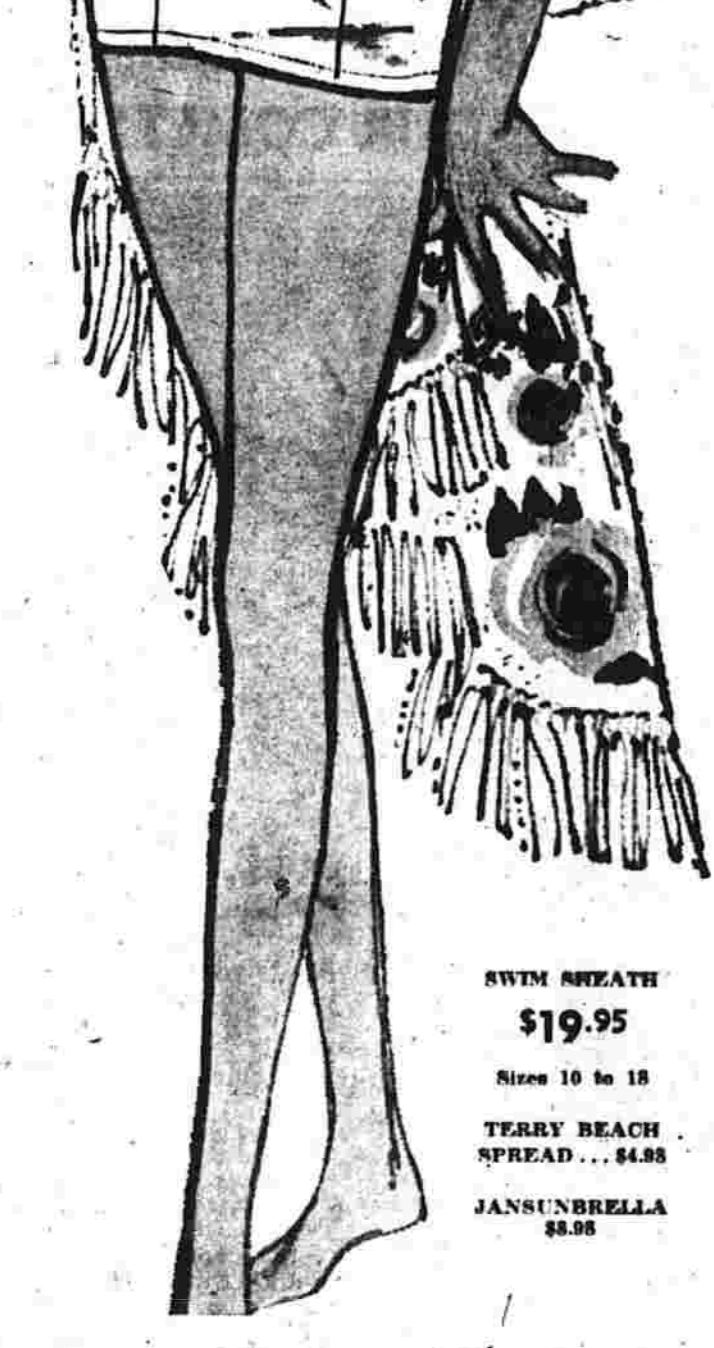

LOSING CARD STINGS EXERCISE

By Alfred Sheinwold

If you react with a trick with a card, at least make it work for you in the long run. This may take careful preparation.

See if you can defeat the contract of four hearts. It can be done; in fact it was done at the International tournament in Turin last year. Put yourself in the East seat for the purpose.

You win the first trick with the king of spades. That's easy. Your next step is to cash the ace of spades. What next?

Even if you couldn't see the South hand you would feel pretty sure that you had no diamond or club tricks coming to you. Where can you find two more tricks?

Trump tricks.

You need two trump tricks to defeat the contract. South will naturally take two trumps to hold the last two in the East hand. What can you do about it?

The expert in Turin led a third spade from the East hand. Dummy won and returned a trump. South (faced the ten and West won with the queen.

Now West led his fourth spade and East ruffed with the king of hearts. Curtains for poor South. If South over-refused a West's nine of trumps would eventually win over-refr. East's king of hearts would take the ending trick then and there.

