To Save NHRR Trustees Ask For \$15 Million

New Haven, Oct. 9 (AP)—The trustees of the New Haven Railroad look toward a \$15 million loan as the only immediate hope of keeping the line alive.

One of them, William J. Kirk, said the debt-stricken railroad, now operating under trusteeship, "can't provide service beyond next month" unless it receives permission to borrow the money.

The two other trustees, Harry W. Driscoll and Richard Joyce Smith, gave no deadline for a possible end to the New Haven but agreed the loan was necessary. The alternative, they said, was "to stop running the railroad."

The gloomy picture was painted at the first news conference held by the three trustees since they were named last Aug. 3.

As Kirk put it, the life of the New Haven, which filed for reorganization July 7 under the Federal Bankruptcy Act, is "greatly in jeopardy."

The trustees said "much of the passenger operations cannot be operated profitably and therefore cannot be continued unless adequately financed by public funds."

"The trustees stand ready," they said, "to provide such passenger service as federal, state and municipal authorities may decide is essential, provided the railroad is properly and adequately compensated for this inherently unprofitable service."

The conference afforded an opportunity for the trustees to make public what they called some of their "tremendous problems" since assuming their duties. It was held Friday, but with the provision that the trustees' names would not be released to the public until last night.

They have sought U.S. District Court permission to borrow \$15 million to keep the New Haven running for the next 10 to 12 months.

An Oct. 17 hearing before Federal Judge Robert Anderson on the petition for \$15 million in trustees' certificates, with priority over existing obligations under section 77 of the Bankruptcy Act.

Delay Asked On Phone Co. Rate Hearing

Waterbury, Oct. 9 (AP)—State Sen. William J. Verrier today asked the State Public Utilities Commission (PUC) to postpone for 30 days the Oct. 23 hearing on the Southern New England telephone company's petition for rate increases.

Verrier said he made the request in a letter to PUC Chairman Eugene S. Loughlin. He said the scheduled date, "under the most favorable circumstances," leaves a short time in which to prepare properly an adequate opposition.

The Waterbury legislator is Senate chairman of the General Assembly's Finance Committee, which drew up the tax increase bills passed by the 1916 session. The tax bills included boosts in public utility company taxes.

Verrier also suggested in his letter that copies of the telephone company's petition for increased rates be sent to every municipality in the state.

Verrier listed as another reason for his objection to the Oct. 23 hearing date the current election campaign in Waterbury. He said that he was "extremely busy" in his role as Democratic Town Committee chairman.

Archbishop Improves

Hartford, Oct. 9 (AP)—Hartford Roman Catholic Archbishop Henry J. O'Brien, stricken late last month with a heart attack, has been taken off the critical list at St. Francis Hospital.

This was reported today by a spokesman for his office, who said the Archbishop spent a comfortable night and appears to be progressing satisfactorily.

The prelate entered St. Francis Sept. 18 for treatment for a respiratory condition, and was held low two days later by the heart ailment. He has been on the critical list since then.

Hartford, Oct. 9 (AP)—Attorney William R. Burke, Farmington, was appointed today to the State Public Utilities Commission by Gov. John N. Dempsey.

Burke, a Democrat and member of the Hartford law firm of Bracken and Burke, succeeds the late Basil P. Fitzpatrick, of West Hartford.

The job pays \$11,160 per year. Burke will serve under an interim appointment until the 1963 session of the state legislature. At that time the Governor will nominate him to fill Fitzpatrick's unexpired term, which ends June 30, 1965.

President In Midwest Next Month

Newport, R. I., Oct. 9 (AP)—President Kennedy undertook today a sad, sentimental journey to Texas to comfort ailing Sam Rayburn.

The President switched plans and ordered his Air Force jet to head for Dallas, Tex., instead of back to Washington at the close of a weekend here—beside and on the sea.

The 79-year-old Speaker of the House is gravely ill in a Dallas hospital, combating incurable cancer. Distinguished national leaders and politicians have been showing or dropping in to see him. Kennedy himself has been kept informed constantly of Rayburn's condition. He has been checking for several days to find out whether it would be wise for him to visit the Speaker's bedside.

The decision to make the trip was reached this morning. As the man who served longer than any other as Speaker, as "Mr. Democrat" to both political friends and foes, Rayburn was a powerful ally of the President in Congress. He left Washington a month before Congress adjourned to go home to Texas and try to get rid of what he said was luggage in an aching back.

Kennedy will miss Rayburn's advice and help. But he scarcely is in a position to broach with Rayburn a discussion of a possible successor, for regardless of what he may suspect, Rayburn has not been told by his doctors that cancer is striking down his long illustrious career in politics.

Kennedy might hesitate to bring up the matter in any event. Election of a new Speaker will be the business of the House, and as a graduate of the House, before he

War Threat Eases in Laos Princes for Souvanna, Split on Cabinet Jobs

Hin Heup, Laos, Oct. 9 (AP)—The three factions in Laos wrangled today over a cabinet for neutralist Prince Souvanna Phouma, named premier in an agreement reducing the prospect of new fighting in the jungle kingdom.

