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Rockville-Vernon Olson Takes Wry Tack Replying to Charges

Democratic bias at Rockville's former Republican administration and at the Vernon election over the town dump dispute Monday were reiterated yesterday by Herman G. Olson, former Rockville mayor, now a candidate for town selectman.

Olson said he was "surprised" that the Democratic candidates for selectman should be so misinformed and misled by their advisers as to make the distorted statements.

He referred to a joint statement by Francis J. Pitkat and Robert W. Deming that "Tom Olson, Republican Chairman George D. Maharan had 'confounded the facts' about the Vernon dump tangle."

Bolton \$333,859 Education Budget Approved by Finance Board

The board of finance at a meeting last night approved and approved several budget proposals submitted by town departments.

The \$333,859 budget for the board of education which was discussed at length by the board, was approved, including capital expenditures of \$139,000.

It was pointed out that the school enrollment is expected to increase 8 per cent this year and that the budget went up 6 1/2 per cent, which members felt was reasonable.

First Selectman Charles Robbins asked the board of finance to appropriate \$115 to cover a refund of taxes to Charles and Lucille Gibson. He said the assessed value of their home had been placed a \$12,430 assessment on the Gibson property by mistake.

The tax abatement fund had only \$15, the extra appropriation of \$115 was transferred from unencumbered funds in the zoning commission account.

The H. M. Alexander Company will be asked to make an audit of the town treasurer's accounts immediately after the October election since the present treasurer, Kenney Hutchinson, will not be for that office again. It was voted to pay Alexander and Co. \$200 increase, to a total of \$600 for auditing all the town records this year.

The auditor has done the work for 400 for many years and board members felt that the requested increase was fair.

Budgets reviewed and approved include general highway, with a request for \$1,700, the same as last year; health officer, \$750, the same as last year; town counsel, \$500; Community Hall, \$3,000, unchanged from last year. Under Community Hall improvements the amount of \$600 will be budgeted for repainting the outside of the hall; \$100 for painting the interior of the lavatory rooms; \$240 for aluminum storm windows, fluorescent lights for the kitchen and an additional fire extinguisher.

At the suggestion of Tax Collector Anthony Messeri, the board decided to include \$150 in the budget for tax refunds instead of the usual \$100. Messeri thought the previous figure was inadequate. The appropriate amount of the dog warden was approved at \$1,000, including \$100 for the dog warden's expenses, \$1,000 for the budget for the town garage at \$875.

It was voted to increase the salary to Director of Welfare Mrs. Donald Tedford from \$60 to \$100, as suggested by Selectman Robbins as a token of appreciation for her services.

Requests for increases in salaries by the registrars of voters, the board of tax review and the park and recreation director were discussed but no action taken. These will be considered at another meeting of the board before the September budget hearing.

Each of the boys should notify his manager by Aug. 21 whether he will attend. There is no charge for the boys for the banquet. All adults attending will pay \$1.50 each.

British Charge Reds Inflamed Tunisia Issue

Soviet attacks on the western powers "must be regarded as an attempt to worsen the atmosphere in which this debate takes place."

"It is only too clear," the British delegate said, "that some members of the United Nations do not sincerely wish to see a successful negotiation between the two parties. The speech of the Soviet delegate (Monday) continues all too vividly an illustration of my point."

Crowe urged that France and Tunisia appoint representatives as soon as possible to work out a solution to their differences. He said

It was his understanding that France does not contest the principle of the eventual withdrawal of its troops from the naval base at Bizerte.

The British delegate, however, was critical of a 22-nation resolution calling for negotiations specifically on the question of French evacuation of the Tunisia base. He said the proposal included phrases which "are not in our opinion likely to contribute to a solution."

He did not state specifically how he would vote on the resolution.

Britain and African nations still allied with France were working behind the scenes to water down the resolution submitted by the 22 nations. The resolution would have the same moderating effect.

Senegal and Niger also urged other French-speaking African states to join them in amendments to eliminate the call for French withdrawal. But this group finally decided to take no action for the time being.

