Washington, June 10 (AP)—The Air Force has ordered a colonel to face a court martial in the collapse of a radar "Texas Tower" which dragged 28 men to their death in the Atlantic Ocean.

The court martial was ordered yesterday by the air defense commander, Lt. Gen. Robert M. Lee. The Air Force indicated the military trial may convene within a week.

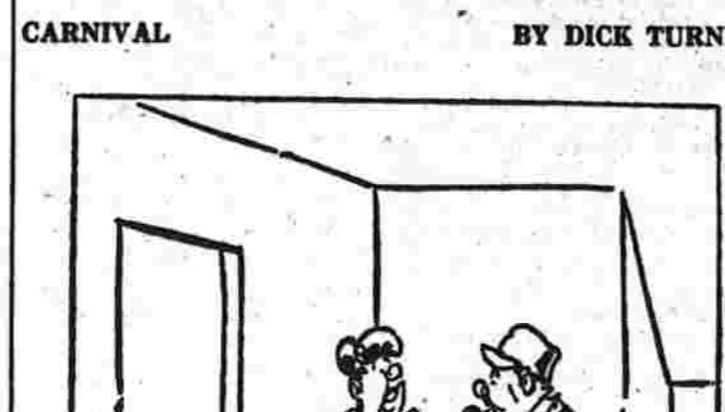

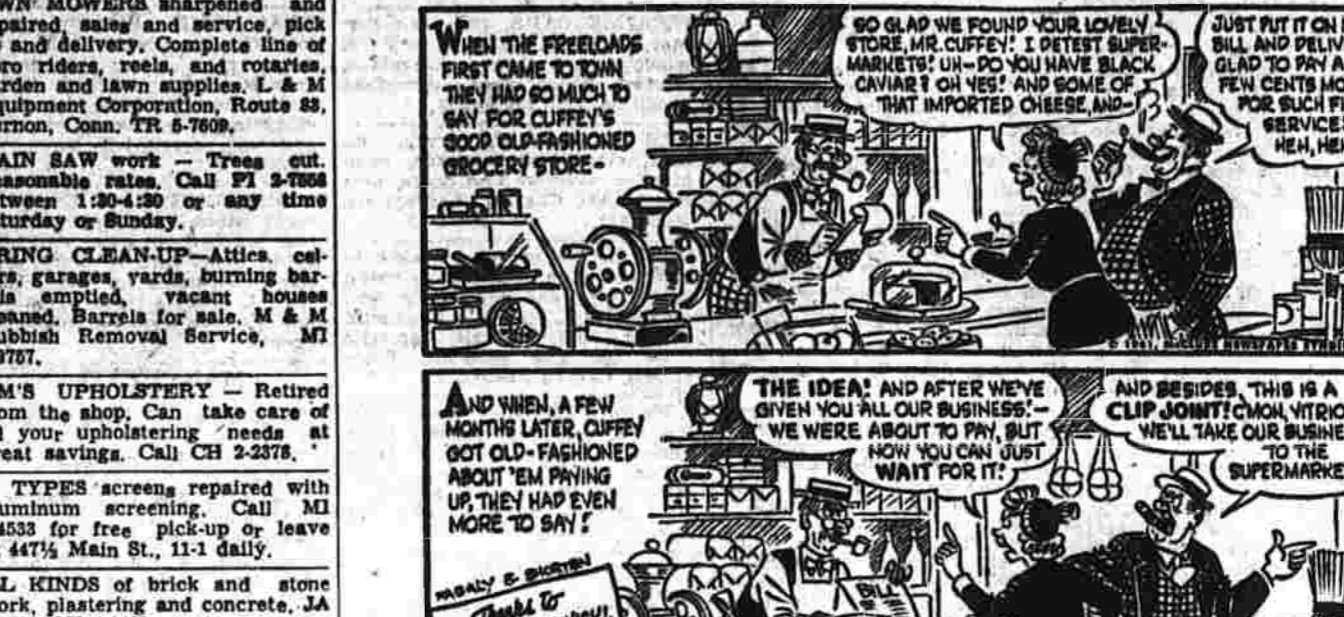

Hodges Says Rah-Rah Boys Ruin Schools

College Park, Md., June 10 (AP)—Secretary of Commerce Luther H. Hodges said today some colleges are more interested in sports than education, and he blamed "raging rah-rah boys" among the alumni.

In an address prepared for commencement exercises at the University of Maryland, Hodges said that "through some strange, immature quirk" many college graduates "seek the prestige of association" with a winning athletic team.

