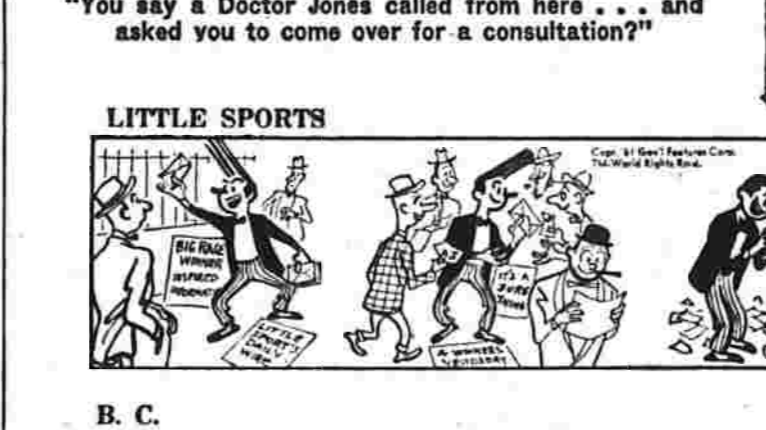

# Wayne & Shuster Fill Jack Benny's Slot

On Sunday night, June 25, in the time slot generally occupied by Jack Benny on CBS-TV, a summer show will take over for 13 weeks. The faces and names will be familiar to regular viewers of the Ed Sullivan program. Stars of the show are Johnny Wayne and Frank Shuster. Title of the half-hour program is "Holiday Lodge."

Wayne, who speaks more for the team ("Because I talk faster," he explains) says:

"We're doing a situation comedy for the first time in our careers. Whether or not it will work out, we're not sure. We hope it will, because we like doing different things, and we regard 'Holiday Lodge' as another manifestation of the ability of Wayne and Shuster to take on certain roles and play them. We are playing roles—our names on the show are John Miller and Frank Boone who are working in this summer resort. We're creating these roles, and we'll play them."

In reply to whether or not this will confuse the public about who Wayne & Shuster really are, Frank interposes:

"The real Wayne and Shuster aren't known to anybody but our wives and they're not sure. They're pretty complex characters, but we're not trying to project them on 'Holiday Lodge.' We're just trying to present happy-go-lucky characters, or fun-loving idiots. Which we are, when we're on-camera."

Off-camera, the two aren't exactly sober-sided, but they're not clowns of the Jerry Lewis school either. Well-educated, they are both now in the School of Graduate Studies at the University of Toronto and have bachelor of art degrees with the School of Graduate Studies. They are probably the only two comedians with so imposing an educational background, and consider it a tremendous asset.

Wayne says: "I believe our ed-

ucations give us a wider understanding and scope of fun that there is to be had. And I think some of it rubs off on our sketches. How much it will rub off on our situation comedy depends on the educational backgrounds of our writers. It also gives us a greater respect for people. There is a tendency among people nowadays to downgrade the intellectual. We personally feel the real hip people in this world are those with education. I think the real squares are illiterates. Take Allen Shepard, the astronaut, for instance. He's a graduate engineer, I believe, a man of background, intelligence and humor. I think he must be the most hip and un-angry. This is a wonderful example of a man when you compare him to some people who snort at education. I don't know that if the public learns that I collect old books this will make me any funnier in their eyes. But I'm not collecting old books to be funny. I have them because I enjoy them."

Temporarily living in Hollywood while filming "Holiday Lodge," Wayne and Shuster have no plans to transplant their families—three sons of Wayne's and a son and daughter of Shuster's.

"At least right now we don't intend to. Our home, our roots are in Toronto. We feel we can continue to live there and commute to Hollywood or New York, wherever we wish," says Shuster. "It may prove that we'll live here and commute elsewhere. But we don't think that far ahead."

Long-established stars in Canada before Ed Sullivan heard of them, neither Wayne nor Shuster figures "Holiday Lodge" as a going-for-broke in their careers. Wayne says logically:

"We have no illusions about ourselves. We've been stars for 21 years in Canada. We had the highest ranking radio show for many years, and now we have the highest ranking TV show in Canada. We consider ourselves good writers, and so do most of the other writers we meet in America."

Shuster picked up the trend of thought by adding: "There's no rule that says we have to be an automatic successful big smash. We're trying the show to see what we can learn from it, but we don't have any crazy illusions about be-

coming the kings of situation comedy of all time."

The format of the show has Wayne and Shuster as recreational directors at "Holiday Lodge," situated at a scenic lake in Any Place California. To add romantic interest, Maureen Arthur, a Marilyn Monroe-type blonde beauty, has been cast as the receptionist at the lodge, and she is also Wayne's girl-friend. Other beauties will parade in and out of the various shows; the men mentioned, appreciatively.

The two friends literally since their Cub Scout days in boyhood, work as a team but only from 9 to 5. Promptly at 5 they separate, and don't see one another again until the following morning. The two feel it better to lead separate social lives. They explain it: "We have different friends because we're different people and different personalities."

How to describe Wayne and Shuster? They don't know how to describe themselves, either as humorists or comedians.

"We regard ourselves as men who try to make people laugh. If a humorist does this, we're humorists. If it's a comedian who makes people laugh, we're comedians. We have no illusions about our high status," Wayne maintains.

Shuster says, "Humorists are just fancy comedians."

Wayne continues: "It's like in college. When we first left, we were grads. We are now distinguished alumni. I think it's a title that comes with age."

So Shuster completes: "And when we get older, maybe we'll be humorists. Or perhaps a humorist is a fat comedian."

Neither is fat. Both are funny. You can judge for yourself.

# Leyden Gets Kicks Out of Sports Cars

Before a microphone, a TV camera and 500 spectators, ordinarily brave men are sometimes reduced to butterfly ridden, tongue-tied, shaking hulks.

