### Garage Bid Accepted, Quick Start Promised

The board of directors last night unanimously approved a \$96,292 contract for the construction of a public works department garage on Olcott St. by the Green Manor Construction Co.

Charles Jay Ellinger said this morning that the contract papers should be ready for signing within a couple of days. Ellinger, president of Green Manor Construction Co., said construction will start within a couple of days from the time the contract is signed.

Construction from then on will be a race against winter. The company has promised completion of the building within 120 days of the start of construction, and possibly within 100 days.

The Republic directors who are the majority of the board have promised completion of the garage this year. The garage will probably be ready for use until early February.

Democratic Director Ted Powell took the opportunity last night to praise the majority for first providing the garage in February 1960, then waiting until August to take action on the project.

"Would it not be better, if some of the energy and attention to speeding things up were spent on the 'liability'?" he asked.

He also criticized the Republican majority for not asking the building committee to study the plans and specifications for the garage, and expanded his remarks to demand whether any money had been set aside for the garage.

Mayor Turkington said the scrutiny of the building committee was not necessary, because the construction of the garage is a simple one, primarily a rectangular shell with doors on two sides.

Town Councilman Arthur A. Welch Jr. said last night that the committee has to consider architectural buildings, and those only because the state requires such consideration before a grant will be turned over to a town to decrease construction costs.

The mayor defended his fellow Republicans at length, and finally Powell said he hoped to see the mayor's eloquence and withdrawal of the amendment.

The \$96,292 contract includes a \$4,000 bid, and \$2,292 for four additional items, including storm drains and a retaining wall.

Science Catching Up To Myth

Dr. Frank A. Brown, Jr., a biologist at Northwestern University, and a meeting of scientists whom whom he reported his experiments up at M.I.T. the other day all seemed a little worried over the possibility that people would not easily accept the theory his experiments would seem to establish. Quite the contrary, the situation really is that science is, in fact, beginning to catch up to something the human race has known, in a variety of ways, for a very long time.

What Dr. Brown has discovered, in his experiments, is that particles of the moon and the time exhibit unusual biometric sensitivities, which make it turn to the left or the right according to the phases of the moon and the time. He would take the worms, put a roadblock in front of them, and then see which way they would turn in their effort to get around it. In the winter months, they turned to the right in the fortnight of the full moon, but to the left in the fortnight of the new moon. In spring, they turned to the right on the new and full moon, but to the left at each quarter.

Since this was a factual experiment, Dr. Brown expects to have the recorded facts accepted. But he himself seems to think he is straining our credulity when he goes on to say the following: "The time has come when a general property of living things."

There can be no question, he added, that organisms are sensitive to some geographical factors such as changes in the earth's magnetic field and in our position to relation to sun and moon, in way which cannot at present be explained.

Only Dr. Brown's fellow scientists would doubt this. Mere people won't.

Dr. Brown isn't telling anything new or sensational to these many generations of old world farmers who insist on doing their planting by the phases of the moon. They have always known that the phase of the moon had everything to do with the behavior of the germination and the growth of the seed, and with the health and direction with which it would begin its growth.

Now Dr. Brown, imparting any of his basic revelations about all those human beings who, charting their own moods and tempers and energies, find that some mysterious outside idea seem to be pulling many people in the same direction at the same time. In the middle of last week, for instance, under the domination of the last quarter of the delayed harvest moon, there was a phase of human behavior in which people felt tight and dry, and if they had some kind of grip on their own destinies.

If you don't happen to think of this, at the time, remember back right now, and see if you didn't do at least two things in the middle of last week—sing out loud or

Mayor J. Walter Kennedy of Stamford, who won a second term, continues to be the major party in Connecticut so long as our party has outstanding candidates with programs geared to the challenges of these times.

He said the Democratic victories in the big cities were "recounting votes of confidence" in outstanding municipal administrations.

May said the vanilla showed "an impressive upsurge of Republican strength in the large cities and an overall increase in the Republican vote."

He said the Republicans made a better showing in the big cities than two years ago, and he said the victories in Meriden and Norwalk "again demonstrate the Republican strength in the industrial centers."

The GOP leaders said that similar victories in Stratford, Bristol, Middletown, Danbury and

Hartford earlier this year were proof that "the large cities can no longer be considered safe Democratic territory."

Another election that had the attention of state party leaders yesterday was the one in Bridgeport.

Trudisco pitted up a plurality of 18,000 in winning a 4-man race there.

Trudisco, a 46-year-old lawyer, considered a possibility for the Democratic nomination for lieutenant-governor next year.

He pitted up an impressive plurality of 15,000, about 300 less than his plurality of two years ago.

Trudisco's opponent was defeated by Republican George W. Ganim, 12,377; Socialist William G. Visnosky, 10,807; and Social-Democrat Gordon B. Dury, 1,474.

Trudisco is a former state legislator and city court judge. He

ran unsuccessfully for state attorney general in 1954.

He ended the 34-year reign of Socialist Jasper McWay in 1957 by a margin of 151 votes.

McWay has been inactive since he suffered a stroke about a year ago.

In the Waterbury race, Bergrin defeated Republican Frederick W. Palomba, 21,500 and Laocino, 21,500.

Bergrin, a 50-year-old funeral director, polled 25,698 votes; Palomba, 21,500 and Laocino, 21,500.

His plurality of about 2,100 was some 1,300 less than that of two years ago when he defeated Republican Raymond E. Sawyer.

Kennedy faced with a split in his own party, won a 3-man race in Stamford by a plurality of about 4,100.

Palling an unofficial total of 16,443 votes, Kennedy defeated Republican Martin F. Armstrong Jr., 11,500 and Thomas J. Quigley, 4,943.

Armstrong is a state representative and Quigley is a former 3-term Democratic mayor, who ran as an Independent-Democrat.

He defeated Democrat John W. Grant, incumbent Republican Mayor John D. Zrega, who was running as an Independent-the People's Choice candidate.

Houston polled an unofficial 7,380 votes; Grant, 7,431; Zrega, 7,385; and Ross, 135.

The Meriden campaign was marked by a bitter primary contest between Houston and Zrega, and by a controversy over Houston's legal residence.

Scott McLeod, former U.S. ambassador to the Philippines, died of a heart ailment at his home in Bolton, Conn., today.

McLeod was born in Bolton, Conn., in 1885. He graduated from the University of Hartford and the University of Southern New England. He was a member of the Coventry Boat Club.

He was married to Mrs. R.N.H. McLeod, who was then the Senate Republican leader, came to McLeod's defense. Knowledgeable sources here are saying he had full confidence in the nominee and McLeod was the victim of a "smear campaign."

The Senate voted 54-22 to reject a motion to return the nomination to the Foreign Relations Committee for further inquiry, and confirmed McLeod on May 9, 1957.

McLeod was in Cambridgeport, Iowa, and attended Grinnell College. Later he was a resident of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Galesville, Iowa, and became an agent for the FBI.

He resigned from the Justice Department to join Sen. Bridger's office in the State Department as security chief. He held that job when President Eisenhower selected him to be ambassador.

He resigned from the ambassadorship last January when President Kennedy took office, and shortly after that was named counsel for the Senate Appropriations minority.

He married the former Edna Van Pappelandt, of Keokuk, Iowa, who has three children, Anne, 17, Van, 15 and Daniel, 14.
