The London dealer, Thomas Agnew & Sons, paid \$100,000 for a portrait of Prince Louis of Prussia, painted by Raphael's teacher, Saint Augustine with Members of the Confraternity of Perugia.

It was announced that the New York dealers Rosenberg and Stiebel were the second highest bidders at both the "Aristotle" and the Ericson paintings.

### Rockville-Vernon Selectmen Plot Garage Needs

A list of needs to be put before the Vernon Fire District Planning Commission will spark efforts in coming days to pick a location and recommend construction guides for erection of a Vernon town garage.

First Selectman George E. Risley told the planners Tuesday he will draw up a list of requirements for review by them.

He said he would like to plan a site which would be a good location for a garage and equipment which could be left outside.

Although the recently purchased Ecker Farm in Vernon Center was not named the only location for a town garage, it was recognized as the most promising site.

Risley and Zoning Commission Chairman Charles H. Brown said the building could be built far from the road, probably on the north end of the rolling farm property.

The town purchased the 80-acre farm during the summer for \$55,000.

Planning Commission Secretary Henry F. Willman said the commission expects to meet with the district planning consultant, Merrill Lincoln of New Haven, Nov. 28 and suggest looking over the farm property at that time.

Risley said he is hoping that sale of the present town garage property off East St. in Rockville will pay for construction of a new garage. **Greatest Growth Ever Noted by Loan Industry**  
Chicago, Nov. 16 (AP)—The president of the United States Savings and Loan League said today the savings and loan industry is having its greatest growth in history.

C. Edward Knapp said assets of savings and loan associations by the end of 1961 will have increased \$10,250,000,000. The previous record growth occurred in 1950, when assets increased \$8,000,000,000.

Knapp reported growth figures for the industry in advance of the league's 69th annual convention which opens tomorrow. About 4,800 persons are expected to attend.

He said 1961 housing starts will total around 1.3 million units, up 3 to 4 per cent from 1960. He predicted housing starts in 1962 will be about the same total.

