Rockville/Vernon
Renewal Loan
Repayment to
State Defined

Rockville's urban renewal advisory committee has agreed that the city must pay back a state renewal loan over a 15-year period. The committee's decision was announced by Councilman H. Lord-Wood, renewal planning consultant, who told the advisory committee that the state's estimated \$100,000 share in the city's renewal project must be paid back before seven years after the project is completed.

Under statute, the money will come from tax revenue collected in the project area over and above amounts collected at present.

The information cleared up a point not clarified at a September dinner meeting in which the city's renewal program was outlined in terms of proposed construction and costs.

The federal government grant will amount to about \$800,000, or 75 per cent of the estimated project cost of just under \$1.3 million.

Before deductions for non-taxable property, the city's work will be paid for by the state's share of the project cost.

The city will pay the loan over a 15-year period, with payments to stop at the end of 10 years, if the city will have to pay before that time.

Lord-Wood said experience gained in other urban renewal projects indicates the Rockville development area at least will be able to pay the loan.

The revenue to the city at present is \$96,423 from the proposed renewal area.

Development will increase annual city revenue to \$1,000,000.

Lord-Wood's discussion of the renewal project was terminated by the advisory committee who were given a picture of the city's master plan for the renewal project.

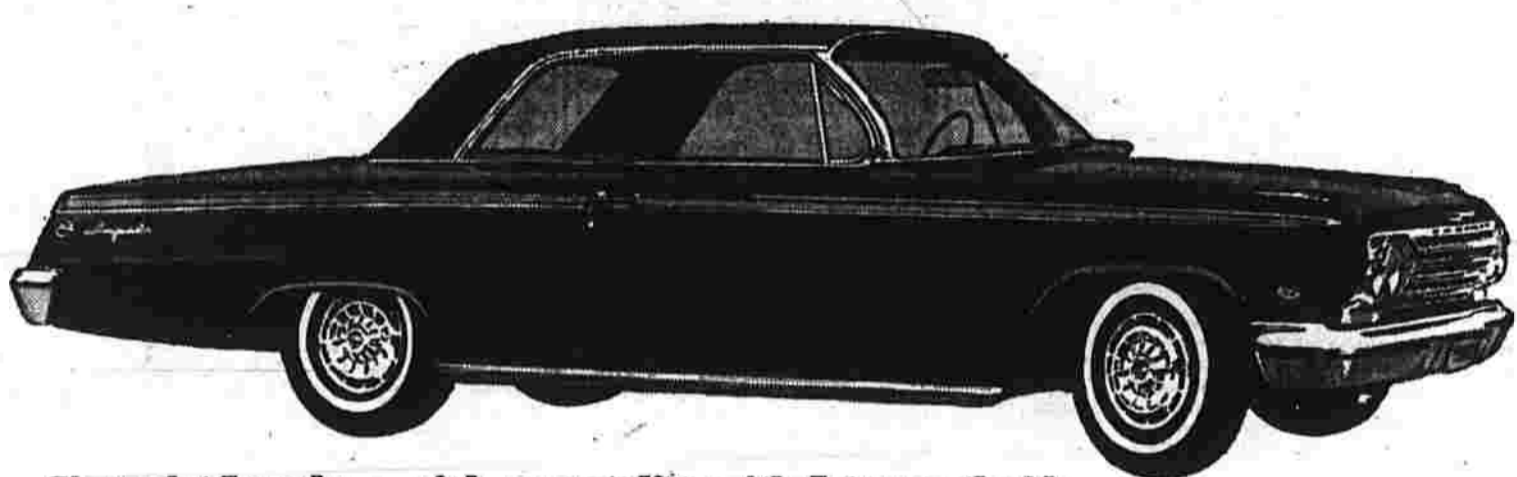

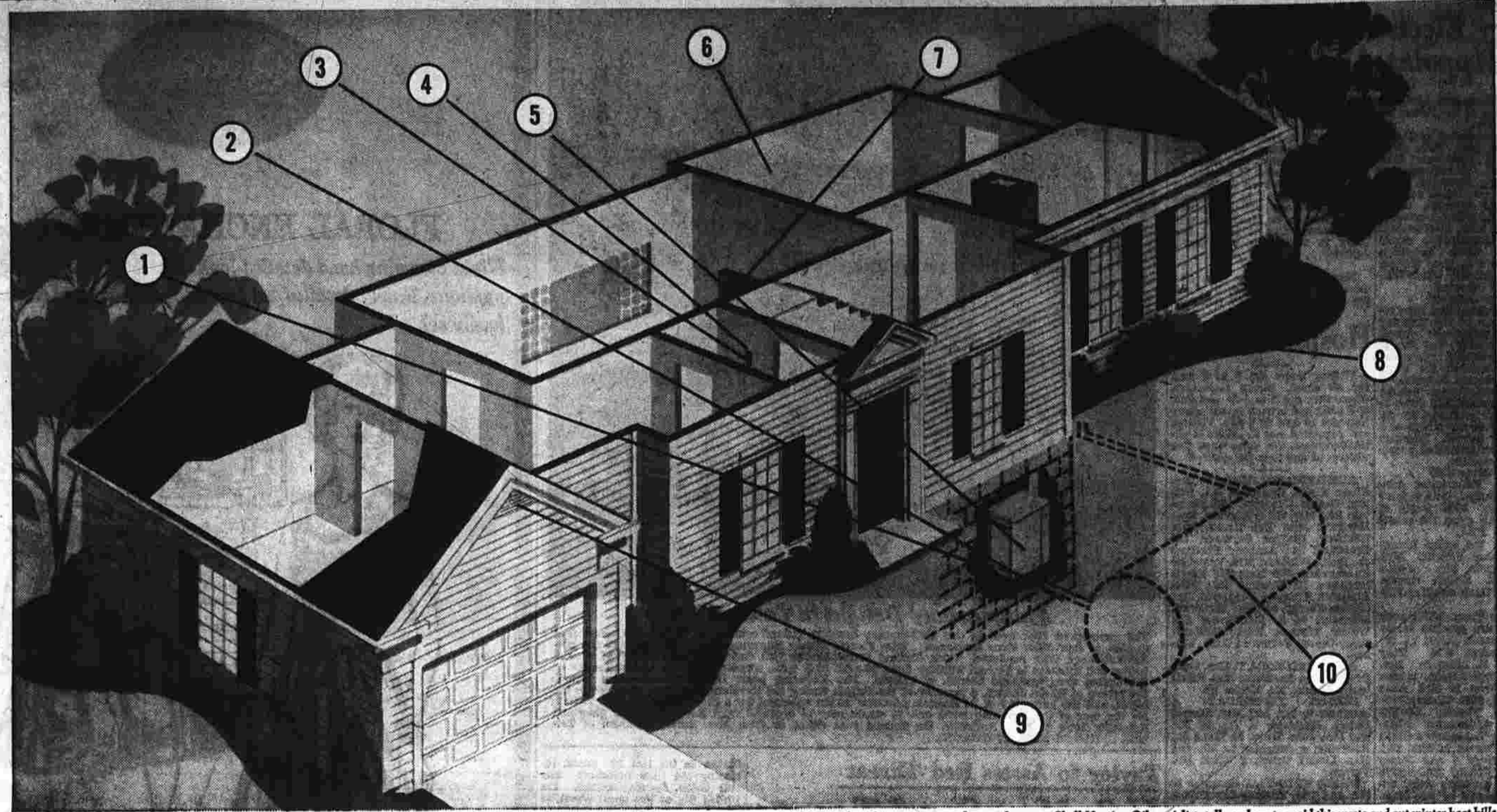

Tshombe's request that he remain in Elisabethville until a ceasefire accord could be signed.

"President Tshombe considered that an agreement could be arrived at by this evening," the statement said.

Fighting between Katanga troops and U.N. forces who tried to bring the province under the authority of the Leopoldville government was suspended after a temporary cease-fire was reached Sept. 20.

A further sign of improving relations between the Katanga regime and the U.N. command was the publication of a joint agreement intended to persuade thousands of U.N. protected refugees in Boloto to return to their homes and work.

