3 Refuse to Resign Board of Education At Wagner's Request

New York, Aug. 16 (AP)—Three members of the city's 9-man Board of Education today refused to resign at the request of Mayor Robert F. Wagner.

They had been requested to bow out at the mayor's pleasure. The board is beset by charges of construction fraud and inefficiency within the school system.

The three holding the mayor's wishes were Dr. Charles Rank and Vito F. Lanza, Queens members, and Cornelius J. Walsh of the Bronx.

Five of the members agreed yesterday to resign. The ninth member is traveling in Europe. The entire board faces a vote when the state legislature convenes in Albany next Monday at the call of Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller to consider the city's school problems.

The board, beset by charges of construction fraud and inefficiency, has been asked to resign by Wagner, who said he was acting on recommendation of a special board of inquiry which he set up to study the situation.

The mayor said the five who offered to resign last night would continue in office at his discretion while he set up the machinery to appoint a new board.

He also declared that the city administration would fight in the courts any attempt by the legislature to abolish any Board of Education established by the city.

The board met in special session yesterday to consider the mayor's request, then asked to confer with him. At a 2-hour session last night, he modified his original call for immediate resignation.

The five who agreed to waive their rights to serve out their terms were board president Charles H. Silver, former Police Commissioner Francis W. H. Adams, Andrew G. Clouston Jr.,

New Satellite Checking Path For Astronauts

Cape Canaveral, Fla., Aug. 16 (AP)—A new robot observer sped through far reaches of Space today to find out just what kind of sailing for astronauts is created when the solar winds of radiation blow over Earth's magnetic fields.

Eleven hours after the launching of the "Windmill" scientific package from this missile test center last night, officials of the Civilian Space Agency reported on the basis of radio signals that the satellite experiment "looks good."

National Aeronautics and Space Administration scientists, however, reserved final judgment until mid-afternoon at earliest. That was because the elongated orbit, perhaps well beyond 54,000 miles out at the far point—would take two weeks ago against harassment of the satellite by solar winds.

U.S., Allies Still Disagree On Penalties for East Reds

East Reds Barricade All Exits

Berlin, Aug. 16 (AP)—East Germany's Communist regime turned its territory into a virtual prison camp today by extending its crackdown on travel to the West to its entire border—far beyond the confines of Berlin.

Soviet Col. Andrei I. Solovjev, commander in East Berlin and highest official to receive official western protests so far, refused to be worried by the clamor over the barricades of barbed wire, tanks and guns that has stopped the flow of East German refugees to the West.

He has not answered the protest of the western military command yesterday. But replying to another protest of nearly two weeks ago against harassment of East Berlin commuters he said he would not be moved by the flow of East German refugees to the West.

The East German Communist cut down on already limited travel by their own citizens to western Germany without making any announcement about it.

They thus extended the travel ban to include all East German citizens when they first shut off all travel of East Berliners to West Berlin and then allowed West Berlin motorists into East Berlin only by their own citizens to western Germany without making any announcement about it.

Top Bonn Aide Raps Inactivity

Washington, Aug. 16 (AP)—The United States and its western Allies appear to be having serious difficulty today in agreeing on precise measures which could be imposed to penalize the East German Communist leadership for barricading the East Berlin border and halting the flight of refugees to the West.

They had agreed Monday that counter measures were needed. State Department officials and representatives of the British, French and West German embassies met today in another attempt to decide upon a specific program of action which they had failed to work out in two previous meetings. West German Ambassador Wilhelm Grewe, leaving the conference at the State Department, said today: "There is a certain disappointment in Germany at the failure of the Western Allies so far to take countermeasures against the Red blockade of refugees fleeing to West Berlin."

The Allied conference met for about 90 minutes. Participants in addition to Grewe, included Assistant Secretary of State Foy D. Kohler, British Ambassador Sir Harold Caccia, and French Embassy Minister Claude Lelord.

Henry H. Towler, acting secretary of the Treasury in the absence of Secretary Douglas Dillon, and Paul Nitze, assistant secretary of defense for security affairs, also took part.

This was the third meeting of the Allied planning group in three days.

