Money Too Light, Fast, Burns, Doesn't Stretch

By PAUL PETT • One can almost hear them grunt New York, May 25 (P) — Mrs. Elizabeth Rudel Smith, the treasurer of the United States, has suggested that folding money ought to be printed in different colors. I'm against it.

She says that everything higher than a buck and lower than a \$500 bill should get new colors to make them easier to identify. She's against the traditional long green of the \$2, \$5, \$20, \$50 and \$100 bills. The New Frontier is looking for the new rainbow.

Mrs. Smith has her practical reasons but, I'm convinced, she suffers from a basic misconception afflicting many women. The thing wrong with our money is not the sameness of its color but the maafflicting many women. The thing wrong with our money is not the sameness of its color but the material. It's too light, for one thing. It goes too fast. It burns to easily, especially in women's purses. Instead of worrying about new colors, Mrs. Smith would do better to search for a new material, perhaps a fireproof weather-proof, wrinkleproof, recession - proof, woman-proof, 100 per cent washable 2-way stretch. What this country needs most is a \$10 bill that will stretch at least enough to cover what a \$5 bill used to.

At that, Mrs. Smith has her courage. She must know she is playing into the prejudiced hands of a tiny but vocal minority of 86,743,219 men who have been convinced all along that women know archive a least tended of the course of the material. Can she? Dare she? Can any-body?

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

In recent years we've learned that many of the abnormalities present at birth are not truly congenital, in the sense that they're hereditary, but acquired during the carrying period.

To use a word you'll be reading more about in the near future, they're embryopathic, meaning that they took place while the developing infant was resident within the mother's body.

Now let me explain that this differentiation is no mere hair-splitting, as you'll understand when I give you details of a disturbing letter sent by a well-meaning mother who, quite understandably, is uniformed in this complex field of medicine.

The great difference between hereditary and embryopathic disturbances lies in the fact that the latter, being acquired, are not handed down the proper sent to the sent the sent to the sent to

handed down from generation to generation.

Stated in positive terms, the child who is born with an embryopathic defect or deformity will not transmit that defect to his or her own children.



"And now to my problem. He is going to marry this summer and his fiancee has just partial sight. I am afraid that if they should have a child it might be blind, too. I know what suffering that would cause parents with small means and a child who would never see. Is there any medication he can get that would keep him from being fertile? Please help me in this matter."

I gan indeed help you in this matter, dear mother. But not in the way you might imagine.

Since you do not state that either you or your husband suffered any visual defect and your letter is well written in a firm hand. I am going to assume that hand, I am going to assume that your son's bliffdness was embryo-pathic. As such, it is not trans-missible to the next generation. And if this is also true of the parmost likely, there is no reason to fear for the visual acuity of their child or children. Would it not be an act of crue injustice to deprive this young couple, who've already had more than their share of suffering, of the joys of parenthood? And, although my experience is limited to only one blind couple blessed with other. He'll not be packed in the back seat while his parents traipse around the countryside or go to a drive-in late, late movie. And he'll have no baby sitter to tend him while his parents are gallivanting How about casting out fear, grandmother-to-be, and getting started on some sort of knitting assignment? Baby booties, for example?