"Thus we apply pressure on the old school to build up its athletic plan and the school, mindful of alumni contributions, may not be strong enough to say no."

Hodges said "it's about time the aging rah-rah boys grew up, and let up."

He said that if they need to borrow prestige, "let them borrow the best there is—the reputation of a school where education, quality education, comes first, last, and always."

The commerce secretary said he played intercollegiate sports and favors athletics in their proper place.

"But their place is secondary," he said. "And when you start buying basketball teams, for example, start handing out scholarships for brains and physical skill rather than brain and a desire for education, you are mixing values badly and heading for trouble."

He said the current scandals in intercollegiate basketball have demonstrated again "the sort of thing that can happen—the gamblers get in, and the fixes begin."

Hodges said that the nation never before in its lifetime "needed so urgently a supply of talented, educated minds."

Hodges is a former governor of North Carolina, where basketball fix scandals have hit both the University of North Carolina and North Carolina State.

Three N.C. State players have been accused of shaving points for gamblers. A former North Carolina player is charged with offering bribes to two players at his alma mater. Both reportedly were but failed to report the bribe attempt.

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Keeping Cool Secret To Cullen's Success

In a business known for pressure and tension, Bill Cullen is a firm believer in keeping cool.

Only this philosophy stands between Cullen and exhaustion. At present, his schedule includes the daily and Wednesday evening editions of "The Price Is Right" on NBC, an early bird disc jockey show, and a regular spot on the panel of "I've Got a Secret."

Cullen's secret is that he learned, long ago, to relax.

"Why get excited?" asked Cullen. "If I ever start worrying, my job will be three times tougher."

Among the things Cullen doesn't worry about is rehearsal. He simply avoids them, a fact which created certain problems at first for "The Price Is Right." The program stages some fairly complicated stunts, such as giving away a flock of sheep or flying a ten-ton truck on wires above the stage, and these moments entail careful preparation.

Cullen solved the dilemma by hiring a stand-in actor Jim Holland, to do his rehearsing for him. While Holland is going through Cullen's paces, Bill catches up on lost sleep at his New York apartment. He shows up at the NBC studio just in time for a conference with his stand-in—then goes on the air.

This arrangement, unique in television, has the approval of producers Mark Goodson and Bill Todman, who regard Cullen as one of the sharpest ad-libbers in show business.

"Usually, we give Bill a complete rundown on the show," explained Holland. "But sometimes we hold a bit of information back."

On one occasion, Cullen was intentionally kept in the dark about one of the more spectacular prizes—a live elephant. Another evening, he worked with a model in Santa Claus costume only to discover, when she removed the false stomach and whiskers, his wife Anne.

There are certain facts Cullen refuses to learn in advance. He never meets contestants until the program is on and his first knowl-

edge of the value of the prizes comes when he opens a sealed envelope on the air.

"I like surprises as much as the audience," he explained. "If I knew the answers in advance, my reaction wouldn't be spontaneous. I'd have to fake it."

Faking is one thing the crewcut host refuses to indulge in. He has no script writers, never prepares even a one-line joke, and simply lets his own impish sense of humor take over when he gets before an audience.

Recently, when the curtains parted to reveal a "Price Is Right" prize, Bill found himself facing two statues—one a grinning gar- goyle and the other a distorted Balinese idol.

"Meet Mark Goodson and Bill Todman," said Cullen, pointing to the figures. Other bosses might have been upset, but producers Goodson and Todman were delighted by the ribbing.

While Bill is apt to kid his em- ployers and fellow performers, he

adheres to one strict rule—never make fun of a contestant.

"When people come on the show, they're usually excited and some- what scared," Bill explained. "All of a sudden, they've got a million eyes on them. It's my job to put them at ease and relieve the ten- sion to help them do their best."

Bill's consideration for others may stem from his own difficult youth. Struck by polio as an infant, he can't remember what it was like to walk without limping. But, rather than brood about the misfortune, he simply refused to accept it. He became a madrigal racer, and later, after teaching him- self to fly, joined the Civil Defense air auxiliary.

"I've been pretty fortunate," said Cullen, referring to the hand- icap. "The only time I notice it now is when others do. I'd rather not have people who see me limp show pity or distrust. I don't feel badly about it, so why should they?"

Cullen's easy-going attitude to- ward life is reflected off-stage, as well as on. He'll work like a dog during the week, but Saturdays and Sundays are set aside for his wife, Anne.

"We take on projects together," Bill explained. "Like painting, Anne's great, but I'm just a dab-

ber. We also have a lot of fun making mosaics out of match book covers. Not any cover, but just from places we've visited."