Sister-City Program Promotes Good Will

By STELLING F. GREEN Washington, June 15 (AP)—The sister-city program and its accompanying success in promoting good will across the oceans was the central theme of the world conference of local governments, opened today.

Some 800 mayors, lord mayors, burgomasters and other senior city officials from 51 nations met in the State Department's luxurious new building for the 5-day conference, the first held in the United States.

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower was among today's scheduled speakers. The former President's call in 1961 for a massive people-to-people exchange gave impetus to the sister-city idea.

President Kennedy was invited to speak, but officers of the International Union of Local Authorities (IULA), the sponsor organization, said the White House had sent word Kennedy probably would not appear because of his hectic schedule.

"I just wonder if the speech was in the nature of a feeler as to whether the American people are in favor of a free city in Berlin," Dirksen asked.

Dirksen said that the East German government in order to join the West German government in supporting the free city (I wonder how long it would be before they showed their true colors?) would have to accept the physical reality of the Berlin arms race.

Dirksen said he would be pleased to see the American people create opposition to what we consider "imperialism," the group's announcement said.

He said Mannefeld had brought the whole matter into the open and there should be a full and free discussion.

It is that becomes a new chapter in foreign policy, what becomes of the question of unification? Dirksen asked.

There should be a clear statement by the President as to what the foreign policy is. Certainly the foreign question has the greatest explosive potential any subject in the world today.

Dirksen said that Kennedy had told the people he made clear to the world that the United States stood by its obligations to West Berlin and insisted on access to the city.

"What happens to that pledge?" Dirksen asked.

"We can't let this unclarified position stand," Dirksen said.

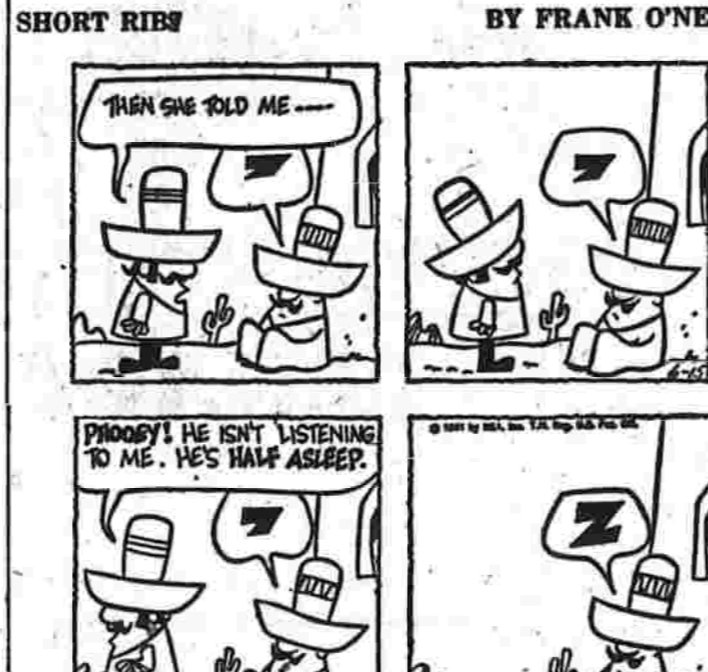

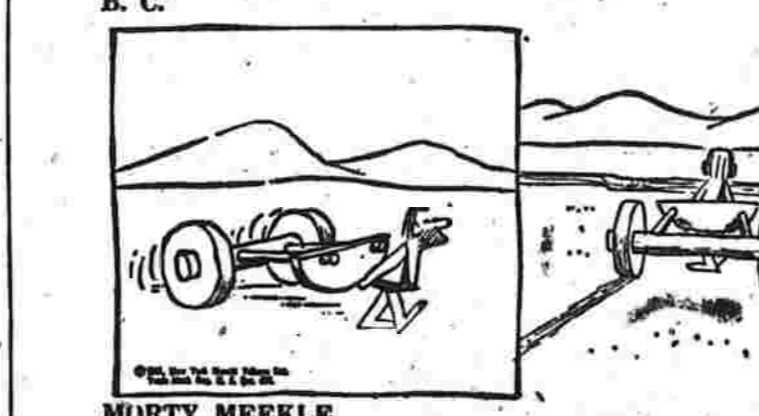
