





An Agriculture Department report on the farm real estate market said today hand values toward the close of 1960 were at the same level as last July 1. There had been a steady trend in market values of land since 1941, with only two minor interruptions.
Walues leveled off with a 250 per cent increase over those prevailing at the start of 1941:
A major factor in halting the upturn, the report said, was uncertainty regarding future federal farm programs. The year 1960 brought election of a new administration committed to stronger government efforts to attack farm problems of surpluses and declining farm incomes.
Another factor was recent increases in interest rates on land prices in 11 states elsewhere. Iowa led with a dip of 5 per cent, followed by Illinois and Ohio with 3 per cent.


