# Tampa Hop

Miami, Fla., July 24 (AP)-An Eastern Air Lines propjet Electra was hijacked today and the pilot flew it to Cuba at gunpoint, A United States jet fighter accompanied the captive airliner to point three miles from Cuba.

The plane, Flight 202, took off from Miami International Airport at 10:05 a.m. (EDT), bound for ramps, New Orleans and Dallas with 33 passengers and five crewmen. It landed at Jose Marti Airport in Havana at 11:29 a.m. In his last radio report, Capt. W. E. Buchanan, said: "I am proceeding to Havana at pistol point." This call was picked up by Aeronautical Radio, Inc., in Key West, one station of a nationwide radio network supported by the airlines. First indication that something

was amiss, however, came when the \$3 1/2 million plane went sharply off course on the radarscope. A fighter from the Homestead Air Force Base near Miami tailed the airliner. There were reports that the fighter tried unsuccessfuly to turn the big plane back.

The Electra carried 21 paying passengers, 12 pass-carrying EAL employes, and the crew members. An airline spokesman said the passenger list had been turned over to the border patrol and the



"What in the world is hemochromatosis?" asks the distressed
wife of a patient. "And is it hereditary? Will my children be affected like their father?"

very rare disease, the explanation Although hemochromatosis is a very rare disease, the explanation of its probable cause may have far-reaching implications to which I invite the attention of young parents, in particular. It is not hereditary.

Hemochromatosis is a disturbance of iron metabolism. In it, wast deposits of iron discolor the skin, giving it a bronzed appearance, and settle in vital organs interfering with their function like sludge in a machine.

Among the organs particularly affected are the liver, the reproductive organs and the pancreas. And because of pancreatic involvement most patients with hemometas.

ment most patients with hemo-chromatosis have sugar in the urine. Hence the disease is called "bronze diabetes." Until recently we were at a loss to explain hemochromatosis or to do anything to prevent or cure it. in Africa, provided a clue and possible means for prevention. Briefly stated, a somewhat simiar disturbance (cytosiderosis) was observed in natives who drank beer brewed in iron vats. A study of cytosiderosis suggested that the disease was due, not to the beer as originally suspected, but to the vast amount of iron that was drunk with the beer. In other words, it was a sort of chronic

iron poisoning.
