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the jurisdiction and authority of the United Nations, while some other states equally threaten, or perhaps more so, to use force, never quite make it.

The United Nations can and does concern itself with international policies in South Africa, but can and does recognize its own interest in the problem of revolution in Algeria. It can and does play an actual military police role in the field in the internal situation of the Congo. It can and does maintain an apparently perpetual peace patrol between the enemies of the Near East. It maintains an apparently permanent command to maintain the peace in divided Korea.

In most of these instances, the purpose and function of the United Nations is clear: it is to prevent some particular trouble situation from becoming contagious and spreading out into World War III. In most of these situations, there has been some particular reason why the United States and Russia were in a state of mind to let the United Nations take over.

The problem of Algeria concerns neither of them directly. Neither of them wanted to join in the fighting over it, they both agreed, therefore, to help stop it. Both of them made the good resolution not to turn the Congo into an exact battlefield between themselves, and therefore let the United Nations go in to fill the vacuum there. In Korea, they made a battlefield, found themselves stale-mated, and decided to end that particular trial of arms.

In contrast with the handling of such situations, consider how carefully and well the United Nations somehow always seems to be shouldered away from the situation. It is that in the Congo, that in Cuba. All three are hotly possible for the start of World War III, are they not, than any of the crises which the United Nations has been allowed to try to resolve? What, then, keeps the United Nations out of these situations? Is it not that both the United States and Russia preempt these particular struggles to themselves, put on those big power expressions which warn the United Nations and the conscience of mankind off and away, and then, you must let us settle these things between our two selves?

Is it not, in these instances, the same situation which occurs when all the ordinary complexities and the dance hall girls fall back on either side to clear the way for the two sumpstings who must have it out with each other?

It is indeed, except that, in the present, real life case, the first shot brings this whole frontier world of our tumbling down. Both we and Russia can see making for others. But, for ourselves, we reserve the code of the frontier—the old, not the new.

**Students Build Fallout Shelter**  
 Students at Howell Cieny Technical School have finished work on the Manchester nuclear fallout shelter and it will be displayed for Manchester, area residents for the next 6 months.

men monitoring the television broadcast here to determine whether it was an in-person appearance, but Castro's words, after more than an hour of rambling introductory remarks far ahead from the invasion incidents, finally indicated clearly that it was. He appeared to be in good health. His speech was accompanied by his customary gestures. Occasionally he waved his arms or thumped the table with a clenched fist. Once in a while he got up and talking every step of the way, went to a table to point out the places ignored in the anti-Castro invasion attempt of last Monday. At one point he gestured to light a cigar.

Castro's words often were violent, but his appearance and tone of voice were more subdued than the words indicated, as if he were delivering the talk with deliberate calmness.

He asserted that his regime had "won over a reactionary, aggressive, brutal enemy."

"The threat of Kennedy is much like that of Hitler," said Castro. "Hitler threatened small countries. Kennedy threatens small countries."

Should any new invasion attempt be launched, all Latin America would rise violently against the United States, Castro said, and he called for an end to the U.S. "empire."

"If they (the United States) invade Cuba, all Cubans and Latin American sympathizers of the revolution will take the battle there, to the heart of the empire," Castro said. "The armed forces of Latin America will not be enough to guard their embassies and their company presidents . . ."

"These things, how are they going to frighten the Soviet Union if they can't frighten a little country like us?"

**Work Starts Soon on Church, School**

Construction of a church and school by St. Bartholomew's parish will begin in about three weeks, according to the Rev. Philip J. Hussey, pastor.

The building contract was awarded to Wadhams and May of Hartford, low bidder. It was learned that the project will cost about \$370,000. The building was designed by Peck and Sullivan, architects and engineers of New Haven.

The new structure will be located on E. Middle Tpke. between Ludlow and Danford roads.

The building will be a low one-story unit consisting of three wings. The right wing will contain eight large classrooms, serving first through eighth grades, and storage and toilet facilities.

The left wing will include a multi-use room, administration office, library, teachers' room, health unit and kitchen. Between the two wings will be a church wing to be used as a permanent church, and designed to be converted into a school auditorium when the parish church is erected.

The exterior of the building will be constructed of buff brick, relieved with colored glazed brick. The roof will cover the classroom and administration wings, and a pitched roof will be over the church area.

The classrooms will be finished with cinder block interiors, painted in pastel shades. The ceilings will be of acoustical tile, and the floors will be of variously colored asphalt tile. Each classroom will be equipped with green magnetized metallic chalk boards trimmed with aluminum, a storage area, reference library, and pupils' clothes storage area.

The windows will be trimmed with aluminum, and a fluorescent lighting system will be installed. The corridors will be finished with a glazed colored brick wainscot.

The administration wing will be of similar construction. The interior of all offices and the multi-use room will be finished with cinder block with acoustical tile ceilings and asphalt tile floors. A large kitchen will open off the multi-use room. The kitchen will be equipped with modern stainless steel ranges, refrigerator, and dishwashing unit.

The church will be designed to seat 276 people in permanent pews. The entrance of the church will be from Ludlow Rd., through the narthex and vestibule, and will contain a shrine dedicated to St. Bartholomew and a large baptistery.

Vientiane, Laos, April 25 (AP)—The pro-western government today formally accepted a cease-fire appeal by the Communist North Viet Nam army.

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De Gaulle Orders Military Quell Mutineers in Algeria

Washington, April 25 (AP)—The White House said today the United States is ready to extend whatever aid French President Charles de Gaulle needs to protect the French republic.

Press secretary Pierre Salinger said that James Gavin, U.S. ambassador to France, had carried that message to De Gaulle from President Kennedy yesterday.

Salinger was asked about reports that the United States had promised to assist De Gaulle in putting down a revolt inspired by French generals in Algeria.

Paris, April 25 (AP)—President Charles de Gaulle tonight ordered his armed forces in Algeria to liquidate the insurrectionary army corps.

The 70-year-old chief of state, in a blunt directive to all armed forces in Algeria, confirmed new commanders for each of Algeria's three army corps.

The directive referred to the "internal insurrection" and said the army's duty is to "stop the insurrection, then to break it, then to liquidate it by all the means necessary, including the use of arms."

The French fleet steamed out of the big base at Oran, Algeria, apparently headed toward Algeria. Several destroyers and two frigates were seen.

While the effect of those cross-party discussions may be to lay the groundwork for bipartisan support for any future moves by Kennedy against the Castro regime, information said this was not the President's purpose.

Washington, April 25 (AP)—President Kennedy has again made clear that he takes full responsibility for whatever part the United States played in the ill-fated Cuban invasion.

The White House issued a statement last night which said Kennedy accepted full responsibility for the invasion.

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Explosion Foils Effort to Orbit Space Capsule

Cape Canaveral, April 25 (AP)—An attempt to hurl an unmanned Project Mercury space capsule into an orbit about the Earth failed today when the Atlas booster rocket exploded in flight about 39 seconds after launch.

The 1-ton capsule was pulled free by an escape mechanism and parachuted toward the Atlantic Ocean just off the Cape.

The Atlas was to have hurled the bell-shaped capsule into a single orbit 100 miles above the Earth. The Mercury capsule had been launched at 11:15 a. m. EST and was to have been launched at 11:15 a. m. EST.
