# Allowances **Build Wage** Guarantee

Detroit, Aug. 22 (A)-General Motors Corp., Ford Motor Co. and Chrysler Corp., today offered the United Auto Workers new 3-year contracts providing 6-cent - an - hour wage increases each year in addition to cost-of-living allowances.

The Big Three, presenting an united front, also offered expended fringe benefits and what they termed a new income guarantee to supplement pay in short work weeks for their 490,000 workers, Ford and Chrysler said their almost identical offers would ex-pire automatically if not accepted fully at both the national and lo-cal union levels by Aug. 31, the date of expiration of current 3-year contracts. GM, however, indicated it would be willing to negotiate changes in the basic pattern of the agreement.

The companies proposed hourly pay increases of 6 cents an hour each year or 21/2 per cent of the employe's hourly base pay, base pay, whichever is greater.

They also proposed extra bene-fits for employes who, due to layoffs, work less than 36 hours in any week. The benefits would be one-half of the employe's straight time per hour for the difference between the hours he works in a week and minimum 36 hours. The Big Three also offered to

increase maximum weekly Supple-mental Unemployment Benefita make it easier for employes to apply for and receive benefits. under which the companies pay their workers an additional ailowance to supplement what they receive in government unemp ment compensation.