The refugees, most of them immigrants from neighboring South Kasai Province, have been camped six weeks on a 20-acre site on the outskirts of Elisabethville. The joint agreement said 8-man committees will be set up in each area to ensure the security

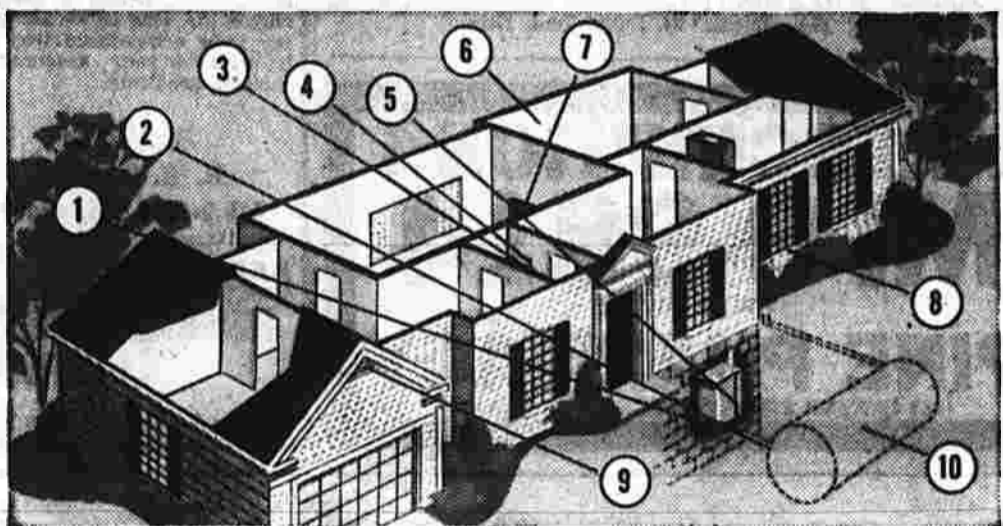

A White House statement requested after the news conference said:
"The tests which have been announced individually have been those on which we have clear and prompt identification and on which it was determined that immediate announcement would not prejudice the security of special methods of detection.
The president's announcement of over 20 tests was based on information accumulated over the whole period of recent Soviet testing and was designed to give a fuller picture to the American people without revealing security information.
In the news conference Kennedy said the United States is ready to renew talks with Russia about a nuclear test ban—but will not stop its own tests until an agreement is reached.
He said the present U.S. policy on underground tests is in keeping with its security interests. But he did not rule out the possibility that the United States may make atmospheric tests in the future.

Air Force to Study Fallout on Japan

Tokyo, Oct. 12 (AP)—Maj. Gen. Oliver K. Niess, U.S. Air Force surgeon general, said today radioactive fallout recorded in northern Japan "deserves very, very serious study."

Added at a news conference if he would be concerned for the health of men under his command who were exposed to such fallout, Niess replied:
"I would have serious concern until I knew all the facts. Of course, I am always concerned about the health of my people."

But Brig. Gen. Charles Merhouse, surgeon of the U.S. 6th Air Force in Japan, told newsmen "No special directives have been issued to date" dealing with protective measures for U.S. servicemen.
Japanese scientists reported a radioactivity level of 25,000 counts per liter (about one quart) of rain water on Hokkaido, Japan's main northern island.

They said a count of 20 is normal but that Tuesday's count, the result of Soviet nuclear tests, was not considered dangerous.

About 6,000 U.S. servicemen and their dependents are stationed at Misawa Air Base in northern Japan.
Gen. Niess said U.S. Air Force medical teams are experimenting with drugs to protect humans from radiation cell changes that sometimes result from exposure to radiation.
The experiments have developed "pretty good knowledge" about drugs that eventually might increase by 50 per cent a human's ability to tolerate radiation, he general said.

Terry said arrangements were made to obtain samples from the six cities when reports of radioactivity last month indicated that the eastern half of the country had received substantial fallout.
Later, the number of sampling points was increased to 18, but no analysis was available yet from the 12 additional cities. They are: New York; Austin, Tex.; Milwaukee, Wis.; Chicago, Ill.; St. Paul, Minn.; Salt Lake City, Utah; Sacramento, Calif.; Seattle, Wash.; Omaha, Neb.; Wichita, Kan.; Denver, Colo.; and Washington, D.C.
Terry said that the health service and the Food and Drug Administration are developing a statement on the long-range health implications of fallout in light of instructions from the President when he recently approved recommendations of the radiation council.
In addition to studies of iodine in milk, stepped-up programs have been initiated by the Health Service, state health departments and the Food and Drug Administration for measuring strontium 90, strontium 90 and cesium 137 in air, water and various foods.
Terry said the first tests were conducted for iodine 131 partly because it reveals its radioactivity for only a few weeks.
"Knowing precisely what we are dealing with is the first essential of defense against this or any other public health hazard," Terry said.
