Meanwhile, in New Haven, the Board of Mediation and Arbitration, which is handling the strike, has scheduled a meeting for May 23.

3. A new mortgage index file and sales index file on all open charges.
4. Cross index file on personal property.
5. Assumption of billing for delinquent taxes, delinquent accounts, sidewalk accounts and town department delinquent accounts.

Bolton Town Votes School Items

In a vote of 87 to 78, townspeople approved an appropriation of \$16,000 to water-proof the school at a special town meeting last night in the ballroom at Fiano's Restaurant.

The vote was by checklist and ballot on motion of George Sebastian.

The meeting also approved appropriations of: 1) \$2,250 for tuition charges; 2) \$5,300 for extra transportation costs; 3) \$2,945 for alterations at the school to comply with the state fire code.

Wall St., a new road off Notch Rd. built by Jacob Stygar, was accepted into the town road system.

Harold Dwyer, who said he had drawn up specifications last year as Board of Education chairman, for the water-proofing job which drew bids ranging from \$2,000 to \$9,000, questioned why these bids were not acted on.

John Harris, current Board of Education chairman, said the range in bids led the board to believe there was something wrong with the specifications, and it was decided to hire an architect.

He introduced Sinclair Adams of the West Hartford architectural firm of Adams and Lee, who said the specifications for the year were specific and more extensive. Last year's specifications, he said, failed to say how many bricks were to be replaced nor how much repointing was to be done. Both Adams and Harris were left up to the contractor, he said.

Adams drew reaction from the assembly when he said, under the present proposal, he will be the one who lays the bricks and decides which are to be replaced.

He also pointed out that this year's proposal includes some work on the south wing and removal of the steps of the portico from the school to water-proof it. Neither of these was included in the proposal bid last year.

The votes for an increase in the appropriation for tuition and for an appropriation to comply with the state fire code were passed with no discussion and no opposition.

There was much time consumed in analysis of the request for extra transportation funds during which Mrs. Catherine Peraluha of the Board of Education, read a detailed report showing an anticipated extra requirement of \$6,678.

Lonesome George In New TV Role

Hollywood (NEA)—A new approach to situation comedy on TV's laugh machine-packed channels is something you can't hardly find no more. But George Gobel figures he has it made, or should we say, remade, with "My Uncle Elroy."

In the half-hour weekly television series set for next season—and George's career guide Dave O'Malley has no doubts—the TV homecoming means the end of "Lonesome George." How can a fellow be lonesome as Uncle Elroy, a bachelor living in the home of his widowed sister and her two children, a 7-year-old boy and a 15-year-old girl?

That's the role Gobel is now ready to tackle on a weekly basis in a "If you can't beat 'em, join 'em" move, as he termed it. "I don't have the nucleus for a private eye and I don't look good with an oxygen tank on my back and swim fins on my feet," he was telling me the other day. "So, what else is there on TV—situation family comedy."

They moved in, with their laugh machines, when Gobel moved out of TV two years ago. He was ready to do a filmed show then, he said.

"We were the last to hang on to

live TV," he explained, "because we had an NBC contract. I was eager to try film but the network (NBC) and the sponsor voted me down. The way it turned out, they voted me out—of TV."

There was plenty of loot for George to earn on the night club circuit during his two-year absence from TV but 52 weeks of work a year—"It seemed like I was working 56 weeks a year"—made the little fellow wonder why he was knocking himself out.

Just before closing in Las Vegas recently he had only one day off in nine weeks.

"My friends were saying, 'George, you're out of your mind.' So I said to Mr. O (manager O'Malley), 'Mr. O, my friends say I'm out of my mind and I gotta go with 'em in their thinking.'"

There was many a story conference before "My Uncle Elroy" became the final choice for his big leap into filmed TV.

"We talked," Gobel said, "about the husband and wife bit and then decided to forget Alice because the plots would be too restricted."

Teaming Gobel with a straight

man in a series about two guys who were constantly out of work, living by their wits, was considered—and teased out. "It was," Gobel says, "too much like a civilian version of Sgt. Bilko."

"My Uncle Elroy," a short story that appeared in a national magazine several years ago, was the final inspiration, Gobel says:

"I'll be playing a kind of a family man but still not married. We can go in all kinds of directions and the character of Uncle Elroy is pretty much like me."

In the pilot reel, just put on film, Paula Winslow plays his widowed sister, with Billy Mumy as her son and Barbara Perkins as the daughter. To the boy who motivates the plots, Uncle Elroy is the greatest man in the world.

"He can do everything," Gobel tells it, "and relates long involved stories which go over the boy's head like a trapeze act. But the things he does are pretty far out, like getting all worked up about whether the Navajo Indians have enough TV sets."

Stock Gobel comedy lines of the past will not be used and the locale will be a small midwestern town. Only John Scott Trotter's music will make it sound like old home week for the Gobel who became global when he hit it big on TV five years ago.
