

Under Certain Terms Profit Sharing Offered UAW

Detroit, July 28 (AP)—American Motors Corp. today offered the United Auto Workers union a profit-sharing plan and a 7-cent hourly wage increase annually over the next three years.

In exchange, American Motors asked the UAW to give up cost-of-living allowance and annual improvement factor clauses in their current contract expiring Sept. 7.

AMC's was the first settlement offer handed the UAW in negotiations started a month ago with the industry. In 1952 profit-sharing was the union's principal all-out goal but it failed to get it anywhere.

UAW vice president Norman Matthews said the union had not anticipated AMC's settlement offer and would give it serious consideration.

He added, however, he wanted to emphasize the UAW's position will not permit any tampering by anyone—the Big Three or the Big Four—with the principles of the annual improvement factor or cost-of-living escalator clauses.

TV Producer Says Networks Ask for Crime

Washington, July 28 (AP)—A television show producer said today the three major networks are responsible for what he considers excessive crime and violence on TV.

He testified the networks write letters asking for less violence, but make telephone calls urging "more sex, more violence and more blacker villains so we can kill them off in one big climax."

The witness, Maurice J. Unger, Hollywood manager for Ziv-United Artists, Inc., said there would be less crime and violence on shows seen by children if Congress reduced the excessive power of the three men who head the big networks.

He said the three have a stranglehold on programs and have more power than the Constitution.

Helped Convict Three State Witness Killed By Car Booby-Trap

Philadelphia, July 28 (AP)—Richard Blaney, an ex-convict who testified against three men convicted of a bizarre burglary, was killed in a gangland style yesterday by an explosion which ripped through his auto when he turned on the ignition.

Police later questioned and today released two of the convicted men and a shapely woman night-club owner awaiting trial.

Police Capt. David Brown said Lillian Rie, 31, owner of the Celebrity Room, Ralph Staino Jr., 27, and John C. Barker, 30, were questioned and released after accounting for all of their activities yesterday and Wednesday night.

The three voluntarily surrendered for questioning last night some six hours after Blaney was killed outside his home on his 27th birthday when his hoodlum rapped car was shattered by the explosion.

Richard's brother, Vincent, 27, who had been expected to be a prosecution witness in the burglary case, also was slain in gangland-style.

Blaney's chained body was pulled from the Atlantic Ocean off Margate, N.J., last August. He had been shot in the head. A grand jury in New Jersey indicted Mrs. Rie and Blaney for the slaying of Vincent Blaney but they were never extradited from Pennsylvania after a witness testimony was challenged by authorities.

France to Ignore UN Acts Concerning Bizerte Crisis

Paris, July 28 (AP)—France today served notice that she will not be bound by any United Nations Security Council action in the Bizerte crisis.

A government communique was issued a few hours before the U.N. Security Council was to take a renewed Tunisian complaint accusing France of aggression in dispute over the naval base.

At roughly the same time, French President Charles de Gaulle asked Adlai Stevenson, U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, to call on him. Some observers thought De Gaulle wanted to explain to Stevenson his position on Bizerte, and his policies toward the U.N.

Stevenson arrived in Paris in the late afternoon aboard a private plane from Nice and went immediately to De Gaulle's offices. He refused to make any statement but appeared in buoyant mood.

The government statement said Tunisia was now attempting to obtain through U.N. intervention what she had failed to secure by force.

"It is necessary to make it known," said the French communique, "that France has certainly no intention of settling the Bizerte issue through such a procedure."

France could block action in the Security Council with a veto, but this was not mentioned in the statement.

Reflecting De Gaulle's own stern views on the international organization, the statement called attention to various dangers now confronting France and the world, and concluded:

"France intends to remain the judge of her own security."

Stevenson, who is in France on a leisurely vacation, was informed that De Gaulle wanted to see him on landing from Nice.

American sources said the chief U.S. Delegate to the United Nations was not here on any mission for the Kennedy administration.