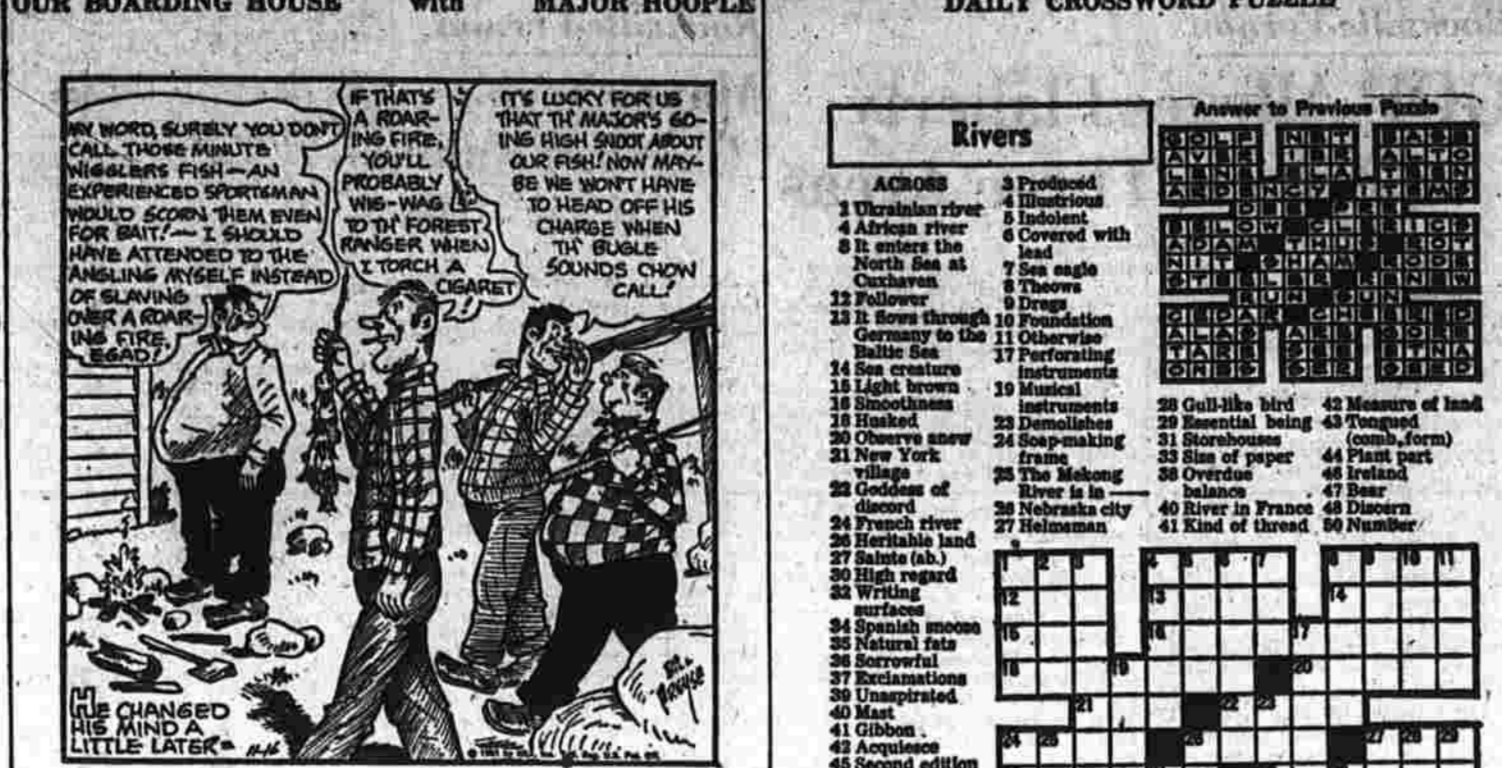

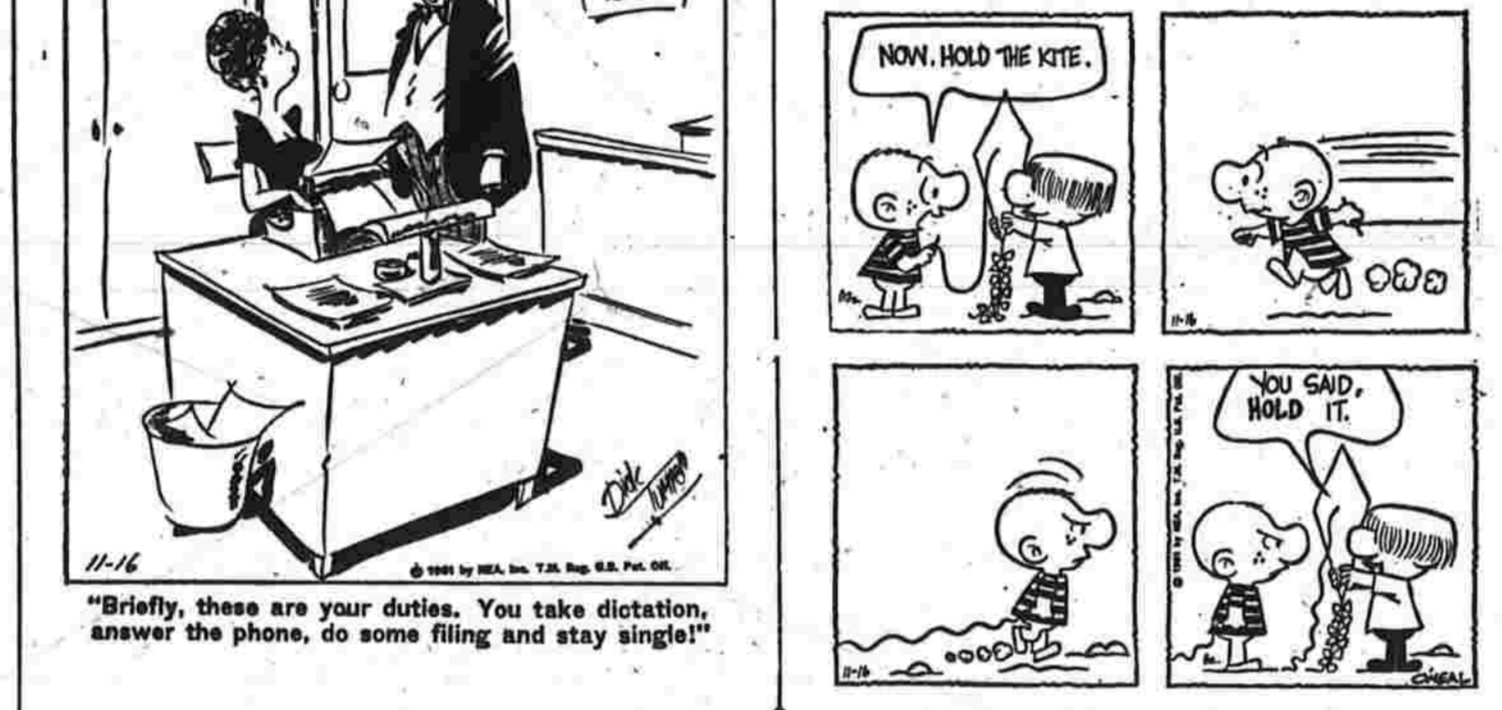

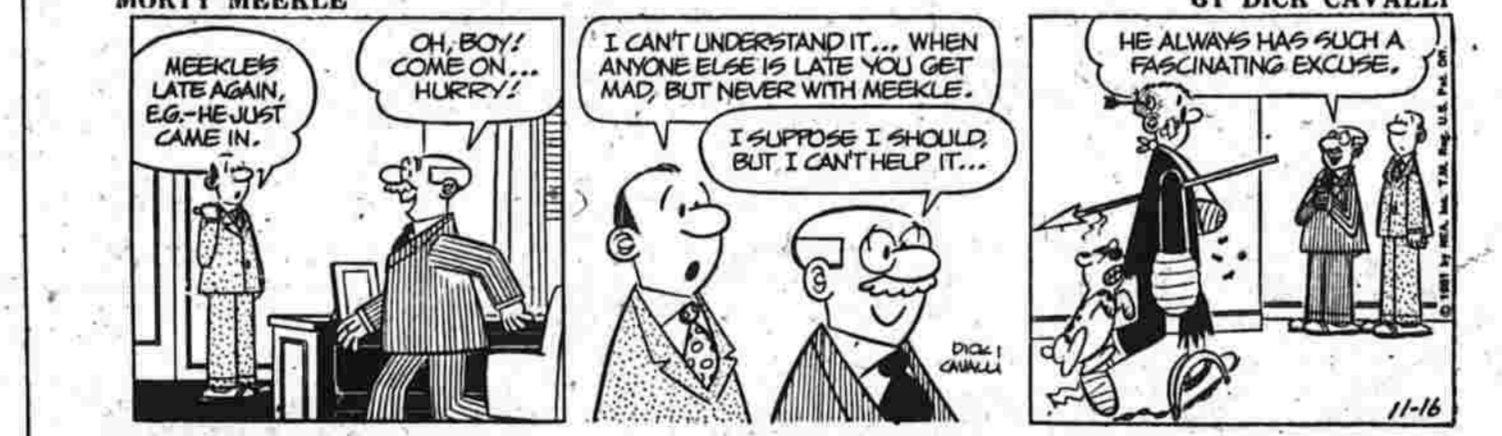

Kennedy Talks Of Negotiation

Seattle, Nov. 17 (AP)—President Kennedy says the United States must be willing to negotiate Cold War issues from a position of strength. To preach either war or surrender, he says, does a disservice to the nation. As the Western Allies, including the newly-organized West German Government, renew efforts to unify their stand toward Russia, Kennedy yesterday made clear these views: 1—To encourage "appeasement or war, suicide or surrender," will divide the nation, create uncertainty among Allies and inspire doubt in the Communist bloc. The West's readiness to defend its rights. "The United States cannot impose its will on others," he said. "There cannot be an American solution for every world problem."

Freight Train Derailed

Norwich, Nov. 17 (AP)—Seven cars of a New Haven railroad freight train left the track here last night, tearing up the rails for 300 feet. No injuries were reported. The 66-car train was en route from Worcester, Mass., to New Haven. A spokesman for the railroad said that until the damage is repaired Worcester-to-New Haven traffic will be routed through Providence. The first car to leave the tracks was the 43rd, at about the midpoint in the long string. The next 12 remained on the tracks but then six more were derailed. Four of these tipped almost onto their sides and one plunged over an embankment, nearly sliding into a canal. Most of the cars were loaded with scrap metal, a railroad spokesman said.