Reports in diplomatic quarters here and in press dispatches from abroad indicated that an old Allied split might have developed over the new issue—us with West Germany.

Charges as High as 20% Senator Urges Limit On Re-Loan Interest

Washington, Aug. 16 (AP)—President Kennedy's 5-year foreign development loan program, scathed but intact, today runs into another Senate effort to change it. Sen. John J. Williams, R-Del., wants to add an anti-usury amendment to the program.

Williams asked the Senate to accept a program under which loan money made available by the United States at rates as low as one per cent—and even interest-free—could not be reloaned at rates higher than 5 per cent.

The Senate turned to consideration of Williams' proposal after an attempt to cut Kennedy's requested borrowing authority for the 5-year loan program from \$8.8 billion to \$7.5 billion lost on a 46-46 vote.

This vote was still subject to a motion to reconsider. But the Senate's Democratic leaders said they were confident they would pick up additional support if there is another vote on the amendment.

Sen. J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., floor manager of the bill, for example, was absent from the chamber when the vote was taken.

The amendment, sponsored by Sen. Frank J. Lausche, D-Ohio, would have slashed the development loan requests by \$25 million this year and by \$300 million for each of the succeeding four years.

Its effect would have been to allow \$400 million of development loans this year and \$1.6 billion for each of the next four years.

Other bills make smaller cuts are pending.

A proposal by Sen. Allen J. Benson, D-La., to cut \$200 million off the \$1.8 billion in authorized development loans for the next year, defeated 57 to 38.

Western Powers Cautious Brandt Prods West For Political Action

Berlin, Aug. 16 (AP)—Mayor Willy Brandt of West Berlin announced today he has sent a letter to President Kennedy telling him Berlin expects more than words.

Brandt said a show-up rally of 200,000 West Berliners about the letter, declaring: "I said what we think in all frankness."

Brandt said he wanted "high western representations" to come to Berlin to see the situation for themselves, but did not name them.

He cheered and thundered applause. Brandt declared that by sealing off the West Berlin border, the Communists were using the old capital as a lever to split the Allies.

The Communists are not stopped at the Brandenburg Gate. Brandt declared he declares referring to the famous gate standing as a barrier between East and West Berlin.

The mood of West Berliners, impatient over Western Allied inaction, was reflected by Deputy Mayor Franz Armbusch, who told the crowd:

"Protests are not enough." The crowd collected in front of Schoenberg-Berghof Hall, headquarters of the West Berlin city government. Banners carried by the demonstrators read "Enough Protest, Let's Act," "Kennedy to Berlin to Betray," and "West."

There were calls for an economic boycott of the Communists and free elections in East Germany.

The rally was called by Brandt with the support of trade unions. Brandt said the Soviets had "loosened the leash a little on their dog" and allowed him to be no high hope that the full \$200 million requirement would be met by volunteers.

The Army announced on Monday that it will hold on July 28,000 men to service otherwise would end before next June 30.

Formal announcement of the Army plan apparently was arranged for an afternoon news conference with Army Secretary Elmer J. Stahr. He also said more precisely how the Army is going about its manpower increase and other authority granted by Congress in line with recommendations made by the Defense Department.

Army Puts 111 Reservist Units On Alert Status

Washington, Aug. 16 (AP)—The Army is activating 111 reservist units, some of them of division size, that they may be called to duty as part of the buildup of U.S. conventional forces for meeting any trouble over the border.

Most of them probably will be support-type outfits, although there may be some combat units.

This alert plan, similar to one announced recently by the Air Force for 71 Air National Guard and Reserve Units, followed closely other moves in the manpower expansion field by the Air Force and Navy.

The Air Force announced yesterday that it is aiming at adding about 28,000 men to its strength by asking volunteers to continue on duty after reaching normal active duty termination—and by holding others in service if there are no other volunteers. There seemed to be no high hope that the full \$200 million requirement would be met by volunteers.

Plane with 4 Still Missing, Hunt Pushed
New York, Aug. 16 (AP)—Planes and ships resumed search today for a light plane carrying four persons which disappeared over the Atlantic in the area of Coney Island, Mass., Block Island, R. I., and New London, Conn.