Tunisian Ambassador Mongi Blim said he would oppose any such amendments. He said the resolution had been watered down as far as it could be and that "no other delegation would be satisfied with so little in similar circumstances."

The Soviet Union warned that if any delegation submitted amendments to weaken the resolution, it would put in counter-proposals to strengthen it.

Many of Tunisia's backers felt more time should be put in the resolution, which omits any open condemnation of France.

The moves to tone down the resolution were prompted mainly by reports the United States would abstain in the vote so as not to offend France at this crucial stage in the East-West dispute over Berlin.

Chief U.S. Delegate Adlai Stevenson made plain to the assembly yesterday that his government is cold to the resolution as it stands. He said the assembly should not "attempt to dictate the

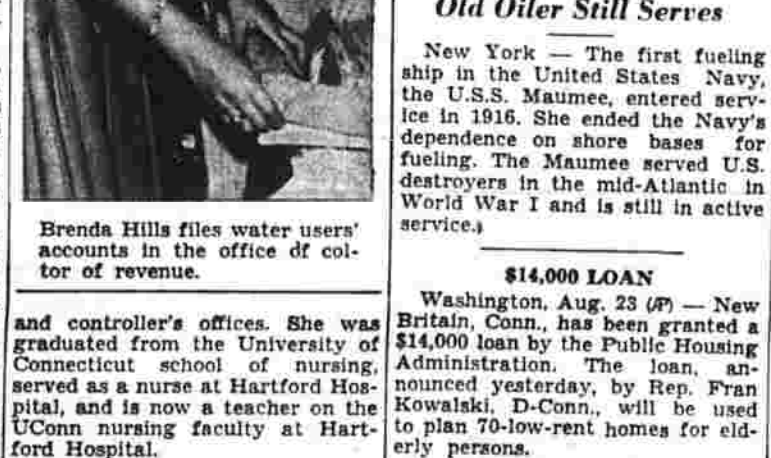

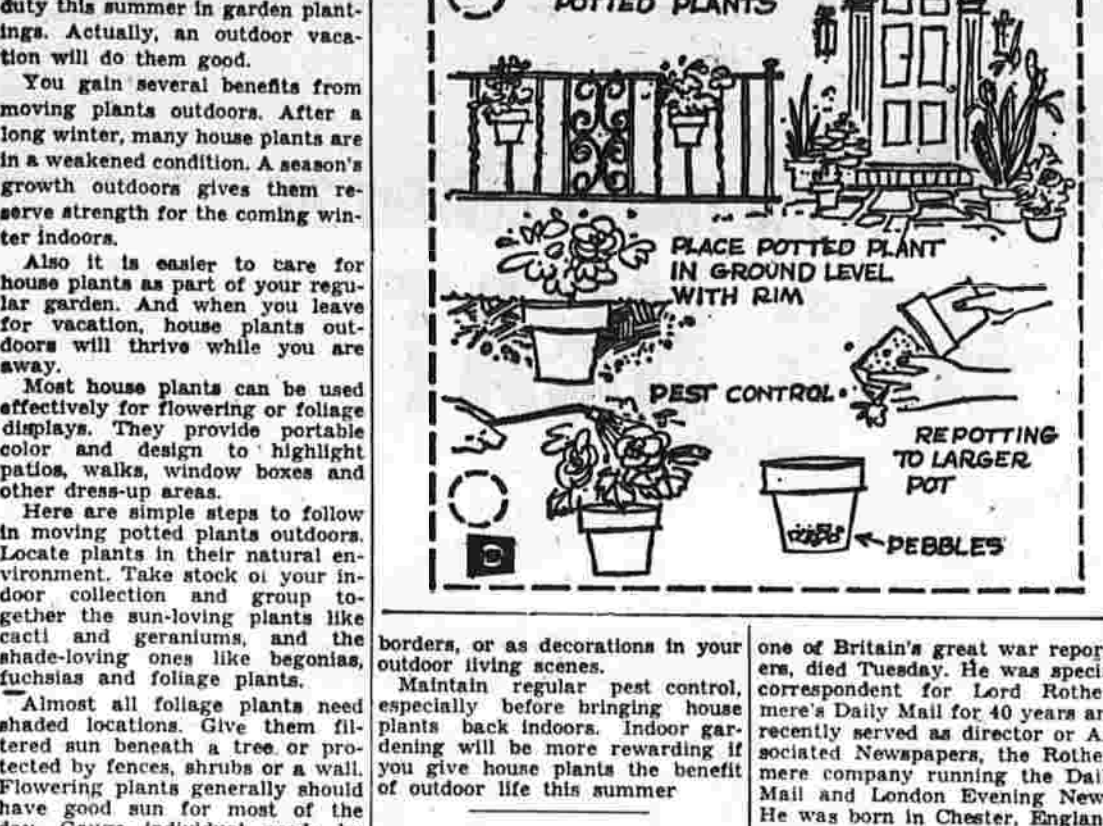

A Handsome Principle

This is the kind of a world which, if you are presumptuous enough to foist enough of idealistic enough to proclaim some high and principled standard of conduct for your side, or your nation, or your way of life—often almost immediately puts you to the test.

Those who would push handsome principles toward others must also consult their own will. It is not enough to have the principle, it must be applied. And if they find that they themselves are unwilling to come to applying these principles, then they must realize that the propaganda they had in mind is going to be somewhat limited in its effectiveness.

There is however, and fortunately, somewhat more chance with us, that we will accept its results, not because we do not because we feel we have to, in order to honor our own principle. Such a clear compulsion seems heading toward us in the wake of the weekend election in British Guiana, who calls himself a socialist but who has been called a Communist by others, has led his party to control of the legislature of what is scheduled to be a new free nation in this hemisphere.

Wooling The South

We do not happen to think ourselves that the nation stands in particular emergency need of any new civil rights legislation from the present session of Congress. We think the immediate concentration should be on the task of learning to live with the principles which are already set down clearly enough, in our ideals as well as in our law.

