

Aboard Aircraft Carrier been launched from the carrier's Antietam in Guif of Mexico, May 5 (P)—A Navy medical officer soared up from the deck of this ship to the greatest height ever reached by man in a balloon, then drowned after a mere 25-foot fall from a rescue helicopter's harness.

The officer, Lt. Cmdr. Victor A. Prather of Bethesda, Md., helped set the altitude record yesterday as scientific observer and companion to Cmdr. Malcolm Ross, the Navy's veteran balloonist. Ross was saved without difficulty after their troubled descent from 113, 500 feet. He was a helpless witness as Prather lost his life.



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

'Boy, What a Ride,' Astronaut Declares

Aboard the Lake Champlain, May 5 (AP)—Astronaut Alan B. Shepard was reported in "excellent physical condition" and in "fine spirits" less than an hour after he returned to

Earth from his space flight. By HOWARD BENEDICT

Cape Canaveral, Fla., May 5 (P)-Steel-nerved Alan I Shepard Jr. rode a rocket into Space today, exclaimed "What a beautiful sight" as he looked down on the Earth, and then lropped to a safe landing in the Atlantic Ocean. To the wiry, 37-year-old Navy commander, the historic adventure obviously was no more frightening than many earlier flights he had made in hot experimental aircraft. "It's a beautiful day," he told Marines on the helicopter that plucked his space capsule out of the water after a soaring flight 115 miles above the Earth and 302 miles southeast from the Cape Canaveral launching pad.

America's first spaceman remarked to one of the psysicians waiting anxiously to determine if Shepard suffered physical or psychological harm in his flight out of the atmosphere. "There is no doubt we have the



Tax Increase Not So High As Off-Election Year Hikes

The 3.1 mill rate increase voted proposed by General Manager Wednesday by the board of directors for the 1961-62 fiscal year is less of an increase than any board has voted in Manchester in a non-election year for the past six years.

In 1958-57 the mill rate jumped from 21 to 31 mills.

In 1958-59 the rate again jumped, this time to 36 mills.

During the election year 1957-58, the mill rate was held at 31 mills, and during 1959-60 it was raised only nine-tenths of a mill from the 36 mills set the previous year.