Coast Guard area headquarters here said the search was being conducted by five Coast Guard Air Force and Navy planes from New York, Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island, and by a Coast Guard cutter and two smaller patrol boats.

Search for the plane, carrying pilot and three passengers, was resumed today.

The plane, with enough fuel for four hours of flying, left New London Monday at 4 p.m. Radio contact with the plane was lost at 8 p.m.

The engineers on the plane were calibrating electronic equipment over waters in the area where it disappeared. The type of equipment being tested required frequent landings and takeoffs, said a spokesman for the New London Flight Services from which the plane was chartered.

Those on the plane were listed as Richard Harder, Waterford, Conn.; the pilot, Richard S. Allen, St. Bellair, Dr. Grotton, Conn., and Dominic Carl, 27, Midland Dr., Colchester, Conn., both engineers for the Electric Boat Division of a General Dynamics Corp., Groton, and Sidney Tanner, about 40, Tulsa, Okla., an employee of the Seawoman Corp., of Tulsa on assignment to Electric Boat.

Five Seats Lost By Ben-Gurion In Israel Vote

Tel Aviv, Israel, Aug. 16 (AP)—Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion's Socialist Mapai party appeared to have lost five seats in parliament today but remained Israel's dominant party and the backbone of the present government.

With about three-fourths of the votes counted in yesterday's parliamentary election, the trends point to a new cabinet headed by Ben-Gurion.

The prime minister, who waited the vote count at his department at 8:30, hailed the results as a victory for his party, despite setbacks in seats lost to the new Liberal party, Ben-Gurion's quarrelsome ally, and the Liberal because an American came from New York to campaign for them.

Ben-Gurion is expected to form another cabinet made up of the Mapai, the Liberal party and possibly religious and left-wing Labor parties.

The 120-member parliament will give him a majority in the 120-member parliament.

But Ben-Gurion charged that the election results have not made possible a change in the electoral system, but on the contrary have "deepened political divisions."

It is catastrophic, he said, that the majority of 51 per cent in the parliament for consideration of a commission for the election of a new cabinet.

The Liberal party, which has about 15 per cent of the vote, is expected to be a major force in the new cabinet.

Is Cuba In or Out of Alliance? Latins Block Guevara's Call for Red Advisers

Punta del Este, Uruguay, Aug. 16 (AP)—Cuban economic czar Ernesto (Che) Guevara tried to open the door today to Communist advisers for President Kennedy's \$20-billion alliance for progress but ran into a stone wall.

Delegates from the other 20 American nations at the Latin American Economic Conference blocked Guevara's proposal and in committee unanimously approved a 1,000-word "Declaration to the Peoples of Latin America" summing up the new program of economic aid and self-help for Latin America. Cuba abstained.

The declaration is an abridgement of the 3,000-word text of Punta del Este which sets forth the principles of the program in detail. The shorter declaration was drawn up with the idea that it could be more easily understood by Latin America's masses.

After approval at a conference plenary session today, both will be signed tomorrow when the conference closes one day behind schedule.

There was speculation whether Guevara would sign for Cuba. But this "Latin American Declaration" said even if he did, the U.S.-controlled agencies that will handle the bulk of the financing won't advance any funds to Cuba.

Guevara said his country can't fully accept the program until it gets a "clear and compact answer" from the United States whether Cuba is in or out of the alliance. He said the U.S. delegation steadily refused to commit themselves.

In the late night committee session that finally whipped the declaration into shape, Guevara made his pitch for Red technicians with an amendment saying that "experts from all over the world" rather than "independent experts" could assist Latin-American republics in their development.

When this was interpreted as an attempt to give Soviet bloc and Chinese experts a foothold in the program, delegates there unanimously approved a promise to promote all sectors of a nation's economy for a pledge to stimulate "private activity." This was an obvious effort to favor socialist development and remove official support for private enterprise.

Both amendments failed for lack of a second after Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon warned that it would be "very difficult" for the U.S. public to understand a change eliminating the stimulation of private enterprise.

