Kennedy Unveils Program to Sweep Back Recession

Washington, Feb. 2 (AP)—President Kennedy today handed Congress a sweeping anti-recession program built on faster federal spending, higher old age pensions and an emergency extension of unemployment pay.

Kennedy's highly-packaged 7,500-word special message brought the news that joblessness rose by 900,000 in January to a total of 5.4 million.

The President said he would submit further proposals to Congress within 75 days if business does not improve.

His message spoke of the general expectation that there will be a "minor improvement" in business this year.

Kennedy predicted his economic proposals would "abate the waste and misery" of unemployment and "restore momentum to the American economy."

He said they would not, by themselves, unbalance the \$89.9 billion budget unveiled last month by former President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

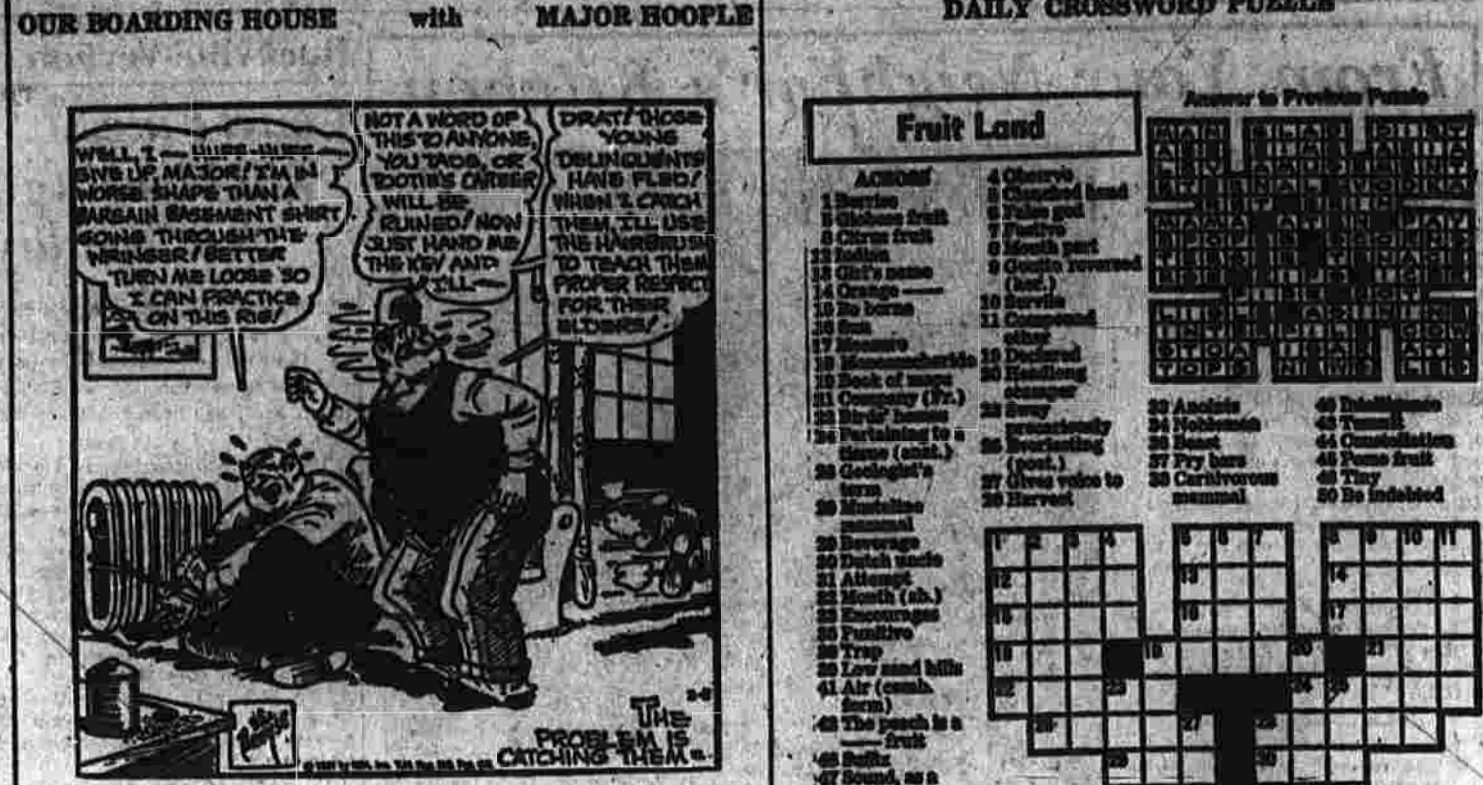
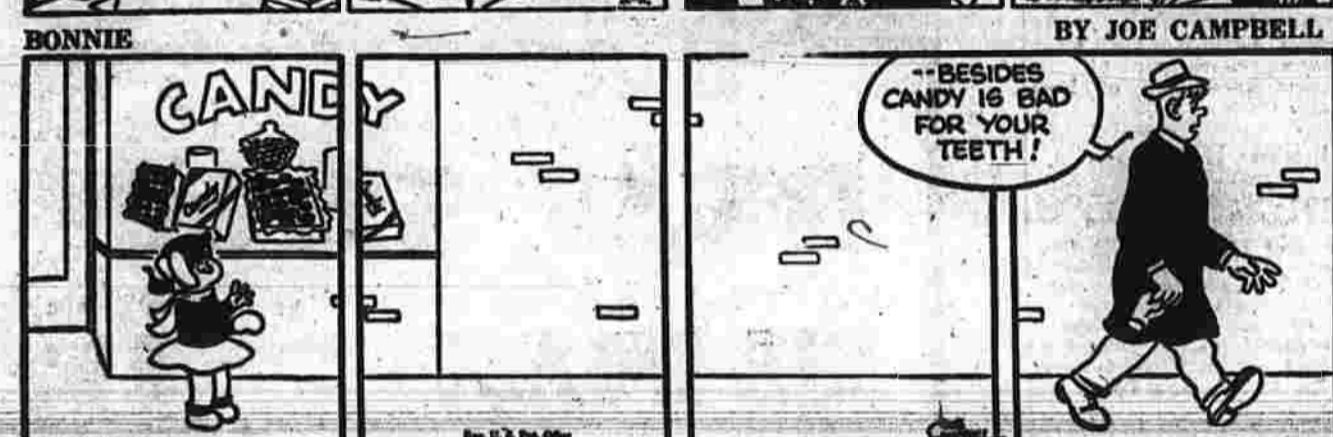