Souvanna Phouma, 60-year-old Paris-educated former premier backed by the Soviet bloc, personally announced the agreement reached yesterday by himself, pro-western Premier Boum Oum and Prince Souphanouvong, leader of the pro-Red Pathet Lao.

The other two princes stood beside Souvanna during the announcement, made at the negotiations tent at this village on the cease-fire line 50 miles north of Vientiane, administrative capital of Laos.

Agreement on Souvanna had been expected. Boum Oum presented a major concession by Boum Oum's U.S.-backed regime, which had been demanding that King Savang Vatthana be presented a list of several candidates for the premiership of the coalition government. The Pathet Lao in turn withdrew its demand that the king be handed a full cabinet as well

Local Rejects Profit Sharing In AMC Pact

Detroit, Oct. 9 (AP)—The future of the auto industry's historic profit-sharing plan was cast in doubt today.

AMC's Local 72 of the UAW at Kenosha, Wis., voting contrary to the four other locals of the company, rejected the plan formally last night.

Officials of the company and international officers of the UAW were reported in separate huddles here today on what steps to take.

The AMC development came as another nettlesome problem in the months-long effort to settle on new 3-year contracts in the auto industry.

Ford Local 600 of the auto union set off picket lines barring office workers from entering the company administration building in the week-old strike against Ford.

Since last Tuesday, Ford's 120,000 hourly workers have been on strike over local plant issues. Ford and the UAW already had agreed on a 3-year economic package. But local disputes prevented a general settlement. Negotiations have been continuing.

Rayburn Gets Test Injection To Halt Cancer

Dallas, Tex., Oct. 9 (AP)—Speaker Sam Rayburn, taking injections that may prolong his life in his fight against cancer, was reported today to be resting comfortably and not in pain.

Dr. Ralph Tompsett, chief of internal medicine at Baylor University Medical Center, issued this bulletin:

"Mr. Sam Rayburn had a fairly good night. He is awake and alert. He seems comfortable and complains of no pain. A few minutes ago he was sitting up in bed having his breakfast. There is no change in his condition."

Rayburn is being given an experimental drug called "5-fluorouracil." He received the first injection yesterday, will get another today and, if all goes well, will receive daily injections for around two weeks.

It will be several days, Dr. Tompsett said, before it is known whether the drug produces undesirable side effects.

Typical bad effects: Nausea, vomiting, changes in blood pressure or in the blood count.

The drug is not a cure, but it may halt the spread of cancer.

Rayburn appears to be doing about as well as can be expected. Each medical bulletin has said "rather fairly comfortably" or "ate reasonably well."

Rayburn is eating what he likes, and yesterday had one of his favorite foods: Honey.

Victim Disputes Charges Prosecutor Says Doctor Gave Wife Poison Shot

Port Orchard, Wash., Oct. 9 (AP)—Dr. Robert E. Boehme, 41, accused of injecting poison into his wife's arm, was to be arraigned today on a charge of first degree assault with intent to kill.

His wife, Dorothy, 34, said she would leave hospital bed to be at his side.

Boehme was freed on \$25,000 bond after his arrest Saturday. An attractive nurse, Mrs. Mary Boehme, 28, Annapolis, Wash., was arrested as a material witness, and released on \$5,000 bond.

Mrs. Boehme was married to the doctor's brother, Jack, an Oregon State University pharmacy student, for about three years. They were divorced in 1959.

Prosecutor Gordon Walgren said Dr. Boehme is accused of injecting poison into his wife's arm with a blood-sampling syringe Sept. 20.

Mrs. Dorothy Boehme called the charge "preposterous."

The doctor said his wife had been a diabetic for about 20 years, and recently suffered from hepatitis, an inflammation of the liver, "I love my wife," he said. "To say that I would try to destroy her is fantastic."

The couple has two sons, aged 8 and 10.

The involved case took another twist when the prosecutor said he and Mrs. Mary Boehme had filed an application for a marriage license June 22.

Red Envoy Battles Amsterdam Police As Tourist Defects

Amsterdam, Oct. 9 (AP)—Soviet Ambassador Panteleimon K. Ponomarev and several of his staff were involved in a fight with Dutch Military Police at Amsterdam Airport today.

The scuffle came in a dispute over the passport of a Russian tourist, Mrs. Alexei Golub, whose husband bolted from a party of tourists and asked asylum Saturday.

West Split on Berlin Aims U.S. Seeks to Get Allies Support New Red Talks

London, Oct. 9 (AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko plans a stop in London tomorrow en route home from the United States and Foreign Secretary Lord Home hastily made arrangements to meet him.

Gromyko's decision to visit London, coming after his fruitless talks with President Kennedy in Washington, surprised and puzzled British diplomats.

VIOLET NEAR TOKYO
Tokyo, Oct. 9 (AP)—The Central Meteorological Agency reported tonight that Typhoon Violet has changed course slightly and likely will spare the heavily populated Tokyo region its full fury. Weather reports, nevertheless, indicated the capital and surrounding regions will be buffeted by winds up to 95 m.p.h. in the next 24 hours, plus torrential rains. The agency said in an 1: p.m. report that Violet's center winds had decreased from 145 m.p.h. to 134 m.p.h., but warned that its radius of 175 miles would cause it to envelop some of the Tokyo region, in which more than 10 million people live.

