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

It is to be hoped the American taxpay-er is not going to be asked to pick up the tab when the time comes to reimburse the "colons" for properties sequestered by the oncomperties sequestered by the oncoming native regime there.

Turning from Algeria to Cuba for a moment, the real tragedy in the invasion flasco is the disappointingly small support inside Cuba given to the invaders. 

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
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

Pension board chairman James Arthur said last night the ordinance governing his board calls for complete control and management of pension matters.

On that ground, he said, he judged the general manager had everstepped himself in taking a survey of the town employes to find out if they would like a pension plan similar to that being started for the police force, permitting optional retirement at age 55 if an employe has worked for the town 30 years and has contributed 5 per cent of his salary to the pension fund.

In a letter to the pension board Friday General Manager Martin took issue with the minutes of the meeting which the pension board sent him as a notification of the censure.
