

Kennedy May Issue Policy Statement on Laos Tonight

"I have absolutely no comment on that," Ballinger replied.

Authorities here said privately, however, that some of those moves were clearly precautionary steps, others were designed to begin a substantial increase in U.S. military assistance to the Royal Lao government.

At Hong Kong, the U.S. aircraft carrier Midway and two destroyers suddenly departed for an undisclosed destination several days ahead of schedule. They were believed heading for the waters of southeast Asia.

Speculation immediately broke out that other units of the U.S. 7th Fleet, ordinarily stationed in the Philippines-Formosa area were moving south. Authorities here indicated it was unlikely Kennedy would make a stopover in the Far East en route to Laos.

Meanwhile Secretary of State Dean Rusk prepared to leave tonight for Bangkok, Thailand where on Monday he will meet with foreign ministers from the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization. SEATO is the agency through which the United States will attempt to direct intervention in Laos outside formal channels.

Pro-Communist forces are pushing toward the Laotian capital, Vientiane.

Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson said yesterday following a conference with Rusk and Director Allen W. Dulles of the Central Intelligence Agency that the United States "is not in a mood to make any concessions."

Kennedy's news conference was originally set for 4 p.m. yesterday, then delayed while he had to speak at the State Department.

Johnson spoke out after a conference in which Rusk and Dulles discussed the crisis with Senate and House leaders. He said the United States "is going to be reasonable and prudent in all of its moves."

Like other officials who have spoken about the situation, publicly or privately he did not indicate what moves Kennedy plans.

Despite the atmosphere of secrecy there were persistent reports that Kennedy has already ordered preparations to increase the number of troops in Laos.

The timing of Kennedy's news conference gave rise to a rumor that Kennedy in effect was giving the Russians a 24-hour ultimatum to get out of Laos. But administration officials quickly said the story of any 24-hour time limit is totally untrue.

The New York Herald Tribune said today that Kennedy is rushing helicopters long-range aircraft and other military supplies to Laos to keep it from being taken over by the Communists. The use of American troops as an ultimate step was not ruled out by the newspaper added in a Washington story.

Obituary Rev. Brookes Passes at 81

Rockville — The Rev. Dr. George Savage Brookes, 81, pastor emeritus of Union Congregational Church, area historian and author, died yesterday morning at his home, 103 Union St.

He served as pastor of Union Church for 20 years, until retiring in 1946.

Born in Pennett, England, Oct. 4, 1879, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Brookes, he came to the United States in 1912, paying his passage with the proceeds of a book, "Silent Memories," he had written.

He wrote several books, including a history of Rockville and a biography of the Rev. Dr. Joseph E. Ryan.

His other books included "Friendship's Blessing," "These Hungry Years," and "Rocky Hill, N.Y. America."

In his writings, he discussed the youth in a Middleburg, N.Y., where his father owned the equipment store.

At 14 he was apprenticed to a printer in New York City for seven years at three shillings a week.

For three years after coming to the United States, he worked as a printer in New York City.

Later he attended the University of Maine and Bangor, Maine, where he received a B.S. degree in 1907.

He held early pastorates in Housatonic and Sharon, Pa. Before coming to Rockville in 1920, he was pastor of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Somerville and Ellsworth, Me.

The Rev. Dr. Brookes was invited by the University of Maine in 1960 to give a commencement address. He wrote that when he addressed the university he had even seen the inside of a gold mine and was honored by the institution.

After his retirement from the Union Congregational Church, he served as interim pastor at Columbia, N.Y., and in 1957, he was also active in the Knights of Augustus, Maine, Leslie Brookes and George Brookes, both of Manchester, two daughters, Mrs. Albert Cunningham of Bar Harbor, Maine, and Mrs. Louis Kelly of Ellington, and nine grandchildren.

Private funeral services will be held at 10 a.m. at the funeral home tonight from 7 to 9 o'clock.

