Q. Why Was It Discontinued?

Q. Was Price Control For Milk Ever

A. Milk producers advised the General Assembly that consumer price control was no longer necessary. The unrestricted competi-tive market worked very well until the beginning of 1960.

Q. Why Is Legislation Needed Now?

A. At the present time, the Federal Government is establishing the price of milk dealers should pay farmers. Beginning in early 1960, and with the advent of the gallon milk jug, a ruthless and unrestrained price war has been raging among dealers and stores. This has resulted in forcing dealers to operate at the lowest operating margins in the country. It has created a chaotic situation where many dealers have been unable to pay dairy farmers for their milk when due. It has compelled many dealers to go out of business, and has caused the loss of hundreds of jobs for employees of dairies. Temporary minimum price stabilization will allow struggling dealers a breathing spell and time to readjust their business and to lower operating costs.

Q. Do Any Other States Control Consumer Milk Prices?

A. Yes, in 15 states, the price of milk sold through stores and delivered to the home is controlled. Of these, Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont and Rhode Island are in New England, and nearby are New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

Q. How Does The Stabilization Proposal For Connecticut Differ From These Other States?

A. Complete price control in these other states fixes margins for dealers and stores, on a permanent basis, without limit: The Connecticut bill, however, (1) Provides for temporary stabilization (no more than 6 months at a time). (2) Provides for only a low stop-disaster price (if the bill were in effect now, only 4 U.S. cities would have a lower dealer margin).

A. (1) Quality could be endangered . . . milk is highly perishable. Its careful and proper handling is vital to the public health. In an effort to cut corners and to save money, particularly by dealers facing financial rain, the safety and quality of milk could be affected.

(2) Monopoly is possible . . . of additional major concarn to you as a consumer is the possibility of the creation of a monopoly. As efficient smaller milk dealers fall by the wayside, larger, well financed national and regional dealers will eventually control the entire distribution of milk, as they have in other areas, and prices will certainly rise.

Q. How Would Prices Be Established

In order to establish prices at all, the Commissioner of Agriculture, Conservation and Natural Resources would have to hold a public hearing. If the Commissioner, solely on the basis of evidence produced at the hearing, finds that conditions in the market are such that dealers cannot make prompt and full payment to producers, or that operations of small or independent milk dealers are threatened and market conditions tend to injure competition or to create a monopoly, or that an adequate supply of freeh milk from approved sources cannot be assured, the Commissioner may issue an order good for up to six months establishing minimum marketing margins. This margin would be the minimum amount which must be added to the federally set price which dealers should pay to dairy farmers.

What Effect Will The Proposed Bill Have On Your Cost Of Milk, If You Now Buy Milk In Gallon Jugs At Chain Or Dairy Stores?

A. The maximum dealer and store margin that could be fixed would have to be 24 per quart below the average margin in other cities in U.S., selling milk in gallon jugs.

How Would It Affect Your Price Of Milk Delivered To Your Home?

Home delivery costs more of course, and its price is already somewhat above the maximum price that could be established under the bill, and so would not be directly affected.