Suppressing Agent

Liver May Produce Immunity to Cancer

By ROBERT GOLDENSTEIN Associated Press Science Writer Chicago, Nov. 17 (AP)—An immunity shield protecting normal persons from developing cancer may be a material manufactured in the liver, three medical investigators suggested today. They said some evidence of a mechanism of this type has been indicated in animal cancer transplant experiments. The doctors said several scientists have demonstrated that a cancer suppressing substance is present in a high degree in the blood serum of guinea pigs. They have detected its presence to a lesser degree in the serum of humans. The activity of the suppressing agent was demonstrated when cancers were transplanted into mice and serum was administered. The tumors regressed and in relation to similar tumors transplanted into other mice that received no serum. The study was made by Drs. Peter A. Herbst, Theodore T. Takas and William H. Kraemer of Philadelphia. The active agent is called tumor inhibitory principle (TIP). Extracts containing the substance are composed of proteins. The researchers made extracts from guinea pig muscle, spleen, kidney, heart, brain and liver. They found TIP only in liver. The investigators sought to determine if the substance is excreted in human bile. Writing in the Journal of the American Medical Association, they said: "The data indicated marked retardation of growth with bile from non-cancer patients, and no retardation of growth with bile from cancer patients. . . . Thus it appears that the normal human liver produces an inhibitory principle which it imparts not only to the blood stream but also to the bile." The doctors cited recorded cases of spontaneous regression of cancer in humans—the very tiny percentage of sufferers whose cancers disappear without any medical treatment. Rome, Nov. 17 (AP)—Communist deputies angrily stalked out of a stormy chamber of deputies session today after hearing world communism blamed for the slaying of 13 Italian airmen assigned to U.N. forces in the Congo. Hot words were exchanged by Communist, Christian Democrat and Italian Social Movement (Fascist) deputies. The Communists stood up and screamed. Ushers stepped into the center of the chamber to prevent fighting, last night. The outbreak came after Carlo Russo, foreign undersecretary, announced that the Italian government has asked the United Nations to punish Congo soldiers responsible for the slayings in Kivu province last Saturday. He said Italy also had demanded guarantees for the safety of Italians still in the Congo. Luigi Gallo, leader of the ruling Christian Democrat group in the chamber of deputies, then declared U.N. forces were inadequate to control the situation in the Congo. Gallo blamed this on "those na-

Bodies of Two Found in Plane On Talcott Mt.

Bloomfield, Nov. 17 (AP)—Searchers found a wrecked plane and the bodies of two Long Island men on the wooded slopes of Talcott Mountain early today. They were directed to the area by the only survivor of the crash after he had groped through the woods and found a house. The dead were identified as the pilot, Stanley Breslau, Valley Stream, N. Y., and a passenger, Marvin Mendelson, Massapequa, N. Y. They were identified from a flight plan filed by the pilot before he took off in the rain from Brookfield in Windsor Locks about 10 p.m. State Police said. According to the flight plan, their destination was Islip, N. Y. The third man in the plane, Gary Alterman, 47, of 223 Evandale Rd., Scarsdale, N. Y., was thrown out when the plane hit Talcott Mountain. Despite its name, Talcott Mountain would be more properly described as a large wooded hill. Although seriously injured, Alterman got to his feet and started off through the woods for help. He found the house of Richard P. Balduf on Kennosau Rd. after walking for what seemed to him about a half hour. Alterman was taken to St. Francis Hospital in Hartford. His condition was termed critical. He suffered multiple injuries, the hospital said. Both wings of the plane were sheared off by the impact and the craft somersaulted. It was found upside down in a thickly wooded area. Volunteer fireman Carroll Clark Jr., who with Bloomfield Policeman Paul Forster Jr. discovered the plane, said the craft was "opened like a peapod." One of the victims was found about 15 feet away. The other was pinned in the wreckage of the single engine 4-passenger Cessna. Breslau, 37, and Mendelson, 42, were pronounced dead at the scene. Alterman made his way to the

The Green Bay, Wis., child had clung to a white cork raft, riding a sea made choppy by 16-mile-an-hour winds, since Sunday night. Her feet were shriveled from long exposure to the salt water and her skin was colored a deep pink from the sun. Her lips appeared to have been painted. She wore pink corduroy slacks and a white blouse with three-quarter-length sleeves. Terry Jo previously had been reported lost with four others, including her parents and a brother, Brian, 14, when a chartered ketch, the Blue Belle, went down in a sudden squall 50 miles northwest of Nassau, Bahamas. But at 11:17 a.m. yesterday a message came from a merchant ship, the Captain Theo, saying a child had been picked up from a life raft, the skipper, named Couthoudis, requested medical advice from the Coast Guard. The child was given a small amount of water and orange juice and put to bed while a Coast Guard helicopter flew to meet the

