Dempsey Bars Engineer Bill

Hartford, June 22 (AP) — Gov. John N. Dempsey yesterday vetoed one bill and signed a number of others. He vetoed a bill that would have restricted the practice of engineering in Connecticut to corporations organized before 1855. Dempsey said it would be "unwise public policy" to give any group of corporations exclusive rights to practice any profession. From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

With the arrival of native-grown strawberries at roadside stands and markets, Mrs. Ralph Maher, 80 Henry St., offers a favorite recipe: **Glossed Strawberry Pie.**

Mrs. Maher welcomed this recipe as a different use for fresh strawberries instead of serving them plain with cream or in short-cake. She has been making this pie for the past eight summers at the family cottage in Glanville Neck near Niantic.

Glossed Strawberry Pie
1 baked 9-in. pastry shell
1 cup (2 pints) hulled washed strawberries
1/4 cup water
1/4 cup sugar
2 tablespoons cornstarch
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup cream for whipping
1 tablespoon sugar (for cream)

Crush one cup of berries in a small antique. Add water and bring to a boil, simmer for three minutes. Strain juice from cooked berries and add water to make one cup of juice. Reserve.

Combine sugar, cornstarch, and salt in the same antique; slowly add the reserved juice, stirring until smooth. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Cook for three minutes or until thick and clear. Remove heat, and cool slightly. Arrange remaining three cups of berries in baked pastry shell.

Spoon glass over berries, being careful to coat each one. Chill the pie. Just before serving, spoon whipped cream on top of the pie. Instead of whipping cream, a ready- whip may be used to make a design on top.

Mrs. Maher was born in Manchester, attended the Lincoln School in Providence, R.I., and was graduated from the Wheelock School in Boston in 1934. With her sister, Mrs. Harry Madson, she founded and operated the first nursery school in Manchester. They supervised a school on E. Center St. together from 1934 to 1942. Mrs. Madson continued the nursery school until the death of her husband, and Mrs. Maher is now director of the YWCA Nursery School in the Community St.

Mrs. Maher is a member of Center Congregational Church, the church council of Center Church, and is chairman of the church's memorial gift committee. Regional 8 RHAM Graduation Slated Tonight

RHAM High School will hold its fourth commencement exercises tonight at 7:30 p.m. in the gymnasium. Music for the occasion will be furnished by the school band directed by Ray Stone, musical director. Rev. John N. Cross of First Congregational Church, Hebron, will give the invocation.

The main address will be given by Albert E. Waugh, provost of the University of Connecticut. Clifton R. Horns, chairman of the regional board of education, will present the diploma. The benediction will be pronounced by Rev. John K. Hens of St. Columba's Church in Columbia.

Information Session Set
There will be a public information meeting on Monday at 8:30 a.m. at which the regional board will explain planned alterations to the school plant and facilities and answer questions pertaining to these areas. Archie L. Louis, director of the state board of education, has estimated the total cost of alterations to be in the neighborhood of \$30,000. Federal and state aid will bear the brunt of the cost so that the estimated cost to the regional district will be about \$12,000.

The federal grant will be made in a lump sum while state aid will be paid over a period of five years. Proposed changes to the school are in the business education area, arts and crafts, home economics, science laboratories, cafeteria, serving area and language departments. Lockers for the entire student body will be provided also.

Other items under consideration and investigation by the board are the auditorium control panel which has been found inadequate when required to carry the required load for music functions; and the paving of the school driveway and parking areas. The board has authorized a "frank" office to proceed with the plans for alterations to the school.

The resignation of Marc Codere, French instructor, has been accepted with regret by the regional board.

The board will hold a brief business meeting after the public information session. Its next regular meeting will be held on July 10.

A coordinating control committee will be formed at RHAM in conjunction with the administration, five department heads and one teacher from each of the following: business education, industrial arts, home economics, art, health, physical education, music, library and guidance.

The Madagascar Plan Eichmann Tells Court He Tried to Save Jews

By THOMAS A. REEDY
Jerusalem, June 22 (AP)—Adolf Eichmann testified today that he tried to save European Jews by creating a homeland for them on the island of Madagascar.

The former Gestapo lieutenant colonel said he conceived the "Madagascar Plan" that was judged sound in high Nazi circles in 1940 but never got past the paper stage.

Eichmann identified principal portions of the plan as his own living conditions on the French island off the East African coast.

"I studied all prior conditions which were also not for anyone settling there," Eichmann said.

He said he had talked to people of the Tropical Hygiene Institute. Then I received orders from my superior to go on working out plans which would not be Utopian.

Decision Made in 1941
The defendant accused of a major role in the Nazi extermination of six million Jews did not explain how or when the Madagascar scheme was conceived.

Israel has produced evidence that Hitler, Heinrich Himmler and Gestapo Chief Reinhard Heydrich decided on mass extermination "as the final solution of the Jewish problem" early in 1941.

Hitler, in published accounts of his informal night conversations over tea, said he rather favored the Madagascar scheme for a while because conditions there would eventually wipe out the Jews.

On the witness stand for the third day, Eichmann insisted he always approached the "solution" to the Jewish problem by "trying to put some ground, some soil, under their feet."

The Madagascar idea was the first action Eichmann claimed as his own. Everything else, he said, was done under orders from someone else. He contended he was in the Berlin headquarters of the Gestapo "against my will." He said he was not consulted on his transportation from Austria to head Gestapo
