsh, planist, was heard
in recital Saturday evening, as the
second in the series of program offered by the Community Concert
Association of Manchester. An
audience of moderate size listened
to him with evident enjoyment, demanding several encores at the
close of the program, which was
devoted to music by Lisst and
Chopin.

devoted to music by Lisst and Chopin.

Mr. Marsh is a thoroughly competent pianist from a technical viewpoint and demonstrated a keyboard facility verging on true virtuosity. His conceptions of the music offered, were well thoughteut and stamp him as an intellectual pianist.

On the other hand, he plays with a curious effect of detachment, and his performances were logical rather than emotional. This seemed oddly at variance with the compositions of Chopin and Lisst. He failed to be convincing as a virtuoso, and he lacked conviction as an emotionalist.

lacked conviction as an emotionalist.

The program opened with six Etudes by Chopin, a very difficult opening group, to say the least, and one which marked Mr. Marsh as being possessed of complete self-confidence in his technique. They received uneven performances, however. The Etude in thirds and the so-called "Ocean" Etude received the best performances, while the F-minor Etude, was muddy, and suffered from over-pedaling.

Three Mazurkas by Chopin followed. These lacked conviction either as true peasant dances, or as polished and stylized examples fit for performance in fashionable Gallic drawing rooms. They were played with excellent tone control, and a fine sense of rubato, but the curious sense of detachment persisted.

Probably the best number of the evening was "Les Funerailles" by Lizzt. Here Mr. Marsh was in his element. The work is not so transcendentally difficult as to re-quire true virtuosity in the grand

quire true virtuosity in the grand manner, nor is it so profound emo-tionally as to be beyond the pen-chant for restraint which the pi-anist demonstrated throughout the evening.

Chopin's First Ballade and two other Liszt works completed the program. Altogether it was a very enjoyable evening, but one which was marked by inconsistencies.


