Fallout: Facts and Fears The Bad Actors in Testing

Notes—Three radioactive substances in particular need careful watching as fallout from nuclear testing increases. But at this point their distribution appears well below the immediate danger level to human health. Last of three articles. Most of these "die" very quickly, and so do not travel far. But strontium-90 and cesium-137 remain radioactive for many years. It is taken in food. These atoms remain active in the body. Iodine-131 has a half-life of eight days. Half of it becomes harmless in eight days. In another eight days only one-quarter remains. If milk became contaminated with iodine, keeping it refrigerated for a month would make it safe to drink. Dr. James Kerrill of the Public Health Service points out that the actual amount of strontium-90 in the body is very small. It would take about 100 years to build up a harmful amount. The H-bomb or fusion reaction itself does not create any strontium, cesium, or iodine. These come from the fission of uranium in the bomb. And the A-bomb reaction is needed to produce the heat and pressure to make the hydrogen atoms fuse.

Strontium, Iodine, Cesium The Bad Actors in Testing

For strontium-90, this ranges from 100 to 1,000, and for iodine from 100 to 1,000. A microcurie is one millionth of one curie, which is the amount of a substance which will produce a certain amount of radiation in one gram (1/25th of an ounce) of radium.

The Public Health Service is keeping a daily watch on the activity in the air, water and milk, and some foods, to detect any dangerous increase.

If limits are approached or exceeded, then some actions can be taken to protect people.

For milk, switching to canned or powdered milk—which has been on the shelf long enough—letting fresh milk sit a while, could reduce the danger from iodine.

Washing fresh fruits and vegetables carefully could remove fallout out.

Certain crops were found to be relatively high in strontium, they could be avoided as human foods. Cows could be fed forage which had been stored inside barns or silos, and hence not touched by fallout.

Research promises ultimately some ways of dealing with strontium hazards in food.

What worries many health officials is that many people—of public—might give up drinking any milk or avoid essential foods because they feared it was contaminated with too much radioactivity. That kind of wholesale avoidance of essential foods could do far more harm than additional amounts of radioactivity which were below the "maximum" now being observed.

Said the Public Health Service health officials:

"The radiation caused by the Soviet tests will add to the state of health among the population, and possibly to the state of health among the population in the United States."

"At present radiation levels, and even at somewhat higher levels, the additional risk is slight, and very few people will be affected."

200 Library Aides Hear Ted Powell

More than 200 high school library aides and their teachers heard Dr. Theodore Powell, Manchester author, discuss "Facing the Future" yesterday afternoon at the Junior High School.

The occasion for Dr. Powell's talk was the autumn meeting of the Nurturing 200 Association.

He stressed the importance of the library in helping his gather new ideas, he said.

Dr. Powell received a B.A. degree in 1948 from Columbia University and an M.A. the following year from Johns Hopkins University. He has published a treatise, "The School Bus Law," and is working on a government textbook.

The best source of information in selling true stories is "to talk to an eyewitness," Dr. Powell said, although in the case of the Adolphus Greig expedition to Ellsworth Island in the Arctic in 1883, he has had to rely on the diary of the expedition. Bolton Shorter Form Report Cards Due Monday

Bolton Elementary School pupils will bring home a new type of report card Monday. Each pupil will receive 10 marks, compared to 45 on the "old" cards which have been used here for the past several years.

On the new cards, pupils will be given an "A" for marks equaling 90 to 100, a "B" for marks in the 80 to 89 range; "C" 70 to 79; "D," 65 to 69 (or marginal work below average); and an "F" failure.

The new cards are to be signed by a parent and returned to school each day for the entire year, can be compared. Under the old system, a new card was issued each marking period.

Data will be the same for Grades 2 through 8. Marks will be given for English, reading, spelling, penmanship, social studies, arithmetic, science, music, physical education and conduct.

The card for first grade will include marks for social development, work habits and attitude as well as reading, language skills, social studies, penmanship, numbers, music and science.

Parent-teacher conferences will no longer be scheduled routinely twice a year for all parents. Parents may request a conference with their child's teacher at any time, however.

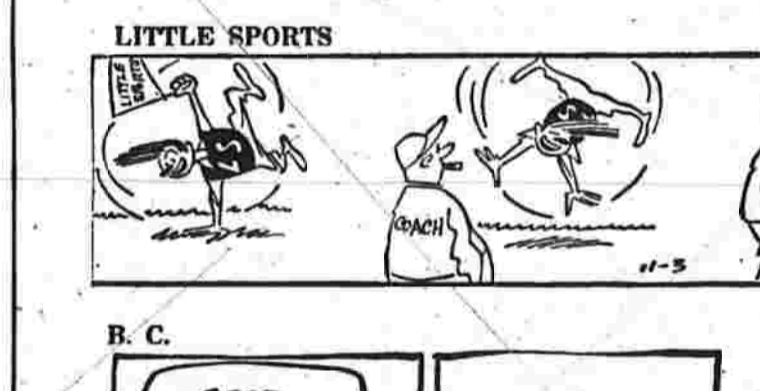

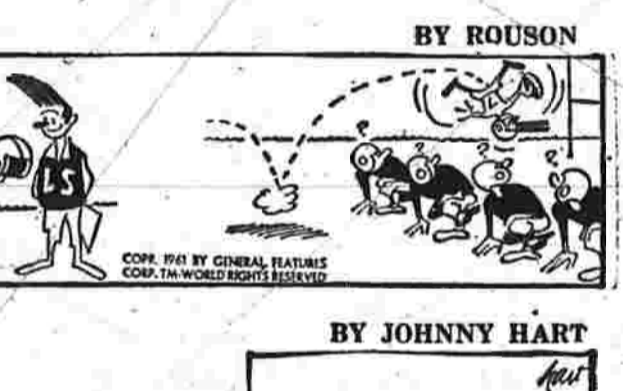

Pope to Issue Encyclical on First Pope Leo

Vatican City, Nov. 4 (AP)—Pope John XXIII announced today that he will issue an encyclical honoring Pope Leo I, who in the 5th century halled Attila the Hun from attacking and plundering Rome.