Sometimes, admits Cullen, he'll go out of his way to find a new restaurant whose matchbooks aren't in the collection.

Currently, Bill is setting himself for next season. He'll continue with "The Price Is Right" and "I've Got a Secret," but plans to give up the disc jockey show in September. This will free him for additional television work and also provide the unexpected luxury of regular sleeping habits.

"It's tougher on Anne than me," explained Cullen. "For five years now, she's been getting up at 4 a.m. to brew me a pot of coffee. She's seen the dawn come up over Manhattan Island too many times."

Perhaps the best indicator of Bill Cullen's personality comes from a story told us by one of the cameramen on "The Price Is Right." It's customary for televi- sion stars, at Christmas, to give a gift to the stage and technical crew. All too often, this is a thank-you for having inflicted tem- perament on behind-the-scenes personnel.

"Last year," said the camera- man, "we gave Bill a gift. He's that kind of a guy."

Muir and Norton are a mutual admiration society. "The producer whispered that he was lucky... Bob Smith (on Howdy Doody) was easy to work with—no tem- perament or trouble—and this guy is just the same. I know, too, because I've been with some lulus."

Norton whispered: "These guys are great to work with. It's the nearest thing to the old Garroway-at-Large spirit. We (the old Gar- roway gang) used to have a won- derful time. This is the finest relation- ship for me since then."

Price-Fix Aftermath U.S. Threatens To Smash GE

New York, June 12 (AP)—The government reportedly was considering today a court battle to break up General Electric Co., as one possible means of preventing another price-fixing conspiracy.

Both the New York Times and the Wall Street Journal said Asst. Atty. Gen. Lee Lovejoy, GE's representative who they might find themselves in a divestiture proceeding.

The warning reportedly came after GE, the nation's No. 1 electrical goods manufacturer refused to sign a consent decree.

The corporation's management said it considers the decree foolish and impossible of fulfillment.

The decree is an alternative to a civil suit in which the government would seek relief from the collusive and monopolistic practices of which GE and 28 other electrical equipment manufacturers were convicted earlier this year.

The companies and 45 persons were fined nearly \$2 million conspiring to fix prices, rig bids and allocate markets.

As now drafted, however, the consent decree would commit the companies to much more than putting an end to the conspiracy of which they were convicted earlier.

The companies would have to agree to refrain from selling "at unreasonably low prices" without knowing at what point the government or the court would consider their prices "unreasonably low."

Under the decree, any sales would constitute contempt of court "where the effect is, or where there is a reasonable probability that the effect will be, substantially to injure, suppress or stifle competition or tend to create a monopoly."

The Justice Department's antitrust division has been negotiating for acceptance of the decree with the leading manufacturers making power switching assemblies.

However, the department made it clear this first decree would be a "prototype" for 18 other product lines to follow.

In addition to GE, the department recently called the American Electric Corp., Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Corp., Federal Pacific Electric Co., General Electric Co., and Westinghouse Electric Corp.

Dempsey Asks New Laws on Traffic Safety

Hartford, June 12 (AP)—Gov. John N. Dempsey has called on the state legislative council to begin a study of two traffic safety measures in preparation for the 1963 session of the General Assembly.

Both measures were considered by the 1959 and 1961 legislatures but failed to pass.

They are the establishment of an absolute state maximum speed limit and a law making possible the introduction of chemical analysis of body substances as evidence in the prosecution of persons accused of operating under the influence of liquor.

In a letter to legislative council director George W. Oberst, Dempsey stressed the importance of the two measures to Connecticut's highway safety program.

Dempsey asked the council to draft legislation that would be acceptable to all parties concerned.

Reds Join Truce Call, Revive Laos Parley

Washington, June 12 (AP)—There is continuing speculation here that President Kennedy may attend a high level Latin American conference in Uruguay next month and also visit several other South American countries. But there is no confirmation from any source and State Department officials say no decision has been reached.

Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, June 12 (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson said today he feels President Janio Quadros is fully conscious of the Communist menace to the Americas and that Brazil will stand side by side with the United States in opposing its spread.

The special representative of President Kennedy said this is the conclusion he reached after meeting Quadros yesterday and discussing common problems including the Communist foothold in Cuba.

Stevenson spoke at a news conference before leaving for Asuncion, Paraguay, in his 18-day tour of South America.

He took occasion to blast dictatorships generally, right or left. "We don't like dictatorships and tyranny," he said.

