Landers Seldom Quoto The True Interest Rates Wake up! Credit like all goo hings can be and is being abused. The miracle of it is that with so much temptation so relatively few of us go overboard when it come o using consumer credit.

If you are a wise user of credit, you will shop around until you find a lender that offers the lowest true

a lender that offers the lowest true interest rate. Unfortunately few lenders today quote true interest rates. Instead, there are three other methods gen-erally used by lenders to calculate what they will charge when you borrow. These are: The add-on method in which the lender adds the finance charge to the amount borrowed. If you bor-row \$100 at 6 per cent, you pay back \$8.83 each month for a year, or a true interest rate of over 10 per cent.

or a true interest rate of over 10 per cent. Borrow by the discount method and the lender subtracts the finance charge. If you borrow \$100 for a 12-month period at 6 per cent, you receive only \$94 and repay \$8.33 monthly. This is fractionally cheap-er than the add-on method but still not true 6 per cent rate since you do not have the full use of the \$100 for the full 12-month period. Tinally, you can be charged in-terest on the unpaid balance. Here the interest charge is calculated each month on the amount you still owe. Providing the rate of interest charged is the same as that of an add-on or discounted loan, the true cost is lower because you pay in-terest on progressively smaller amounts.

How much interest you wind a paying on any loan depends on sev-eral factors: How good a credit risk you are, how long you choose to use the money you borrow. It is less expensive if you borrow for 12 months than for 36. It also de-

12 months than for 36. It also de-pends on from whom you borrow. "In the wonderland of credit, the consumer is almost never told the cost of debt in terms of true an-nual interest," writes Hillel Black in his recently published book "Buy Now, Pay Later." There is much that you can learn about the use, abuse and history of credit from this reporter's ex-pose of the world of lenders. Black's big point is that selling money has become an industry in itself. The sellers of credit are dis-covering that more profit can be derived from debt itself and there-fore the sale of the merchandise is becoming secondary.

supported by rebel army officers. President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the UAR bowed to the volutionary command which led the predawn uprising yes-

He announced that he had recalled troops, planes and warships sent to crush the revolt, and indicated he would leave to the Syrians the task of working out their future.

"The regime of tyranny has gone forever," said Damascu proadcasts proclaiming independence from Cairo, accusing Nasser of turning Syria into a prison and disputing his claim to Arab leadership.

Speaking to a crowd of 100,000 in Cairo, Nasser said the entire Egyptian Navy, Air Force and two Army regiments were sent to Syria yesterday, but were recalled to avoid blood-shed when the rebels took over Latakia, Syria's chief port.

shed when the rebels took over Latakia, Syria's chief port. A party of 120 parachutists, dropped before getting the orders to return, were toid to surrender, Nasser said. The Syrians already had reported the parachutists wiped out. One broadcast said 200 paratroopers were wiped out and another said 120 commandos were captured, but both apparently ref-erred to the same action. Nasser angrily denounced the rebels as imperialist reactionaries and traitors and said he was sure the Syrian people would eventual-ly "preserve their free principles in the face of capitalist dictator-ship."
