March 4 (P)—The West Ger-man mark was revalued to-day in the strongest move yet to ease the pressure on the American dollar. Effective immediately the dollar will buy only 4 marks instead of 4 marks and 20 pfennings and all other foreign currencies were ad-justed accordingly. The measure, disclosed by the Deutsche Bank in Frankfurt, was confirmed by the West German economics ministry. Details were expected to be released at a Bonn news conference tomorow. The move was preceded by a

flurry of stock speculation and a rapid weakening of the dollar in the German market. It came after repeated denials by both the Bonn government and the Deutsche Bank of any revaluation plans. Rumors of revaluation of the German mark, long recognized as one of the strongest currencies in Europe, have cropped up period- teally over the past few years.