A U.S. spokesman meanwhile announced that two reports from Guevara produced by the conference as evidence of U.S. influence in Latin America were stolen from the automobile of U.S. Ambassador Theodore Moscoso when a leftist mob burned it in Caracas June 2.

One of the documents, prepared by the labor attaché at the Caracas Embassy, criticized certain administrative procedures and the systems of the Venezuelan government. The other, regarding the industrial production last year, was also criticized.

Personal Income Total Hits Record

Washington, Aug. 16 (AP)—The government said today a July personal income of individual taxpayers in the United States hit a record.

The Commerce Department said personal income last month hit an annual rate of \$19.2 billion—an increase of \$1.9 billion over June. Not counted in this calculation was a \$228 million special dividend paid on Veterans life insurance policy.

Kennedy to Keep Ban On N-Tests This Year

Washington, Aug. 16 (AP)—President Kennedy is reported to have decided against any resumption of nuclear testing this year, regardless of whether the Russian demonstration at Geneva they want no further agreement.

The President's position, as outlined to congressional leaders, is that the United States should do nothing to prejudice the case except to make in the United Nations that the West is ready to accept a self-enforcing ban which would be "quite authentic" information.

Kennedy is sending his chief negotiator, Arthur H. Dean, back to Geneva next week to find out if the Soviets are still sticking to their "troika" demand for unanimous U.S. approval of a test ban. He said Dean will come home quickly.

There is little, if any, hope within the administration that the Soviet veto will change their position. Accordingly, the plan is to dramatize this last-chance rejection when the U. N. General Assembly meets in September.

A \$20,000 hijacked Cuban patrol boat, swapped for the Electra in a U.S.-Cuban agreement, arrived last night from New West.

CONGO CHIEFS TO MEET
Lopoldville, The Congo, Aug. 16 (AP)—Premier Cyrille Adoula left for Stanleyville today to see rebel leader Antoine Gizenga. Adoula hopes to solidify the new central government over the rebel provinces of Kasai, Katanga, Orientale and Kivu. Gizenga's followers of the late Patrice Lumumba have spoken out against Adoula in Stanleyville newspapers and radio, but the premier declared to meet their challenge in person on their home ground. Adoula is new in a United Nations plane.

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White House Gals Love Their Jobs

Washington (NSA)—Pres. trips overseas, love letters from unknown admirers and typing lessons from President Kennedy are just a few reasons why White House secretaries love their jobs.

For being a girl Friday to the President and his aide, is one of the most glamorous, exciting ways that a gal can earn a living.

During the past six months, 25 young women from all parts of the country have been finding this out time and time again. They are the secretaries who have entered the White House since Jan. 20 with the new administration.

All measure up to the image of the New Frontier women created by First Lady Jackie Kennedy. They are young, pretty and filled with the spirit of the new era.

They range from 20 through 38. Most have completed college. Many worked for Kennedy on Capitol Hill when he was a senator. Others helped out during his campaign.

Since going to work at the White House, all have learned to expect the unexpected. One day Kennedy's second secretary, 26-year-old Friedella West of Philadelphia, who is rarely asked to do typing, was struggling through a letter. The President strode into her office to see what was taking her so long.

"Let me show you how to pick up your speed," said Kennedy, a former newspaperman. He sat down and gave wide-eyed Friedella a typing lesson.

Word that the President is planning a trip overseas or in the U. S. always causes excitement among the secretaries. At least one of the girls is usually chosen to help out with the administrative chores that are part of every out of town journey.

Since joining the White House force, Barbara Gamaralain, who works for Assistant Press Secretary Andrew Hatcher, has visited London, Paris, Ottawa, Chicago, New York and Boston.

When news stories began appearing about the new White House staff, the girls found love letters turning up in the daily mail load. Some have also received telephone calls at the office from hopeful admirers seeking dates.

Nearly all express one way or another a kind of stage-struck reaction to working in the important White House setting. Says Beth Fein, an attractive 28-year-old Washington girl who works with the legislative liaison staff:

"We're riding the wave of the present. It's a marvelous feeling, being part of something vital."

Marilyn Mills, 27, of Guthrie, Okla., in the same office, adds: "This is history—right now."