Along with this delicate deference to the South on civil rights legislation, there has also been met into play the normal patronage game open to a new administration.

It would seem about time, then, to examine into the question of just what cooperation a Democratic President has been able to obtain, via all this deference and generosity, from the South.

Something may be rescued for each of these three aims. But, if it is to be rescued, it must be rescued by the operation of Southern Democrats. It will more likely be due to the volunteer assistance of Northern liberals to whom the President is making no legislative concessions or patronage distributions.

Allies Push Tanks, Troops Up to Line Dividing Berlin

steel helmets and fixed bayonets patrolled up and down inside a foot strip which the Communists have said should be a No-Man's Land. The armored personnel carriers, several jeeps and a radio car were seen on patrol in the French sector.

US tanks, parked about 50 yards inside their sector, looked as if they were aiming their guns directly at the building that houses many East German government offices. In Nazi lines, the tanks were pointed toward the East German Air Ministry.

The tanks were under the command of Capt. Jack C. Davis, 31, Tahquah, Okla. There was also an armor personnel carrier in the armor was operating with the 2nd Battle Group, U.S. 6th Infantry, which said itself the "Go-Guardians."

Brig. Gen. Frederick O. Hartig, who commands the 4,800 U.S. troops now in Berlin, came down to the Friedrichsplatz area at the situation. An army helicopter hovered overhead. A U.S. radio jeep parked only 25 yards from a battery of East German tanks and police guarding the barricades. A U.S. armored truck, with machine gun pointing east, stayed 100 yards from the border.

The move was an obvious effort to show West Berliners that the allies are raising a military fist each time the eastern Reds turn on more pressure. Hundreds of West Berliners were attracted to the border by the sight of the tanks. They evidently were glad to see the troops.

Girls put flowers on some of the American vehicles. On the East Berlin side, the Americans could see a great deal of scurrying about with many bicycles lined up on the street. Mayor Willy Brandt's West Berlin government announced it was taking its own counter-measures. It would not allow "undesirable" persons from East Berlin to cross into West Berlin.