Surviving are two other sons, Philip and Edmund Brookes, and six grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow at 2:30 p.m. at the F. W. Carmon Funeral Home, 6 Popponock Ave., Windsor. Burial will be in Mt. St. Benedict Cemetery, Bloomfield.

Friends may call at the funeral home tonight from 7 to 9 o'clock.

were accused of brutal repression of the anti-Rhee rioters and had been hesitant of using force against demonstrators who threatened violence.

The police went into action last night with tear gas and nightsticks after more than 300 of the 1,000 demonstrators tried to march on the premier's residence. Police arrested 122 of the demonstrators, including three leaders of minor Socialist parties.

Alarmed, Chang's government put the Seoul police force on an emergency alert and announced it would "punish severely those connected with acts of violence."

Home minister Shin Hyung-an said the government was determined to get enactment of the two security bills, which are still being drafted.

One of the bills would ban demonstrations at night, within 20 yards of government buildings or in front of foreign embassies and all private homes. The other sets penalties for publications that "grate encourage or sympathize with" Communist organizations, anyone who fail to surrender to the authorities as soon as they are summoned into South Korea from North Korea.

Socialist parties are leading the fight against the two bills, and as far only a minority of the students have joined in the campaign against Chang. The premier's critics accuse him of trying to divert public attention from poverty, unemployment and other social and economic evils.

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Andover Finance Unit Hears School Board Report

At an open hearing of the Board of Finance last Tuesday, chairman Andrew Gasper of the Board of Education, estimated that the 1961-62 school budget would total approximately \$2,200,000.

The hearing was also attended by elementary school principal Mrs. Doris E. Chamberlain, Mrs. Susan Plaker, school clerk, Board of Education members, Mrs. William Kowalski and Mrs. Robert Asinger, and seven residents.

Among the questions raised by finance board members was "How is the town-owned bus system making out? We hear all kinds of rumors such as the buses are falling apart."

Gasper replied, "As far as we know, all the buses are in very good order. The buses had to be fixed on one just recently."

As a matter of interest, he pointed out that the least costly bus to operate is the largest. "The passenger," Gasper said, "that the town will be paying for is less than the contractor's bids at the end of four years, will own the buses. He anticipates that the buses will last from eight to 10 years."

In addition, he expects that \$500 to \$2,000 will be left in the transportation budget at the end of this, the first year of operation. He added it might be possible to have the surplus amount put into a separate fund for the year which would become greater each year as the buses depreciate.

Gasper added that the town-owned system had meant considerable work for Mrs. Chamberlain. He said the board was fortunate in having a conscientious man like Ernest Eib in charge of the drivers.

Later Mrs. Chamberlain commented that Eib checks in at the school office each morning at the completion of the bus run and reports on any work that needs to be done. In this way, action can be taken immediately.

In previous years when the school had contracted for bus service, there had been numerous complaints from parents on the condition and operation of buses. The new system has resulted in a much better control of drivers although, Mr. Gasper said, there are still occasional complaints of speeding, mostly in the late afternoon.

Gasper said the fire department was pleased with the savings of from nine to 20 cents per gallon on gasoline from the pump now used by both the bus system and the department. The principal added that both the RHAM High School and elementary school children have taken very good care of the buses and the inside are as good as new.

Board of Finance chairman John H. Yeomans said he thought the board, principal and clerk should be complimented on the work they have done on the town-owned system. This was the first official report the finance board had received although a quarterly report had been mailed earlier on operating expenses.

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From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

By MARGE FLENN One of the favorite recipes of Mrs. Robert J. Tierney, 246 Center St., will be published in a cookbook recently compiled by the Ladies of St. James' parish, entitled "Our Favorites," which will be distributed next month.

Mrs. Tierney, chairman of the cookbook committee, contributed a recipe called "By Cracky Bars." Another of her family's favorites is "Watershed," or Danish pastry, a recipe from "A World of Good Eating," given to Mrs. Tierney when she was a new bride almost eight years ago.