U.S. Speeding New Arms Aid To Vietnamese

Washington, Nov. 17 (AP)—Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara said today the United States has speeded up deliveries of military aid to Communist-threatened South Viet Nam. This has been done under existing programs, he said, and discussions are under way on possible additional aid to the South Vietnamese, hard pressed by what he termed Communist infiltration from the north. As for the Berlin crisis military buildup, the Secretary of Defense said "We have no present plans for calling any additional large numbers of men from the National Guard or Reserve to active duty." "The military buildup, which began last summer, is "proceeding at least as rapidly as we planned," McNamara said. He denied published reports that the United States had authorized fresh Reservists on active duty after their Congress-authorized year in uniform has ended. McNamara said U.S. strength has been reinforced by about 500,000 men and American military power in Europe has been boosted by about 45,000 men. On other matters mentioned in a wide ranging news conference, McNamara: 1. Indicated that the next military budget may top \$50 billion and that authorized Army strength will be pegged at more

Panama Seeks Deadline For Taking Over Canal

Panama, Nov. 17 (AP)—The National Assembly last night unanimously demanded a new treaty with the United States fixing a date for the United States to turn over the waterway to Panama. No date was specified. The assembly resolution was adopted within 24 hours of the publication of correspondence between Presidents Kennedy and Roberto Chari on negotiations for a new treaty. Chari on Sept. 8 had written Kennedy that their governments should try again to resolve longstanding differences over the Canal Zone, starting this time from scratch. Kennedy in a letter Nov. 2 agreed the differences must be discussed thoroughly and frankly and indicated his government would be ready for talks in 1962 after it re-studied current and future needs from the canal. The assembly resolution said Kennedy's letter "evidences the good will of his government to arrive at satisfactory agreements

Secretary May Add To Forces

United Nations, N. Y., Nov. 17 (AP)—Acting Secretary-General U Thant summoned his top Congo advisers into private session today to hear recommendations from the U.N. military commander in the Congo that his forces be strengthened to cope with mounting violence. U Thant conferred with his Congo Advisory Committee amid anger at U.N. headquarters over the brutal slaying of 13 Italian airmen of the U.N. Command by mutinous Congolese soldiers in Kivu Province. The U.N. Congo force once numbered more than 22,000 men but is down to 15,490 since the withdrawal of contingents from Ghana, Guinea, Mali, Morocco, Tunisia and the United Arab Republic. It is expected to lose the Nigerian contingent of 1,711 within a few weeks.

CYCLONE DEATHS AT 456

Acapulco, Mexico, Nov. 17 (AP)—The estimated death toll from cyclone Tara jumped today to 438 and officials said at least 200 persons are missing. The toll took a big jump when relief units pushing into the storm-ravaged area north of this resort city reported they found a crude burial site with almost 100 graves. Efforts rescuing the stricken area saw persons waving and pointing to their mouths, indicating hunger. When planes brought food, many knelt in thanks.

SENATOR HAS OPERATION

Portland, Ore., Nov. 17 (AP)—Maurine B. Neuberger, D-Ore., was reported in satisfactory condition today after an operation for removal of what doctors said was a slow-spreading cancerous growth. A tumor about the size of a golf ball was removed from the wall of the large intestine during the 3-hour operation at the University of Oregon Medical School Hospital. The entire growth was removed, said Joseph J. Adams, spokesman for the hospital. Adams said there was no indication of any spread of the tumor and "the prognosis (forecast) is excellent."

POBUMBANU JAILED

President Due At Final Rites For 'Mr. Sam'

Bonham, Tex., Nov. 17 (AP)—The high and the humble began gathering in this little North Texas town today to say farewell to Sam Rayburn, Speaker of the House. He died of cancer and its complications in the modest Risser Hospital here at 6:20 a.m. (CST) yesterday. "It was the damndest thing that ever got hold of me," the 79-year-old Rayburn had said only several days ago. But Rayburn died peacefully—"as if one asleep," said his physician, Dr. Joe Risser. President John F. Kennedy and Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, a longtime friend and protégé of Rayburn, headed the list of government officials who will attend the funeral tomorrow. The service will be in Bonham's First Baptist Church, a magnificent edifice of yellow brick with a massive, sweeping roof and modern lines. Rep. John W. McCormack, D-Mass., the man most likely to succeed Rayburn as speaker, arrived in Dallas last night and was due here today. He has designated 105 members of Congress who will fly to Bonham tomorrow for the funeral of "Mr. Democracy." They include all members of the Texas delegation and the senior members, Republican and Democrat, from each state. There were no smiles in Bonham, a blackland farming town where Rayburn had his home.