"I'd rather take a licking than get up there," some would readily admit.

But Bill Leyden faces these theatrical crises every day as Emcee of NBC-TV's "It Could Be You"—and, for him, they hold no terror.

For real kicks, Bill hunches down behind the wheel of a competitive sports car and mixes it up with the pros on some of the fastest tracks in the country.

The excitement has gone out of modern living," says Bill, explaining his fascination with speed. "Out there on the track, you're putting your life on the line with nothing to save you but skill."

Bill is no mere hobbyist as a driver. He holds both the United States and International Professional licenses and averages one race every five weeks. His stable of cars include a Ferrari, a Maserati, a Corvette and an Osca.

"Racing is exciting," he says, "but not as dangerous as it looks. Personally, I'd rather drive in a race than on the Hollywood Freeway. With pros at the wheel, you're safer hub to hub at 120 miles per hour than you are going to the supermarket."

During World War II, he piloted 20 attack bombers and P38s over Italy, earning the Distinguished Flying Cross and five clusters in his Air Medal.

"But, I was the proudest of the Good Conduct Medal," he says, "because I never figured I'd make it."

Bill was a skin diver before he punctured an ear drum. He also likes to hunt.

As for his regular job, Bill says, "The show has done more for me than I have for it." Liking people has paid off for him. "People," he says, "are the closest we can come to infinite variety; everything else is finite."

He has only one lament: "I can't find time to do all I want to do."

Freddie Flintstone, the animated hero of "The Flintstones" on ABC-TV Friday nights, actually has two voices. Mel Blanc does the speaking roles, and Duke Mitchell does the singing whenever Freddie decides to exercise his vocal talent.

### Sullivan Learned Humility Before Going to Films

Long before the word became associated with the name of Arthur Godfrey, a great actress gave Barry Sullivan, star of "Tall Man" on NBC-TV Saturday nights, a lesson in humility he has never forgotten.

Barry was working with the great star Ina Claire on Broadway in a play, "Yankee Doodle." During that period the motion picture companies had begun to notice him and were making overtures. Naturally, Barry's agent also wanted him to go to Hollywood and the bigger money involved.

"After a long and ego-inflating chat with David Selznick," recalls Barry, "my hat else grew immeasurably. Just before curtain time that night I informed Miss Claire with a flare that I had decided to leave the company for bigger and better things.

"As the curtain went up, Miss Claire pinned me with a disdainful look and proceeded to make hash out of my part. She killed twelve of my laugh lines that night and made me look like a greenhorn trying out in a little theatre.

"It was the most humiliating experience of my life but I'm glad I learned about humility before I eventually landed in Hollywood."

Barry, now known as one of the nicest performers in the movie and TV colony, has made dozens of motion pictures since then. His current television show, "Tall Man," a western series about Billy the Kid, is his third regular series. Previously he starred in "The Man Called X" and "Harbor Master."

In recognition of the growing importance of TV films in the motion picture field, the 15th Cannes Film Festival in France in 1962 will be called the Film and Television Festival for the first time. Guy Mitchell has been set to do two 90-minute specials on Australia's TV network. Ed Sullivan has signed singer Robert Goulet for five guest appearances.

### Steve Dunne Hosts 'Double Exposure'

Steve Dunne, host on the new game show "Double Exposure" on the CBS Television Network, was born Francis Michael Dunne on Jan. 13, 1918, in Northampton, Mass.

The eldest of six children, he was graduated from Northampton High School in 1935 and then took a two-year stenographic course at a commercial school. His first job was with a local electric company, where he worked for a year. After another year with the Department of Entomology in Greenfield, Mass., Dunne enrolled at the University of Alabama and became a protégé of Dr. Donald Ramsdell, noted Boston psychologist. He paid his tuition by assisting Dr. Ramsdell, and supplemented his income with janitorial chores at Smith College during the summer.

Dr. Ramsdell wanted Dunne to become a psychology instructor, but his plans were altered by Jim Duggan who ran the Tuscaloosa, Ala., radio station, WJRD. The opportunity to do several 15-minute broadcasts convinced Dunne that his future was in radio.

After his second year at the university, Steve got a job as a part-time staff announcer on WOR in New York City. Then he went to WIAG in Worcester for a full-time staff job, which brought him closer to home and also made it possible for him to marry Vivian Belliveau, also of Northampton, in September 1940.

Soon after their marriage, the Dunes moved to New York and Steve got a staff job at WOR. He did numerous daytime dramas and game shows during the next year and a half, when he began receiving bids for his services from several Hollywood studios. He signed with 20th Century-Fox, where he made 14 pictures for his home studio and others, including "Lady Possessed" with James Mason, "Above and Beyond" with Robert Taylor, "I Married a Woman" with George Gobel, and "10,000 Bedrooms" with Dean Martin and Walter Slezak.

Between pictures he has done frequent radio and television shows from the West Coast. He has appeared on such radio programs as "Screen Directors' Playhouse," "Lux Theatre," "Stars Over Hollywood," "Family Theatre," and the feature role in the weekly detective series "Sam Spade."

His television credits include "Personal Appearance Theatre," "The Pepsi-Cola Playhouse," three "Chevron Theatre" leads, an announcer on "The Bob Crosby Show," "My Favorite Husband," star of the weekly series "Professional Father," and most recently star of "The Brothers Brannagan." The Dunes have two children: a son, Steve, born Oct. 5, 1942, and a daughter, Christina, born March 2, 1946.

### Tommy, Annette Get to Giggling

Annette and Tommy Sands appeared in the "Title Makers" on one of "Walt Disney Presents" recent Sunday shows. It was their first appearance together.