Pope John addressed a vast throng of 35,000 people — among them special missions and other representatives of more than 60 nations — in the highlight of ceremonies honoring his own 80th birthday and the third anniversary of his coronation as pontiff. The supreme ruler of the Roman Catholic Church told them that he would issue the encyclical, recalling the life and work of Pope Leo I, on Nov. 11 — 11th century anniversary of the death of the great pope and saint.

The pontiff's voice was unusually strong. He did not mention the word Communism, but Vatican sources interpreted his action to recall the work of Pope Leo as a call for more intense action against the threat of atheistic Communism.

Attila the Hun was known in his time as "the scourge of God." He had ravaged Northern Italy and had reached the walls of Rome, where Pope Leo met him. The pontiff's eloquence is generally credited with having turned him back.

Pope John spoke from his caped throne in St. Peter's basilica. He called himself a "poor person, the humble servant of the servants of God," then mentioned his own considerable age and pontificate as succeeded by his namesake, Pius IX, who lived until 87, and Leo XIII, who lived until 80.

Vatican sources interpreted this as an indication Pope John is ready to make a series of steps to his office in the years to come.

The pontiff spoke especially of the forthcoming Ecumenical Council of the Roman Catholic Church as a "prophetic sign" expected to convene late next year. Pope John concluded his address with a plea for "most happy peace and blessing for all."

He later received members of the special missions in the Vatican's audience hall.

At a meeting yesterday with student leaders and university trustees, President Lyndon B. Johnson said he would appoint other officials as well as Burch and Arkader.

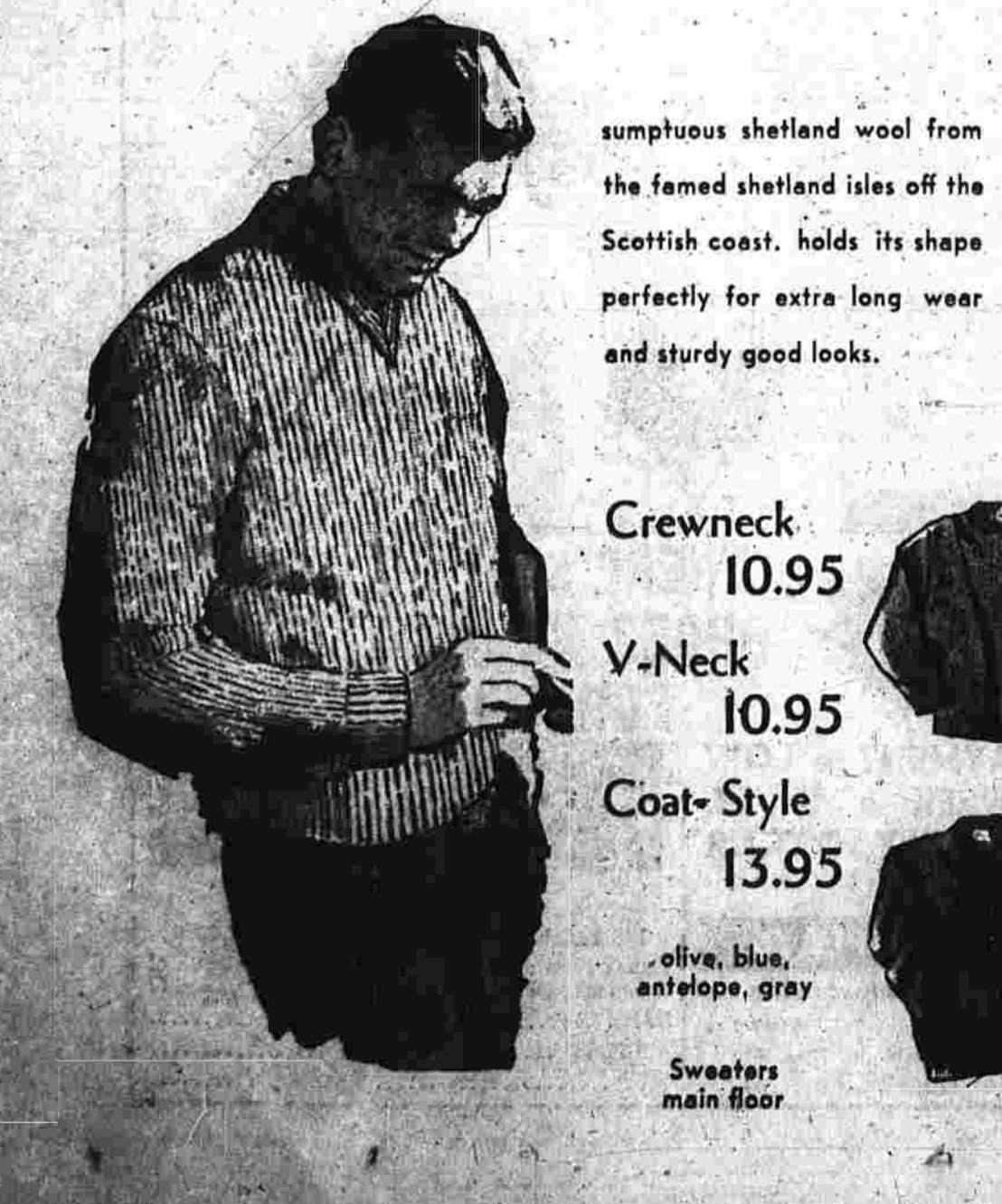