By Cracky Bars Sift together: 1/2 cup all-purpose flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon soda. Blend together: 1/2 cup vegetable shortening and 1/2 cup sugar, creaming well. Add: 2 eggs, beat well. Combine: 1/2 cup milk and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Add alternately with dry ingredients to batter mixture.

Place: 1/2 of batter in a second bowl. Add: 1 square (1 oz.) melted chocolate and roll into a square. Divide the dough into six portions. Insert one-third of a stick of butter or margarine in the center of each, and fold the sides and ends over the center. Roll out to distribute the butter, and re-fold each again. Place in the refrigerator for about two hours.

Roll lightly, cut into strips and form into flat pinwheels. Place on a greased baking sheet and let rise for an hour and a half in a warm room. Brush with melted butter and bake in a pre-heated oven at 400 degrees for about eight minutes. Make a thin frosting of orange and almond flavoring, water and confectioners sugar, and brush over the pastries while they are still hot.

Mrs. Tierney offers these pastries for Sunday breakfast or with coffee for committee meeting refreshments. Mrs. Tierney was born in Manchester, and was educated in Manchester schools. Range, Ease Mark Recital By Soprano

By JOHN GIBBER Victoria De Los Angeles presented an excellent program to an audience of moderate size, gathered last night at UConn's Jorgensen Auditorium.

I have always felt she is one of the finest singers before the public today, and last night's performance, only served to confirm my opinion. The program was varied as to language and musical content, and it is difficult to say that any of the numbers she sang was done better than any other. She sang in Italian, French, English, German, and Spanish, with excellent diction in all languages, and with fine accent in them, as well. Her German is particularly good as her native Spanish, for example.

The program opened with three baroque numbers, in which she demonstrated easy facility with the style of the period, as well as an excellent breath control, and a fine sense of rhythm. The pattern of the evening, both as to her singing, and her reception by the audience.

The fact is, Miss De Los Angeles, has such a remarkable range. She demonstrated over two octaves, last night, and such excellent technique, that she sings everything easily. So easily, that the audience was inclined to take her a bit for granted.

Her audience accorded her generous and even enthusiastic applause, but never the tumultuous reception which they have sometimes given performances of lesser merit.

Her leader from the pens of Schubert and Brahms, brought us to a conclusion. Despite the vast reaches of the auditorium, Miss De Los Angeles continued to preserve the air of intimacy so necessary to the German lied. Further, her easy familiarity with the language, and her excellent diction, made these a joy to hear.

Following intermission we heard "Una voce poco fa," from "The Barber." The artist sang this in the range where the composer wrote it, about the original, although a program note explained about the original setting.

As first conceived, the aria has little brilliance and some expressiveness. The audience was used to a coloratura soprano version, apparently, and while they enjoyed it, it certainly felt they failed to realize just how excellently this number was sung.

The group of Spanish songs which brought the program to a close, were also somewhat of a surprise to the audience. Spanish music is perhaps the least understood by Americans, who invariably confine it to their minds with South American composition.

Miss De Los Angeles' offerings were all relatively modern, and very varied in conception and execution. They ranged from the whole of Spain, from the Basque country in the north to the Moorish influence of Andalusia. In between, we had glimpses of Old Castile, Aragon, Salamanca, and others. The touristic attractions of Madrid and Barcelona were notably lacking.

She extended her program with two more Spanish numbers, one of which was probably by Granados, and the other was "Valverde's" familiar "Clavelitos." Titles were not announced.

Throughout the program Miss De Los Angeles graciously shared her apparatus with her accompanist, Paul Berl. He really didn't rate that much consideration; his tone is articulate rather than lyrical, and the Schubert numbers in particular suffered in consequence.

Third Jury Weighs Finch-Tregoff Case

Los Angeles, March 23 (AP)—As the gas chamber at the jury's discretion. The second-degree count carries a penalty of five years to life.