Bulletins Culled from AP Wires

REDS CLAIM N-SUB FLEET
Moscow, Oct. 9 (AP)—The Soviet Union claimed today it has the world's fastest fleet of nuclear submarines, faster than the swiftest Atlantic liners. AL, an Ivestia writer reported, armed with long range nuclear rockets. The government newspaper hinted that Marshal Georgi K. Zhukov was fired as defense minister and from the Premiership of the Communist Party on Nov. 2, 1957, for opposing construction of the atomic sub. On the opening program it was announced that Leonard Bernstein would be conductor for seven years, which should make many people happy. On the other hand it was likewise announced that he would only conduct for six weeks at the start of the season, and the same number at the close.

The Philharmonic season is 30 weeks and the remaining concerts will all have guest conductors, some of whom will only conduct once. This is extremely bad for the system in the past and the orchestra always went down hill.

An orchestra gets used to one conductor when he is permanent, and plays the way he wants them to play. This results in convincing performances, because the musicians know just what the boss wants. This is not the case under guest conductors, and conviction flies out of the window.

Each conductor is an individual with his own style of interpretation, and gestures. The musicians consequently are not always certain just what he will do, and he means when he does it. Just when they get used to his style and idiosyncrasy, they get a new conductor, and have to start all over again.

This is no matter how great the guest conductor may be. There will always be a certain amount of hesitancy in response, on the part of the musicians, until they have played a dozen or more concerts under the conductor's baton. Perhaps you don't realize it, but a conductor who has had his own orchestra will make the difference between a clear and a sloppy performance.

With some instruments an error of this size could be disastrous. Flutes and clarinets, for example, can play more than sixteen notes a second if they are pressed and I hesitate to think what it would sound like if one of them got a

Since they took over two months ago, the trustees said, the problem has been one of trying to keep the New Haven operating without cash.

The cash box was drained pretty completely when we took over," they said.

They need time, they said, to determine whether there is hope of continuing the operation.

While succeeding in trimming expenses, the trustees said they have been meeting an approximate \$1.5 million weekly payroll and all other obligations.

They emphasized that there were no plans for any employee layoffs, but that they were investigating the feasibility of shrinking the orchestra's facilities and operations.

Fares also are under investigation with the possibility of reductions in some areas.

The trustees said they were studying trackage requirements for future operations on main and secondary lines and the future use of the Coe Cob. Conn. power plant and the New York harbor facilities and floating operations.

Abandonment of certain branch lines also is being considered, the trustees said, along with reduction in size of certain major facilities that include South Station in Boston, and terminal and passenger facilities at Providence, Mass., Providence, R.I., New Haven and Hartford, Conn., and Springfield and Worcester.

Freight operations are being analyzed, they said, and the function of the New England Transportation Co.—a wholly-owned subsidiary of the New Haven—is being reviewed.

Cyanide Killed Two Students, Police Report

Chapel Hill, N. C., Oct. 9 (AP)—Police Chief W. D. Blake says the cyanide poisoning deaths of two University of North Carolina students found dead in their room were "either double murder, a suicide pact or murder-suicide."
Police are continuing their investigation, while waiting for an analysis report on the contents of two milk shakes cups found in the room shared by the two, James Michael Barker, 20, Burlington and William Harrison Johnson Jr., 24, Statesville.
The bodies were discovered Friday morning in their dorm room. They failed to report for self-help jobs in the dining hall. An autopsy report received Saturday said the deaths resulted from cyanide poison. A 6-man coroner's jury received the report.
Chief Blake said, "If we can locate the source of the poison, I believe we'll be a long way in clearing up the mystery."
The chief said that during the course of the investigation it was learned that a university student had deadly mercuric cyanide pills in his possession but that the rest of the student body was not connected with the deaths.
Chief Blake identified the student as Ralph Seargent, 30, a Junior from Plainfield, N.J., and said he was released under bond on a charge of dispensing poisonous drugs. The chief emphasized that Seargent cooperated fully with officers, and told them he didn't even know the two students who died.
The chief said Seargent said he took nine mercuric cyanide pills from the dental laboratory where he worked in New Jersey before coming to school. Eight of the pills were in the private room in town where Seargent lives, and the ninth was recovered from an unidentified student to whom it was given, the chief said.
Blake said the pills contained one gram. A medical authority said 1/10 of a gram can be fatal.
Blake quoted several students as saying they saw Barker in a restaurant in town the night before he died. The students, Blake said, related that they offered to call a doctor, but that Barker did not appear to be greatly concerned about his roommate's condition.

Strange Thoughts Before Big Assignment

Cincinnati—What does a starting pitcher in the World Series think about before going to the mound? If you said the opposition, you're wrong. Getting out of the bright sun, 76 degrees temperature and into the shade of the New York Yankee stadium before yesterday's fourth game of the 1961 series, I was joined by Whitey Ford, the victor's only 20-plus pitching winner this season and holder of a one-day record of two-hitter over Cincinnati.