The government also announced an "infamous" proposal from East Berlin Mayor Friedrich Chrobak to set up two Communist travel agencies in West Berlin where West Berliners could get permits to visit the eastern side.

The Communist reduced from 80 to 12 the crossing points along 26 miles of border between East and West Berlin on Aug. 13 and 14. Today the openings were limited to four for West Berliners, 38-600 of whom work regularly in East Berlin. Two more openings were set aside for West Germans. Foreigners, including soldiers and diplomats of the Western Allies, were told to use the one opening at Friedrichsplatz from 12 to 7.

The Communist also repeated a week-old announcement that West Berliners to enter East Berlin would have to get special permits from two offices in West Berlin, a Travel Bureau in West Berlin and a Travel Agency in East Berlin. But there are no such East German travel agencies in West Berlin.

Those commuting to work in East Berlin were still allowed to pass the barricades with only a card showing they had jobs in the East. Such permits have been required from West Germans since last year. The Communist also threatened to cut West Berlin's rail link with the West.

Otto Arndt, manager of the East German Railroads, charged that hoodlums, inspired by the West Berlin Government, had trade unions, were tearing up seats and committing other acts of sabotage on the Communist-run elevated system which operates to East and West Berlin. The elevated Arndt said was part of the East Berlin rail system and continued sabotage led to "serious disturbances" in the system. By this, he said, a possible halt in rail traffic to and from West Berlin.

He claimed the trains in West Berlin run on East German tracks only have control of the trains but not over the territory over which they operate. East-West elevated and subway trains continued to operate across the sector border, but all traffic was routed through the Friedrichsplatz station where the identification of all passengers was checked.

One of the refugees was Eisler, traveling with his pretty Polish fiancée, some 15 years his junior. After numerous pleas, investigations, and denial of any Communist connections, the pair got visitors' visas.

They were married in Norwalk, Conn. the next year and set up housekeeping in a quiet suburban section of New York City.

Neighbors, immigration officials, and practically everyone else were surprised in 1948 when the Communist mastermind "Hans Berger," described by ex-Communist Louis Budenz as the spy who gave all the orders but "never shows his face," turned out to be Eisler.

Called before the House Committee on Un-American Activities he refused to answer the committee's questions and was cited for contempt of Congress.

He got a year in jail on that charge, and soon was on trial again for making false statements on a request for a permit to leave his country. That case ended with another prison sentence of one to three years.

Eisler appealed both convictions to the Supreme Court, and meanwhile was released after a left-wing group put up his bail of \$23,500.

On May 7, 1949, Eisler paid 25 cents to inspect the Polish liner *Batory*, then, hid until several hours after she had sailed.

Taken off the ship in Southampton, Eisler was released by the British several weeks later and finally went home to his native Germany — the eastern sector of it.

Eisler was born in Leipzig, but grew up in Vienna, where his father was a professor. Gerhardt joined the Communist party in 1921, as soon as he got out of the Austrian Army, and a few years later was sent by the party to Germany.

There he worked with his sister, who was known as Ruth Fischer and was a powerful party figure until she was expelled for deviating in 1929. It was this sister whose testimony helped the United States to convict Eisler.

After a fling in China, where he went as a journalist but allegedly worked as a secret Communist agent, Eisler returned to Germany.

Eisler's arrival here in 1941, according to FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, under one of many visas paid to the United States — all others under aliases with forged papers.

achieved, Goldstone was not to have received radio reports from Ranger until hours later.

Another rocket and a second payload, Ranger II, are available for a new effort tentatively set for this fall.

The early portion of flight appeared normal as the huge missile lifted into the early morning sky and sped swiftly from sight.

At the blazing rocket started into the cold air of the upper atmosphere August 17, the Ranger II vapor blossomed brilliantly around the vehicle. The rays of the rising sun illuminated this trail for several minutes after the projectile streaked from sight.

The speed and direction of a space package, carried "piggy back" can be measured accurately and unobtrusively while it is still in "parking orbit." Then for in advance, scientists can calculate a point that will be best for the Ranger II lunar or interplanetary voyage.