The penalty on the conspiracy charge is the same as first-degree murder.

Juries in the third trial of Dr. Bernard Finch and Carole Tregoff received the case late yesterday after more than two months of testimony. But deliberations were delayed and the jury was locked up in a hotel for a night of rest.

Dr. Finch, 43, and Miss Tregoff, 24, the doctor's secretary-mistress, are accused of murdering Dr. R. Bernard Finch and Carole Tregoff on the night of July 15, 1958, gunshots in the home of Dr. Finch and his wife, Mrs. Barbara Jean.

The defense showed no emotion as the jury got final instructions from Superior Judge David Coleman. The first two trials ended in deadlocks.

Judge Coleman told the jurors to decide on murder and conspiracy counts then offered advice against a defense plea that the couple was in double jeopardy.

An amendment to the California Constitution permits judicial advice on matters the court thinks need explaining. But the judge was asked to advise only on the second trial jury had reached a verdict and that the third trial thus put the defendants in double jeopardy.

Judge Coleman said, however, that no verdict was ever declared, rendered or recorded. In California, conviction of first-degree murder is punishable by life imprisonment or death in

Accusing the Town Planning Commission of being "500 years behind the times" on urban renewal, Democratic Town Chairman Ted Cummings last night appointed a study committee from the town committee to bring in a report within a month on possible town development.

The planning commission, he said, was "disinterested and unfavorable" to development of the old Cheney mill buildings and to the North End.

Since the end of the war, Manchester has built schools, sewer and roads, said Cummings. "But we have not broadened our tax base."

Town Director William Collins interjected a request for consideration of "development rather than redevelopment."

Cummings said, "I believe there's been a large smoke screen thrown around the matter of urban development."

He said the seven or eight month wait mentioned by the Planning Associates of Boston, a company now doing a study of Manchester's future development, is too long to wait for action.

He said the town has been waiting since the end of the war for development.

New York—Between the end of World War II and last year State and local debt increased from 16 billion dollars to nearly 70 billion dollars, according to a report by the U.S. Treasury Department.

The report said that the total amount of State and local debt in 1959 was \$68.5 billion, up from \$16 billion in 1945.

The increase was due to a variety of factors, including the need for additional funds for education, health care, and other social services.

Regional 8 Louis Drakos To Draft Plan On Alteration

Architect Lou Drakos, of West Hartford, was authorized by the Regional District 8 Board of Education to draw preliminary plans for alterations at RIFAM High School. Hardship grant funds will be used for the preliminary plans for revision in five areas.

The school administration set the order of priority as follows: provision for complete locker facilities for all students; improved science facilities in the junior wing; redesign of a classroom cluster to provide a two-teacher, all-purpose commercial department in the senior wing; two language laboratories; and partitioning of the dial table area and craft room to provide two teacher stations.

Approximately \$100,000 remains of the \$124,000 hardship grant, part of which was used for grading and building alterations. Additional funds for half of the cost of the proposed alterations will be available for improvements in science, language, mathematics and guidance programs from the federal government under the National Defense Education Act. The State Department of Education also makes grants of one-third of the cost for approved alteration projects costing more than \$2,500.

Among other improvements which are being studied are: relocation of the auditorium; expansion of the drive and parking areas; relocation of the district office; a new service line in the cafeteria; and a track. Some proposals are not considered possible at this time, such as the construction of an industrial arts building.

The board is also considering the purchase of additional equipment for the home economics department, living room, audio-visual and athletic departments and outside maintenance.