Asked later why he was going to Paraguay, the questioner noted in a military dictatorship, Stevenson replied: "My trip was not arranged by personal preference, but to visit all 10 capitals of South America, of which Asuncion is one."

Asked what relations Kennedy would like to have with Paraguay, Stevenson said he had no objection to President Kennedy's respect for democracy in Paraguay.

A dispatch from Buenos Aires said the Paraguayan politician who has been exiled in Argentina took off for Asuncion in the hope of meeting Stevenson in that city, though they "said" they might meet in Asuncion.

The three are Gen. Jose Pastore, Rafael Franco and Elpidio Yegros. Stevenson had news here he and Quadros agreed that the best way to fight dictatorships is through a program to raise standards of life in the hemisphere.

"I am confident Brazil and the United States will be found in agreement on this," Stevenson said.

Washington, June 12 (AP)—Using crutches and a specially contrived elevator platform to get down from his plane because of his leg injury, President Kennedy returned today from Florida.

Thai Aide Walks out In Geneva

Geneva, June 12 (AP)—A minor concession from the Russians brought western nations back to the 14-nation conference on Laos today but Thailand's delegate walked out and announced later he would not return until the matter of seating Laotian factions is rearranged to Thai satisfaction.

"We cannot sit while the conference is discussing substantive matters, until the question of seating Laos is settled," said a spokesman for the Thai Foreign Ministry.

Ambassador Direk Jayanama, the Thai delegate, took a walk after declaring that such non-governmental group as the Communist-led Pathet Lao can sit at the conference table then other political factions also should be seated, such as anti-government groups in Vientiane.

The proposal first was presented when the conference opened but no action was taken on the point then. The Thai idea is that if non-governmental groups leaning to the Left are seated, there should be an evening up by seating non-governmental groups from Vientiane, either for or against the Royal Government, but presumably pro-western.

Jayanama was gavelled to order several times by British Foreign Secretary Lord Home and drew fire from Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko after his presentation today. But such non-governmental group as the Communist-led Pathet Lao also were seated, such as anti-government groups in Vientiane.

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26 Injured, 10 Seriously 20 Killed as Electra Crashes Near Cairo

Cairo, Egypt, June 12 (AP)—A Dutch prop-jet Electra crashed in sand dunes and caught fire in an attempt to land at Cairo today.

Airport sources said 20 persons were killed. Electra cargo included gold ingots, jewelry and Swiss watches bound for Asia.

Information here was that the 4-engine, Lockheed-built craft carried 46 persons and that all the survivors were injured, 10 seriously. The Royal Dutch Airlines KLM said no Americans were involved. The Electra was bound for Amsterdam to Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

(Dr. Ernst van der Beugel, president of KLM, told newsmen at the Hague the plane carried 26 passengers and 7 crewmen—and that 19 were killed. A KLM spokesman said those figures were provisional, but seemed "almost correct.")

The plane had put down at Munich and Rome en route to Cairo. The passengers included Dutch, Germans, Italians, British, Irish, Egyptian and American. Two Irish Roman Catholic nuns were among the dead.

Three of the 7-member crew perished.

The plane slammed into a desert area nearly two miles from the end of the runway.

"All of a sudden we felt a tremendous jolt," said Tifatt Chaik, an Egyptian who was among those not seriously injured. "The plane struck the ground and fire started immediately."

He was one of 46 export managers of a West German company, escaped with scratches. He helped free other survivors.

"I had my shoes off when the loudspeaker announced we were landing," he said, "I bent over to pick up my shoes and all of a sudden I saw flames and heard a tremendous noise. The plane split in two. . . I jumped up and ran clear."

5,500 Receive Degrees At Connecticut Colleges

More than 5,000 degrees were conferred yesterday at college commencement ceremonies in Connecticut.

Two other universities—Yale and Fairfield—awarded degrees today. The number of graduates at the two universities exceeded 2,500.

Ceremonies yesterday were held at seven colleges—the University of Connecticut, the University of Hartford, Trinity College, New Haven College, Quinnipiac College, Connecticut College and Central Connecticut College. A total of 15 honorary degrees were awarded.

The largest single class was graduated from the University of Connecticut, where 1,650 students received degrees at the university's 78th commencement.

The commencement speaker, Dr. Luther Evans, former UNESCO general director, urged the United States to assume a more active role in helping newly emerging nations so as to recapture prestige lost to the Soviet Union.

An example, Evans cited the firm stand taken by the U. S. on Portuguese Angola. It was criticized by the Portuguese government but applauded by a majority of the world, he said.