Deep Freeze Grips Northeast 15th Day

(Continued from Page One)

New Hampshire and Vermont were hardest hit by the cold, with readings of 15 below at Newport, Vt., on the Canadian border; 8 below at Bangor, Maine, and 14 at Caribou in the northwestern part of Maine. The cold weather brought other troubles to the area.

Steamer service to Nantucket was cut off by the ice pack at the island, and several small ships were caught in thick ice at the approach to the Cape Cod Canal.

Ice plagued other New England harbors which lacked heavy shipping to keep channels open.

A hospital and 1,000 homes in the Boston suburb of Winthrop were without utility power for more than an hour during the early morning hours. The hospital got by with its emergency generator, but power loss cut off power heaters in households and other buildings until service was restored.

In Danvers, 10 elementary schools were closed by the heavy coating of ice which was laid down during the night.

The Coast Guard reported the frigid weather had caused an emergency in its system of buoys and channel markers.

The ice dragged hundreds of them away from their charted positions.

Some fisher and bell buoys were out of commission because of heavy coatings of ice which caused them to capsize.

More than 2,000 of these floating aids to navigation are used along the New England coast.

Deep cold records were shattered again today throughout the Northeast.

Officially, the mercury plummeted 23 degrees below zero at Watertown and Orono in upstate New York.

In New York City the 15-day "deep freeze" ties an 89-year-old record.

With below-freezing temperatures virtually a certainty all day today, the current consecutive-day run matches the previous record made in 1881.

At 5 a.m. the mercury dropped to 1 degree below zero—its lowest since 1881.

At 7:05 a.m., the mercury dropped to 2 degrees below zero—the coldest since the 8 below zero on Feb. 15, 1848.

J-A Program In Production

A group of Rockville and Vernon, N.H., residents pre-arranged yesterday set up a sales booth at Hartman's Supermarket, 100 Windsor Ave. and began to peddle a liquid clear called Kemo.

By 8 p.m., the group, working in shifts, had sold seven half-gallon squeeze bottles for application.

The sales venture marked a turning point in the fortunes of Kemo, one of three Junior Achievement companies which are currently in operation in the Rockville-Killington area.

The other two companies, Decor and U-200 Co., were so busy at the production line in the basement of the old high school building on Park and School Sts. in Rockville, turning out ceramic tile dishes and coffee planters, respectively.

Kemo Achievement, a nationwide activity, is three years old in Rockville and Killington. Students, juniors and seniors, are selected after interviews by sponsoring companies.

This year, there are about 40 youths, girls and boys, involved in the three J-A companies in the city. 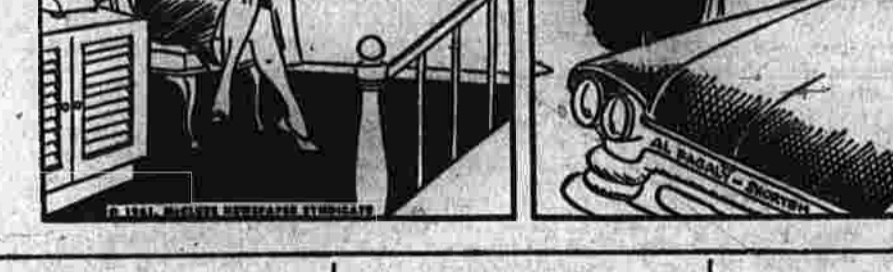