Previously moon probes fired from Cape Canaveral were expected to spend only 15 minutes of their brief flight in the atmosphere before being launched by perfection of the system.

The Ranger I spacecraft was not aimed at the moon as planned. Officials wanted it to skim through millions of miles of space for several months, gathering data on space conditions and reporting on the operation of its instruments. The 16,000 electronic parts which make it the most complex and advanced spacecraft ever sent aloft by the United States.

Ranger I also is one of the strangest-looking space vehicles. It resembles a child's "Tinker Toy" bristling with tubular antennas, rods and dials, solar panels and Earth sensors, and intricate packages.

It stands 31 feet tall and is 5 feet across its hexagonal-shaped base. Two solar panels extend to extend wings to a span of 17 feet once ranger speed into space.

As one of its 16 scientific instruments, Ranger will try to determine the Earth trails a conical trail of hydrogen gas. It carries a small telescope-like scanning device to take and transmit crude pictures of this possible phenomenon.

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Cuba Demands Prison for 74

Havana, Aug. 23 (AP)—The Cuban government has asked prison terms of 10 to 20 years for 74 persons, including two Roman Catholic priests and a number of students, charged with plotting to overthrow the government of Prime Minister Fidel Castro.

At the trial in Santiago, the prosecutors asked 20 years for priests Balduino Labre Martinez and Juan Manuel Sola and 20 years for Alberto Muller, a student leader.

All are accused of working against Castro "under the influence of the church and the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency."

Government sources said Muller, a former Havana University student, left the country last year, then returned to Cuba to lead anti-Castro forces in Santiago Province, groups in the United States and Latin America to Castro to spare his life.

A number of the defendants reportedly were captured during an uprising in the Sierra Maestra last April around the time of the ill-fated Cuban invasion.

Detroit, Aug. 28 (AP) — Walter P. Reuther is lambasting the Big Three car makers and courting Little American Motors Corp. in the home stretch of labor contract negotiations in the auto industry. Ocean Depths Could Be More Vital Than Space

By HAY CHOMLEY

Washington — (NPA) — The ocean depths may turn out to be more critical than outer space in the competition against Soviet Russia.

While the first effort is basic, it could revolutionize undersea warfare. Ocean undersea routes now are being mapped out for submarine crossings of the Atlantic and Pacific oceans that would be virtually impossible to detect. Along other routes, submarines would be sitting ducks for the enemy. Because their sound would be greatly magnified by the ocean.

By knowing more about the habits of fish, plant locations and such, submarines one day may be able to "hide" screened by the sounds of this marine life.

There is one point two: By learning when and where to set off a constant stream of underwater sounds—or electronic waves—American coastal defenses could prevent them from operating successfully underwater. Then, according to theory, they would have to surface and become sitting ducks for U.S. patrols under ever getting the chance to bomb the U.S. There are some scientists who

believe that, if they knew enough about the ocean's characteristics, they could temporarily heat, freeze, change the sounds coming through water and confuse the enemy.

Other men are searching for ways to forestall and use the temporary "channels" under the ocean surface through which sounds can be sent and "heard" over very long distances. The nation that first conquers the problem of "hearing" long distances underwater will have the drop on the enemy—both on its submarines and surface ships.

But this isn't all. There are researchers who figure that atom bombs set off in the right place and time in the ocean, could change the ocean currents and the climate.

The sea also may provide an abundance of some key minerals in the event of a wartime scarcity, including:

1. Large oil and gas deposits that may be in the undersea continental shelf areas of the Caribbean, South America and Alaska.
2. Known deposits of iron ore, manganese, nickel, copper, zinc, lead, silver, and gold.
3. Iron ore deposits now being mined from under the inner edge of a continent—the shelf off Bell Island, Newfoundland.
4. Coal coals along the coast lines and extending seaward off Vancouver Island on Canada's West Coast, Nova Scotia on its east coast, and Chile.
5. Phosphoric deposits on high areas of the California coast, that