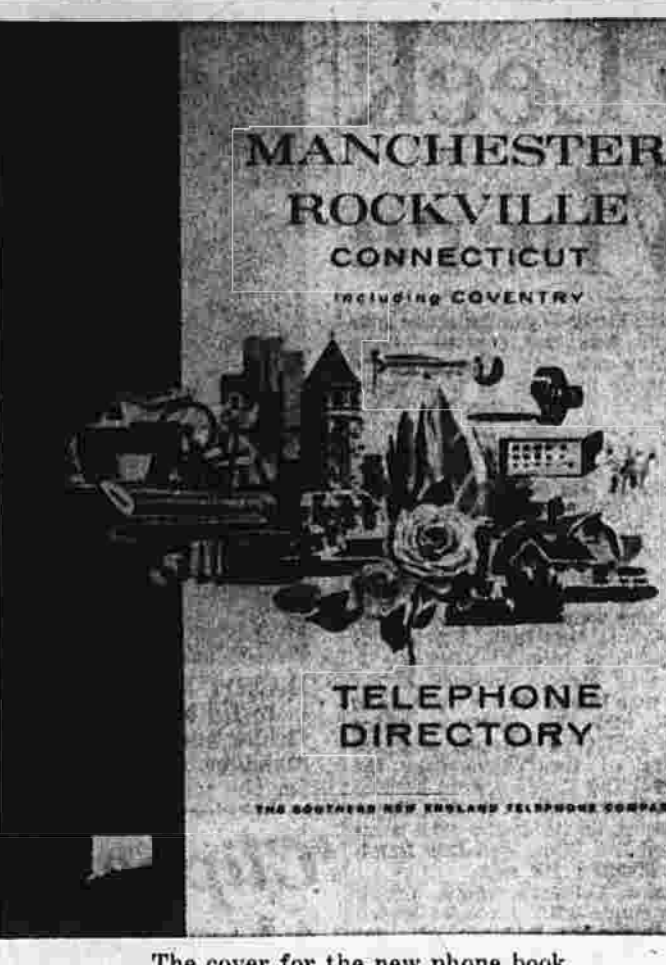

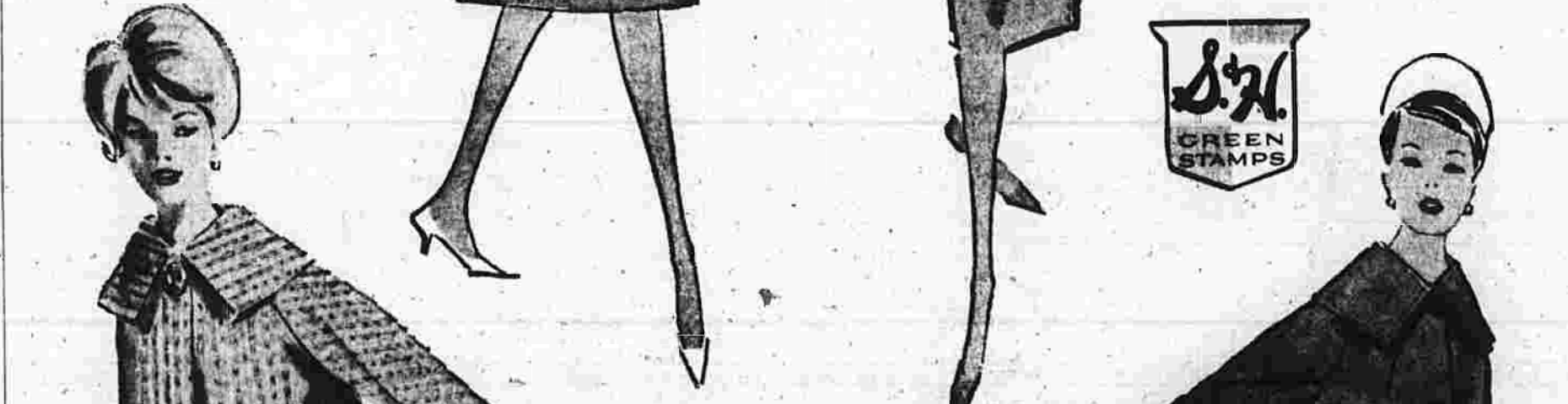
